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said Province of Nova Scotia: [The Committee, observing that by their instructions the Governors should have sent assistance, order the Board of Trade to] prepare a Draught of an Additional Instruction proper to be sent hereupon to the Governor of New York and New Jersey to remind them of the aforementioned Instruction and to exhort them to afford all the Assistance in their power to the said Province of Nova Scotia so far as may be consistent with their own Safety, And that they do likewise prepare a Draught of an Instruction proper to be sent hereupon to the Governments of Connecticut Rhode Island and Providence Plantations to do the like and lay the same before this Committee.

[The Committee recommend to the Secretary at War that part of Shirley's letter of 30 Aug. which concerns a method of recruiting.

Shirley's letter sets forth that the four companies at Canso were attacked in May last and compelled to surrender themselves prisoners of war for a year, That after they had remained Prisoners at Louisbourg above three Months the Governor sent them to His Majestys Province of the Massachusets Bay but first obliged the Officer who had the Command of these Forces at Canso to Enter into a New Agreement vizt. That the said Forces should not be free to Act in His Majestys Service till the Expiration of One Year from the Date of this last Agreement which was upon the first of September following which the said Officer complied with least he and all the Men should have been sent to Canada with which they were threatned and from whence they could not have been restored to His Majestys Service within the Space of Twelve Months. And Whereas the said Governor Shirley hath further represented that the said Forces are averse to Act without His Majestys Special Order for that purpose And praying His Majestys Pleasure may be therefore Signified herein as soon as may be, [the Committee, having considered] a Copy of the Capitulation made by the said Forces upon their first Surrendring themselves to the French and

also the Second Agreement or Treaty made on the first of September following and likewise a Copy of a Letter wrote by Governor Shirley to the Governor of Louisbourg relating to the said Second Agreement, [refer the matter to the Advocate General and the Attorney General for their report] Whether the said Second Treaty or Agreement so Entered into during the time His Majestys Forces were actually Prisoners of War by virtue of the first Treaty and consequently under the power of the Enemy should be lookt upon as binding to the said Forces so as to prevent their acting in His Majestys Service before the expiration of the time Limited by the said Second Treaty and that they do at the same time offer what they shall think proper for His Majesty to do therein.

Fry Gentleman late First Lieutenant in the Honourable Brigadier Wolfs, Regiment of Marines Setting forth That in January 1742 he was confined on Board His Majestys Ship the Greenwich Commanded by Captain Laws by Order of Sir Chaloner Ogle then Commanding at Jamaica without being made acquainted with any Crime he had been guilty of or knowing who was his Accuser and was continued under such Confinement fourteen Months and upwards during the greatest part of which time the Petitioner was denied the liberty of seeing any of his Friends and deprived of the use of Pen Ink and Paper by which means and from the cruel and hard Treatment the Petitioner met with during his Confinement in many other respects the Petitioner became Epileptick and was frequently Seized with Convulsion Fits That after the Petitioner had been kept in close Confinement for fourteen Months and upwards he was brought before a Court Martial held on Board His Majestys Ship the Orford lying in Port Royal Harbour in Jamaica and was accused of Disobedience of Orders in refusing to Shoot a Lieutenant of His Majestys Navy by the Order of Captain Laws without having an Order in Writing from Captain Laws for that purpose and likewise of telling Captain Laws that when he was on Board the Petitioner expected to receive his Orders from him in regard to the Marines and did not Choose to take them from the Officer of the Watch altho' it was not so much as alledged that the Petitioner had ever disobeyed the Officer of the Watch and on his part proved that Captain Laws himself the very next day afterwards applauded the Petitioners Conduct in the presence of Captain Cotterel who was Commodore upon the Cruize they were in when the Affair happened for not Shooting the Lieutenant and acknowledged that the Petitioner had behaved the most like an Officer of any Man in his Ship Yet the Petitioner was Condemned to be broke and to an Imprisonment for full fifteen Years and rendered incapable of ever Serving His Majesty either by Sea or Land That in regard he hath met with very cruel and hard usage from the Court Martial before whom he was Tryed and by the long and Severe Imprisonment both before and after he was Condemned. He most humbly prays that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to Order the Petitioners Case to be enquired into by a Board of General Officers or to grant him such other relief as to His Majestys great Wisdom shall seem meet. That by being restrained from Exporting and Vending these Tobacco's to the French Kings Subjects during the present War may induce the French to Cultivate the growth thereof in the French Colonys and should they not be Supplyed from hence may in process of time furnish great part of Europe with other Sortments of Tobacco in prejudice to the Trade of His Majestys Kingdoms That the French Court has given liberty to the Farmers General to import into France in English or Neutral Bottoms all such Quantitys of Tobacco as they shall think proper since which the Farmers General have applyed to the Petitioners to Obtain His Majestys Royal Licence for the Exporting such Tobacco's from Great Britain into the Ports of France free of Capture which Licence must be a Common Benefit to His Majestys Trading Subjects especially as the French Court neither Asks or expects any French or other Effects to be taken by His Majestys Subjects in lieu of the Tobacco or any other Equivalent whatsoever, Wherefore The Petitioners humbly pray that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to grant unto them His Royal Licence to permit and suffer them from time

to time during the present War to Export from any one or more of the Ports in this Kingdom into any of the Ports of France all such Quantitys of Tobacco of the Growth of His Majestys Plantations only as the Petitioner shall think fit and that His Majesty will also be pleased to Grant them His Royal pass for such Ships or Vessels and Cargoes of Tobacco out and home so that the same may be exempted from Capture or Molestation under such Restrictions as to His Majesty should seem meet.

That the Ballance of the proceeds chiefly arose by Silver taken on Board the said Prizes the greatest part whereof was sent to England by His Majestys Ship Diamond and Deposited in the Bank of England to Wait His Majestys Orders, The Memorialists therefore pray that their Excellencys will be pleased to grant them an Order to the Governor and Company of the Bank of England to deliver immediately to them out of the said Deposited Effects 33,028 Ounces of Spanish Silver Coin which at the price of 7s. 2d. per Ounce Rated in the Invoice makes the Sum of 11,835l. 0s. 8d. Current Money of Jamaica being the Moiety of the neat proceeds of the said two prizes Vested in the said Commissioners as aforesaid. [X. pp. 152-3.]

And the said Commissioners informed the Committee, That Mr. Knowles had at first refused to Deliver into the Bank all the said Silver according to the Bill of Lading because they would not agree to pay him for Freight nor let him deduct such a Quantity of Silver as would be Sufficient to pay him what he Alledged to be his Share or Proportion thereof But that sometime afterwards he did deliver into the Bank Eleven Chests which were deposited there, But this not being done agreeable to the Bill of Lading these Chests could not be received by the Bank otherwise than as a Deposite, and accordingly the Receipt given is for a Deposite of Eleven Chests the Contents unknown, And the Commissioners further Represented that there was reason to Apprehend that the said Captain Knowles by not paying in the Silver agreeable to his Bill of Lading may not have Deposited the whole of what he brought over with him, And that they likewise apprehend there still remains in the hands of the Agents for the Captors in Jamaica and others some more of the proceeds of the said Prizes which ought likewise to be sent over. The Lords of the Committee upon Consideration of the whole matter cannot take upon them to Advise Your Excelleneys to cause any Determinate Quantity of Silver to be paid out of the said Chests to the said Commissioners to be Distributed amongst the Sufferers, But they are of Opinion that Your Excellencys may issue Your Warrant to the Governor and Company of the Bank of England to Open the said Eleven Chests so Deposited by Capt. Knowles and to take an Account of the Silver contained therein by causing the same to be Weighed and Valued and to Deliver over to the said Commissioners One Moiety of all the Silver that shall be contained therein in Order to the said Commissioners making a Distribution thereof in the manner Directed by their Commission, And that the said Governor and Company do retain in their hands the other Moiety subject to such Demands as the Captors may have thereupon and to wait His Majestys Orders. And

the Committee do likewise think it advisable for Your Excellencys to Require and Command the said Agents and others at Jamaica as likewise Captain Knowles and all others who may have detained in their hands any of the Money arising by the said Prizes to pay the same forthwith into the Bank of England as they shall Answer the Contrary, That the whole produce of the said Prizes may be Distributed amongst the Captors and Sufferers agreeable to the Declaration of their Excellencys the Lords Justices of the 18th of June 1741.

That finding only One Moiety thereof has been given by His Majesty to the Captors He thinks it but reasonable that he should be allowed Freight for the other Moiety which is given to the Suffering Merchants And he further insisted on the practice of the Navy in being paid Freight for Money belonging to the Crown in several instances.

On the other side the Commissioners insisted that as the said Captain Knowles had given a Bill of Lading at Jamaica for delivering the whole of the Silver Freight Free that therefore he ought not now to be allowed Freight for any part of it.

That they conceive the said Captain would be compelled in a Court of Law to a strict performance of the said Bill of Lading.

That at the time he Signed the said Bill he could not be unacquainted that the said Money did belong to the Crown, His Majesty not having then made any Declaration for the Distribution of it in favour of the Captors.

And the said Commissioners denyed that it was the practice of the Navy to pay the Captains of the Kings Ships Freight for bringing Money belonging to the Crown But that if there was such a Practice, they hoped a Stop would be put thereto.

APPENDIX I.

COMMISSIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS TO COLONIAL GOVERNORS (1720-1745).

The following list includes all commissions and instructions issued during this period of which record is made in the Register and Plantation Register, and which have not been included in the body of the book. The normal procedure in the appointment of a Governor was for the Board of Trade to send to the Council a representation enclosing a draft commission. On the approval of this, one of the Secretaries of State was ordered to cause a warrant to be prepared for his Majesty's signature, in order to pass the commission under the Great Seal. Some time later a further representation, with two drafts of instructions, one general and one for trade, was submitted by the Board of Trade, and referred by the Council to a Committee; on receiving their report, and after considering any proposed amendments, the Secretary of State was ordered to prepare the drafts for his Majesty's signature. When three dates are given in this Appendix without comment, no amendments have been offered, the procedure has taken a formal course, and the dates represent respectively the stages of reference by Council to a Committee, recommendation by the Committee, and final approval.]

APPENDIX III.

COLONIAL ACTS CONFIRMED OR DISALLOWED BY THE PRIVY COUNCIL, 1740-1745.

[The normal procedure during this period in confirming or disallowing a Colonial Act was that the Board of Trade submitted a representation giving their opinion. This was referred to the Committee, who reported to the Council, whereupon an order was issued approving or rejecting the Act. Where the Act is confirmed, the Register rarely contains anything more than a notice of these formal stages: in cases of disallowance, and occasionally when the Act is confirmed, reasons are given, the Committee report generally quoting these from the representation of the Board of Trade. In most of these cases, the proceedings have been given in the body of the book, though a few, where the reasons are very briefly expressed, will be found in this Appendix. Three dates given without comment represent the stages of reference to the Committee, Committee report, and Order of Council. A date in brackets is that of the representation of the Board of Trado. When anything more than a notice of these ordinary stages of procedure is given in the Register, it is repeated in the text.

As in Volume II, when accessible printed collections of the Acts of a Colony exist, we have referred to the Act by its number in the collection.
