APPENDIX V.

GRANTS OF LANDS.

In this appendix are collected the records in the Register from 1764 to July, 1766, of lands petitioned for or granted in the American colonies. The same contractions with regard to dates are employed as in the other appendices ; the number of acres granted follows the name of the grantee, and where the original petition was for a larger area, the number of acres asked for is given at the end in brackets.

1.—FLORIDA (EAST AND WEST).

The conditions of the grants in these colonies differ from those for Nova Scotia (527 and 552) in the following particulars : the quitrent is one half-penny per acre, and is payable after five years on half the land, after ten years on the whole ; copper, lead and coal mines are reserved to the Crown ; and one acre in every thousand is to be devoted to hemp, if the Surveyor General reports that any of the land is suitable therefor.
