# PRIVY COUNCIL (COLONIAL).

CHARLES II. VOL. 16. (1 June, 1680-31 May, 1683.)

[1.] [During this period the following additions are made to the Committee :

29 June, 1680, Earl of Clarendon; 20 Oct., 1680, Sir Robert Carr; 2 Feb., 1681, Earl of Conway; 23 Feb., 1681, Earls of Chesterfield and Aylesbury; 9 March, 1681, Earl of Craven.]

[2.] Seth Southill Captive in Algeirs, Praying in regard of Vice Admirall Herberts urgent Affaires, that the Release of the Petitioner directed by Order of the 2nd of July last, . . might be negotiated by Merchants, [it was referred to the Commissioners of the Admiralty, to effect his release in whatever way shall seem to them most convenient]. [p. 6.]

[Seth Southell setting forth that] . . the Commissioners of the Admiralty . . although they approve of the Petitioners Exchange and Ransome to be negotiated by Merchants doe require of the Petitioner to give Security for the safe returning of the said Prisoners in case he should happen to dye before he be exchanged which the Petitioner by reason of his Captivity is not in a Condition to procure, And also ethat the Petitioner being more severely treated by the Turks than ever who are enraged at the Long delay of the said Prisoners Exchange, therefore make him carry Morter, Brick and stone for the Masons with a heavy Chaine of Nine links, each linke two inches and halfe thick upon his legg besides Bolt and Shackle Most humbly prayes that . . his Majestie would bee pleased to direct the Commissioners of the Admiralty to issue their Warrant

to the said Vice Admirall for sending the said Turkish Prisoners to Leghorne by the first opportunity and deliver them into the hands of Thomas Deerham Esqr. his Majestys Agent and Consull for the English there, to secure them till the Petitioners Exchange can be effected pursuant to his Majestys said order of the 2d of July 1679, and to inspect the transacting thereof accordingly by the Negotiation of Mr. Charles Longland, Mr. Charles Harris and Mr. John Brookin English Merchants there and Company who will take care to pay all such charges as the said Consull shall bee putt to in this matter. [The petition is granted and orders given in accordance with its terms.] [p. 101.]

28 July. [Though two captive Turkish captains were exchanged for Seth Southell, yet he was forced to enter into a bond of 3,000 pieces of eight to one Winbourne, an English subject living at Algiers despite the open hostility between his Majesty and those pirates. This bond is contrary to the agreement made with that Government, and yet Mr. Southell remains prisoner in the Counter. The case is referred to some of his Majesty's counsel learned in the law to consider what his Majesty may do legally for the relief of Mr. Southell.]

7 Sept. [The Attorney General makes a report on Seth Southell's case, and the Council direct that proceedings follow the course therein proposed, viz.]. that the only way for the Petitioners releif will be by Bill in Equity to be brought in the name of his Majesties Attorney Generall and the said Mr. Sothell, and that in the mean time the actions brought may bee removed into the Kings Bench. And that his Majestie may please to give direction for some persons to be bayle and to provide for their indemnity of which there will be little hazard if the case be as it was stated to him. 31 May. [In addition to the two Turkish captives, Seth Southell was forced to enter into an engagement to pay 6,000 pieces of eight, for which some English subjects at Algiers became his

sureties. On arriving in England Southell refused to pay, and though 3,000 pieces have been recovered at law from him, he has now gone to Carolina, where he is governor, leaving one Robert Cole engaged for the other 3,000 pieces.] The Dey and Government of Algier having writt very earnestly to his Majesty that the said summe may Speedily . . it is to be apprehended, that unlesse be satisfied some effectuall care be taken therein (Cole not being worth the money) they may seize upon his Majesties Consull upon his Arrivall there, and that possibly worse Consequencyes may attend it. [Accordingly, on the recommendation of the Committee for redemption of captives, it is ordered that the] Attorney Generall doe forthwith prepare a Bill for his Majestys Signature commanding the said Seth Southell to Repaire into England within three moneths after notice thereof, and to render himselfe to one of his Majesties Principall Secretaryes of State as he tenders his Allegiance and will answer the Contrary at his utmost perill, unlesse he hath before notice thereof be given him, satisfyed and payd the said three Thousand peeces of eight. [3.] Upon reading this day at the Boord the humble Petition of Dame Elizabeth Carteret Widdow Relict and Executrix West Indies. of Sir George Carteret Knt. and Bart. late Vice-Chamberlain of his Majestys Household, Praying payment of the Summe of 500%. per annum with the Arrears thereof due unto her said late Husband out of the Revenue of the Caribdee Islands, which the ffarmers of that Revenue refuse to pay notwithstanding his Majestys Letters Patents in that behalf. [A copy of the petition is ordered to be delivered to the said Farmers, who are to return a written answer with all speed.] [p. 10.]

[The Farmers return their answer, not submitting to 4 August. payment of the sum alleged to be due, and praying for a hearing. The whole matter is thereupon referred to the Treasury to hear both parties and decide.] [p. 60.]

Upon reading this day at the Boord the humble Petition [6.] Jamaica. of Dorothy Mingham Wife of Captain firancis Mingham Prisoner at Port Royall in Jamaica Complayning of the Oppressions and Imprisonment her Husband suffers by reason of the undue Proceedings against him by Sir Henry Morgan knt. Deputy Governor of Jamaica and Judge of the Admiralty there and Thomas Martin Gentleman Customer at Port Royall, for petitioning this Boord to be heard against a Sentence of Condemnation of the Pink ffrancis of London whereof the Petitioner was Master, which was exhibited in the Petitioners name in his absence by the Owners of the said Pink, as by the said Petition at large appears, And Praying That her said Husband might be set at Liberty to come over and make good his Allegations at this Boord by living Witnesses as well as Records from Jamaica, And that he may have true Copies of the Returnes from Jamaica, [the case was appointed to be heard on 7 July], whereof the Agents of the said Sir Thomas Morgan and Mr. Martin are to have timely notice, that they may come prepared to make their Defence, but if they cannot be then ready, that the said Hearing be deferred till the Wensday following, And in the mean time, that Copies of all the Papers relating to this [p. 28.]Busines, be mutually delivered to each Party.

The Petition of Captain francis Mingham being this day. 9 March. read Setting forth his acknowledgment of his Majestyes great favour, and Justice done to him upon the Petition of his Wife in July last, in ordering his Releasment from his confinement upon a Verdict recovered against him in the sayd Island, [and showing] That the Petitioner being returned hither in order to prosecute his said appeale and abide the Judgment of this Board thereupon, for the doing whereof his said Wife gave security to the full summe of the claime, and finding his sayd security very desirous to be discharged of their sayd Bonds, And therefore humbly praying his Majesty to appoint when the sayd matter should be heard as well in relation to the condemnation, and sale of his sayd ship, as to ye proceedings had against him, as aforesaid for appealing from that sentence to this Board, to the end he may receive such releife as should be agreable to Justice, and Consideration being had thereof, his Majesty was pleased to order That this matter be and it is hereby appointed to be heard at this Board the first Councill day after Easter next. . .

[9.] Whereas Captain Henry Wilkinson . . hath humbly a. besoughthis Majesty to lend him the Spanish merchant one of his Majestys fire shipps lying at Deptford Dock to transport the Petitioner his Servants and Passengers about one hundred and fifty in number to his Majestys plantation of Carolina, and that the said ship be refitted with speed, supplyed with Guns and amunition at his Majesties charge, he himself being willing to victuall officer and man her at his owne Charges. [The petition is referred to the Admiralty to report thereon.] [p. 62.]

9 Sept. [10.] The Council refer to the Committee for examination Slave Trade. and report the Petition of the Royall African Company of England setting forth that whereas his Majestie was graciously pleased to grant to them, the sole Trade of the Coast of Guiny, and that many of his Majestys subjects as well from hence as from his Majestys Plantations and other parts, in contempt of his Majestys said Charter and Proclamation have of late and still doe presume to send out ships to Trade in those parts more abundantly then ever heretofore, and that severall have come lately to the Island of Barbados and landed their Blacks and Merchandize and gone away againe without Entring their ships or taking out their dispatches in Defyance of the Government and contrary to the Act of Trade and Navigation and a particular Act of the Country requiring it whereby the Company Stock will be see much impayred as they shall not be able to carry on their Trade and support the charge of about 15000l. per annum for the necessary maintenance of their Forts and Guarrisons, And therefore praying that his Majestie would bee pleased to apply such further remedy for redresse of the said abuses as to his Majestie shall seeme meet. Bay in New England in the words following, vizt. : Trusty and welbeloved Wee Greet you well. When by Our Royall Letters bearing date the 24th day of July in the 31th years of Our Reigne Wee signifyed unto you Our Gracious inclinations to have all past errors forgotten, setting before you the meanes whereby you might deserve Our pardon, and Commanding your ready obedience to severall particulars therein contained, requiring withall a speedy complyance with the intimations of your Duty given to your late Agents during their attendance here, all which wee esteem essentiall to your quiet Settlement and naturall obedience due unto us; Wee then little thought those markes of Our Grace and favour should have found no better acceptance among you, but that before all other things you should have given preference to the execution of all Our Commands when after soe many months wee come to understand, by a Letter from you to one of Our Principall Secretarys of State dated the 21th of May last, that very few of Our directions had been pursued by your General Court, the further consideration of the remaining particulars having been putt off upon insufficient pretences and even wholy neglecting your appointment of other Agents which were required to be sent over unto us within Six Months after the receipt of Our said Letters with full Instructions to attend Our Royall pleasure here in relation to that Our Government. Wee have alsoe received the Petition of Our Trusty and welbeloved Robert Mason Esqr. . . humbly laying before Us the state of his further pretentions to the propriety of soyle in a Tract of Land lying between Merrimack and Naumkeck Rivers \_ . In the Examination whereof the Lords of Our Committee of Forreigne Plantations had made such a Progresse that the right of Our subjects had already been thereupon setled, without the humble intreaty of your said Agents, and consent of the said Robert Mason, that in regard of their sudden departure and want of powers in that behalfe, the Determination thereof might be suspended untill the

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arrivall of other Agents to be appointed according to the Limitation of Our aforesaid Letters, as your Agents were able to informe vou. And although the vindication of Our Authority, and the demand of Justice from one of Our Subjects might have well induced us to the most speedy means of redress by doing us and our Subjects right, Wee have nevertheless continued Our Royall Clemency towards you, and thought fit to give you further opportunity of bearing evidence of your Duty towards us, soe as noe further occasion of Complaint may be offerd, in respect of your behavior: Wee do therefore, by these Our Letters strictly command and require you, as you tender your Allegiance unto us and will deserve the effects of Our Grace and favor (which Wee are inclined to afford you) seriously to reflect upon Our Commands contained in Our said Letters and other directions at severall times intimated unto your late Agents [and particularly to send over within three months after the receipt hereof new Agents with] sufficient Instructions to attend the Regulation and Settlement of that Our Government and to answer your proceedings therein. And that the matter of the Complaint of the said Robert Mason may be thus determined, Wee expect that your Agent or Agents bee not only prepared to lay before us such Evidences of Right as you may have to the propriety of soyle in that tract of Land claimed by him, ' but Wee direct you also to make a publick signification of Our pleasure unto all the Inhabitants and Tertenants thereof. that they doe furnish att the same time your said Agents or such others as they may Depute with the proofs of their respective Titles to the Land possessed by them, to the end they may bee fully satisfyed in Our Royall Justice that they have not been prevented in the full improvement of their <sup>4</sup> Lawfull Defence, Which Wee hereby direct them to make before us in Councill. Such is the care and tenderness that wee will always continue towards you and other Our subjects by removeing those difficultys and mistakes that have arisen by the Execution of the Powers of your Charter at such a Distance from us, which by the first intendment and present constitution thereof (as by the Charter appears) has its naturall seat and immediate direction within Our Kingdome of England.

And that the due observance of all Our Commands above mentioned may not be any longer protracted, Wee require you upon receipt hereof forthwith to call a Generall Court and therein to read these Our Letters, and provide for Our speedy satisfaction; in default whereof wee shall take the most effectuall means to procure the same. And soe Wee bid vou farewell.

His Majestie in Councill was pleased to approve of the said Letter and to Order [that] the Earle of Sunderland his Majestys Principall Secretary of State doe prepare the same for his Majestys Royall Signature accordingly.

the said Islands, according to the 6th Article of the Treaty, Mr. Secretary Jenkins is hereby further directed And . . to prepare Orders for his Majestys Royall Signature unto Sir William Stapilton Governor of the Leeward Islands Comanding him to make Restitution of the said Islands of St. Eustace and Saba, unto the States Generall, or such who shall be Impowred to receive them on their part, in the condition they shall be in att the receipt of the said Orders. 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take such Bond accordingly, and give Certificates thereof, as in such cases hath been accustomed, And as to such Ships and Vessells as have already or may before the publication of this Order happen to have given Bond, to bring their Ladings of the said Goods to England, Wales, Berwick or Ireland, That if any Person or Persons concerned in the said Ships shall desire to take in the said Bonds, or any of them, and to give New Bonds with One Surety for the coming of the said Ships with their Ladings of the said Sorts of Goods to England, Wales, or Berwick and to no other place, and there to unlade and put the same on shoar, That the Officers who have the Keeping of the said Bonds shall deliver the same to them, and take new Bond from them as aforesaid, and give Certificates of their having delivered up the former Bond, and having taken such new Bonds, And in such case His Majesty is hereby pleased to remit the taking or demanding from any such Ships or Vessells any of the Dutys and Rates imposed by the aforesaid Act made in the 25th year of his Majestys Reigne, And the Commissioners of his, Majestys Customes, and all his Majestys Officers of the Customes in England, and in the respective Plantations are required to take notice thereof and to take care that the same be duly observed.

[This order is to be publicly affixed] in all the Custome Houses in England and Wales and Towne and Port of Berwick upon Tweed, And the Commissioners of his Majestys Customes are hereby required to take care that the same be done accordingly. And also that notice of this his Majestys Order in Councill be given to the Collectors of his Majestys Customes in his Majestys respective Plantations.

And altho' by severall Letters Wee have already directed you by your self and your officers to be ayding and assisting to the Collector and other officers of Our Customes in Our Colony of Maryland in all matters relating to their respective Offices, and particularly in the due collection of the Impositions payable unto Us by [the Act of 1673], Wee are neverthelesse informed, that instead of being ayding and assisting to Our said officers in the due collection thereof, You have hindred and forbidden them to receive the same, And particularly Wee have been given to understand by Nicholas Badcock late Comptroller

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and Surveyor of Our Customes in Our Colony of Maryland That upon the Arrivall of the ship St. George of London Captain Shepheard comander, the ffreeman of Liverpool Edward Tarleton Master, and the Dolphin of Pool, Alexander Dennet Master, Our said Surveyor finding by their Certificates, that the Bonds which they had given were for carrying their Loading for England or Ireland, He did demand from the Masters of the said Ships the penny per pound due in such case for all Tobacco which they should lade on board the said ships, but that being refused by them he attended you severall times and desired your Assistance for the Collection thereof, but that you refused to give him any countenance or Assistance therein, And that Our said Surveyor pressing you severall times in this matter, and urging the said Law, you ordered him to appear before your Councill at St. Marys, which he accordingly did, And there in Our Name prayed and required your Aid to levy Our Dutys upon the Lading of the said Ships, or to make seizure of the Goods, But that he was absolutely refused the same, and told that he should not meddle with them, for that he had nothing to do therewith. And Wee are further informed, That by a Letter under your owne hand to the Commissioners of Our Customes bearing date the 7th of June last, you acknowledge to have denyed him the Receiving of Our Dutys on the said Ladings, and to have hindred him from molesting the said Masters, by means whereof the said ships went away with their Lading of Tobacco, without paying any of the said Dutys to Us, whereby Wee are damnifyed in Our Customes to the value of 2,500l. sterling.

Wee have also been made acquainted at Our Councill Boord with the Complaint insinuated by you against Our Trusty and Welbeloved Christopher Rousby Collector of Our Customes in Our said Province, as if he had behaved himself in such violent and unwarrantable manner as tended to the Discouragement of Trade, Diminution of Our Customes and Disturbance of the Publique Peace, But having for Our better

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Information herein left the Examination of those matters to the Lords of Our Privy Councill appointed a Committee of Our fforrain Plantations who have consulted the Commissioners of Our Customes and heard the said Rousby upon Oath, It hath been thereupon represented unto Us, that you have proceeded in a very unusuall manner by charging the said Rousby with so great Enormitys in his absence. without giving him any Notice of those Accusations before his Departure from Maryland, which was well knowne unto you at least flour Moneths before he embarqued. Nor have you transmitted any sufficient Proofs upon the Matters complained of, so that Wee cannot esteem it any waies agreeable to Our Justice to give any Credit thereunto, But do hereby command you to permit the said Rousby peaceably and quietly to execute his office, and to afford him all the Encouragement therein, which the Law requires. And Wee do thinke fit withall to give you this caution, that if you shall hereafter have any cause of Complaint against the said Rousby or any other Person, you do first give him or them a particular Charge thereof, and receive his or their Answer thereunto, and then transmit the said Charge and Answer to Us with the Proofs thereof to the end Wee may direct speedy Justice to be awarded according to the Merit of the Case.

And altho' your Proceedings abovementioned in the obstruction of Our officers and Contempt of Our Laws are of such a nature, as that Wee might justly direct a Writ of *Quo Warranto* to be thereupon issued out, Wee have neverthelesse out of Our great Clemency thought fit for the present only to require the Commissioners of Our Customes to charge you with the payment of the said summe of Two Thousand flive Hundred pounds, and to cause a Demand to be made from you for the same, And that upon adjusting of what shall appear to be truly due to Us you cause the same to be paid by you to Our Receiver Generall and Casheir of Our Customes for the time being residing in London.

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And Wee do strictly command you for the future to take care, That all Our Laws relating to the Trade of Our Colonies and Plantations be duly observed and put in execution, and that all Encouragement and Assistance be given to the severall officers of Our Customes under your Government.

His Majesty taking into his Royall Consideration the said request, is graciously pleased to Declare, that such Merchants, Factors, masters of shipps or other Persons that shall use the method hereafter following in the hiring of servants for his

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Majestys Plantations, shall not be disquieted by any sute on his Majestys behalf, but, upon certificate therof, that he will cause all such sutes to be stopped, to the end they may receive no further Molestation therby :

1. Such servants are to be taken by Indenture to be executed by the servant in the presence of the Magistrat or Magistrats herafter appointed, one part therof signed by such servant, and also underwritten or endorsed with the name and hand writing of such Magistrate, which is to remain with the clerk of the Peace to be returned to the next sessions there to be filed upon a distinct file, and numbred and kept with the Records.

2. The clerk of the Peace is to keep a fair book, wherin the name of the Person so bound, and the magistrats name before whom the same was don, and the time and place of doing therof, and the number of the file shalbe entred, and for the more easy finding the same, the Entries are to be made alphabetically according to the first letter of the surname.

3. All persons above the age of one and twenty yeares or who shall upon view and examination appear to be so in the Judgment of the Magistrate may be bound in the presence of one Justice of the Peace, or of the Mayor or Cheif Magistrate of the place where they shall go on shipboard, who is to be fully satisfied from him of his free and voluntary agreement to enter into the said service.

4. If any person be under the age of one and twenty years, or shall appear so to be, he shalbe bound in the presence of the Lord Mayor of London, or One of the Judges, or an Alderman of London who shall carefully examin whether the person so to be bound have any Parents or Masters, And if he be not free they are not to take such Indenture unlesse the Parents or Masters give their Consent, and some person that knows the said servant to be of the name and addition mentioned in the Indenture is to attest his said knowledg upon the said Indenture.

5. If the person be under the age of fourteen years, unlesse his Parents shall be present and consent, he is not to be carried on shipboard till a fortnight at least after he becomes bound to the intent that if there be any abuse it may be discovered before he be transported, And where his Parents do not appear before the Magistrate, notice is to be sent to them, or where they cannot be found to the Church wardens or Overseers of the Parish where he was last setled in such manner as the said Magistrate shall think fit and direct.

And because Clerks of the Peace may Conceive this not to be any part of the duty of their office, and may therfore exact unreasonable Rewards for their trouble and pains therin. His Majesty doth declare that if any merchants or other Persons shall be aggrieved therby, and upon Complaint to the Justices, cannot obtein releif, His Majesty will take such further Care for their ease herein, as in his Royall wisedome, hee shall think meet.

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ability and of age fit for his trust did examine him touching his willingness to goe upon which the petitioner did accept of him and cloath him, and by Indenture bound him as a Covenant Servant for five yeares according to the Custome of the said Island, at the then knowne office appointed by his Majestie as the Petitioner was informed; and that after having provided him passage the said Turner was again viewed and examined by his Majestys Searcher at Graves-End, about his Age and will to goe, and having declared his free consent, and taken the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy did depart to the said Island, where he remaines as a Supervisor of the Petitioners Negroe Servants in his plantation. That notwithstanding the petitioners honest and faire dealing with the said Richard Turner some persons to trouble the petitioner have maliciously caused an Information to be exhibited against him, in his Majestys Court of Kings Bench. And praving that the same may be stopt. And it is further offered. That Sir Thomas Lynch may have directions to seize as many as he can of such Vessells and Privateers that have or shall injure his Majestvs Subjects. And that he send a Lyst of all those Vessells that have been robbed by the French or by Pirates pretending Commissions from them, with the names of such as have robbed them. [The report is approved and Mr. Secretary Jenkins directed to] prepare and dispatch all such Memorialls, Letters, and other Directions as shalbe necessary for procuring Redresse of the Injurys and Deprædations abovementioned, and prevention of the like for the future.

Wee have been no lesse pleased to receive the Addresse of Our good Subjects, presented to Us by [the Committee], which gives Us Assurance of their Resolutions to pay all ready Obedience to Our Commands, and faithfully to support Our Government to the utmost of their Power, In returne of all which dutifull Acknowledgments Wee have graciously received the Body of Laws transmitted unto Us. And although by the Powers given unto Our Governors those laws are to continue in force untill Our Pleasure be signifyed to the contrary. To the end neverthelesse that by the especial Allowance of them according to the humble desires of Our good Subjects made knowne unto Us, the Settlement of Our Island may be the better carried on by the Establishment of constant and certain Laws, We have upon the perusall of the said Laws by [the Committee] thought fit Out of Our great Grace and Condescension to signify Our Royal Confirmation of the same under the Seale of Our Privy Councill in such manner as other Laws have been formerly approved and confirmed, whereby for the space of Seven years, Wee have not left it in Our owne Power to vacate or repeale them, Excepting only the Act ascerteyning the Rates of Negros and such other Laws as Wee have remitted unto you to be proposed unto our Assembly for their Amendment according to the particular Instructions given you by Our said Committee hereby engaging Our Royall Word and Promise in like manner to confirme the said Laws, when they shall have received the said Amendments, which Wee have left to your prudent Care and Management: whereof

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Wee have the lesse Reason to doubt, inasmuch as you have already made Us fully sensible of your fidelity and Zeale for Our Service in the Discharge of the Trust reposed in you, aswell in passing the said Act of Revenue, as in the Civil and Military Regulations of that Our Government.

And whereas you have complayned of the Deprædations comitted by certain Privateers pretending Commissions from the ffrench Governor of Hispaniola Wee have Ordered a Representation to be made thereof to his most Christian Majesty, that satisfaction may be given for the Injurys susteyned by Our Subjects, and that their Trade may be the better secured for the future, Wee do hereby direct and empower you to seize in the best manner you can, such Vessells and Privateers as have injured Our Subjects, or shall disturb their Lawfull Trade.

And so assuring Our selves of the same Care and Successe as Wee have hitherto found in all your Proceedings Wee bid you farewell. [p. 636. C.S.P. VI. 966.]

And that they shallbe conducted to the Island of Jamaica, or the Caimanes or either of them, which is left to their owne choice, Provided they deliver up all the Armes, Silver Gold, Prisoners and Slaves which are at present in their hands. And the said Captain Bockenham and Walter Streight shall use their best Endeavours with the Governor of Jamaica to put into the hands of such Person or Persons as the Governor and Captain Generall of these Provinces shall dispatch to him, all the Prisoners that are in that Island, Subjects of the King Our Master: And the said English shalbe dispatched and transported from the Port of St. Francisco de Campeche within the space of Two Moneths, to be reckoned from the day that they shall arrive to the said Port of St. firancisco, And all such of his Majestys Subjects as shallbe found in the aforesaid Island of Jamaica shalbe conducted and transported to this Court or Jurisdiction.

Given in the Island of Terminos 1680. And it is further Declared, that Captain George Reeves and Captain Nevill shall enjoy the Benefit of these Capitulations in the same measure as the rest, And that no Body shalbe suffered to do them any Hurt. Datum ut supra. [pp. 11-14.]

[The following report of 31Jan. from the Treasury is approved]: Wee have . . had from the Commissioners of the Customes and otherwise the best Information Wee can get concerning the said Island, aswell as the Ship and Persons bound thither which are represented to Us as followeth vizt.

That the Island of Tobago being about Thirty Miles long and 12 miles broad, is one of the Charibbee Islands, which Sir Thomas Warner taking Possession of about the year 1626 were by Letters Patents granted the next year unto James Earle of Carlisle whose Interest in those Islands your Majesty is since possessed of by the Surrender of such as claimed any Title under him thereunto.

That severall years before your Majestys happy Restauration the Duke of Courland and certain Merchants of Zealand called the Lansons endeavoured to settle a Plantation there, but that the Duke upon his Imprisonment by the Swedes was wholy dispossessed by the Zealanders of this Island, as He was also of the Fort St. Andrew seated in the Mouth of the River Gambia (whether by Agreement or otherwise by the Dutch West India Company).

That about the year 1661 Sir Robert Holmes took the Fort St. Andrew from the Dutch which was soon after put into the possession of the Royall African Company of England and 「「「「「「「「「「「」」」

being afterwards claimed by the Duke of Courland who had then a great Desire to be repossessed of the Island of Tobago, a Contract was agreed on between your Majesty and the said Duke wherein Mention is made, that in lieu of the said fort St. Andrew the Duke of Courland should have full Liberty of Trade for his owne Ships throughout the English Territorys in Africa not exceeding the value of 12000l. per annum And upon the same Consideration, your Majesty thereupon granted to the said Duke the Island of Tobago under your Royall Protection, Provided the said Island be inhabited only by English and Courlanders, and that the said Duke (neither himself nor any other for him or his Subjects) shall not export or import any Goods otherwise than out of, or into some of the Ports belonging to England and Courland, or the Port of the City of Dantzick, The said Duke in acknowledgment of his tenure thereby further promising in case of Warr to furnish your Majesty with a Ship of flourty Guns.

That notwithstanding this Grant the Dutch West India Company were possessed of this Island in the year 1672, when it was retaken by your Majestys Subjects, and the Plantation destroyed.

That neverthelesse after the Peace was made, the Dutch tooke upon them to resettle Tobago, where they continued untill the yeare 1676, when Count D'Estree destroyed their Fleet, and ruined all their Forts, leaving the Island desolate, as it has since remained till of late upon pretence of the Duke of Courlands Right by your Majestys Grant, some small Ships were fitted out in Holland to settle a Plantation there, but without Successe.

That by Articles of Agreement between Abraham Marin then Resident for the Duke of Courland, and Captain John Poyntz dated 20th September 1681, there is granted in behalf of the Duke unto the said John Poyntz and Company and their Heires for ever 120000 acres of Land in Tobago, under the Conditions hereafter mentioned, vizt.

That the said Pointz shall transport 1200 Persons thither within Three yeares to commence from the time the said 1684.

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Pointz and Company shall arrive upon the Island And within ffour or ffive years next after the like number of 1200 People in case it shalbe so thought fit by the Governor and Assembly there, the said Pointz obliging himself in the like manner to build and mainteyne Two or Three more Forts upon the Land so granted him, where a free Port is to be allowed unto the said Poyntz for the space of seven years with certain fformes of Government mentioned in the said Articles and the payment of 2d. per acre to the Duke of Courland after a certain time.

That the said Pointz and Company shall, saving their Allegiance to their natural Prince, take an Oath to be true and faithfull to the Duke of Courland, and be obedient to him, as their Prince in the said Island.

That in case of a Warr between your Majesty and the Duke of Courland, the said Poyntz and Company are to remain Neuters, and to be a free People after the manner of an Imperiall City or Hanse Towne.

That the said Duke shall nominate the Governor of the Place.

That the said Poyntz and Company shall have Liberty to traffick into all parts whatsoever with the Products of the said Island.

And Wee are further informed, that in pursuance thereof the said Poyntz and Company, undertaking to settle this Plantation, presented a Petition to your Majesty Praying your Majestys Order, what manner of Standard or Colours should be used in that Island, And that some Person may be appointed to see them take the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy before their going, which being referred by your Majesty in February last to the Committee of Plantations, and the Petitioners summoned to attend, they fayled to give their Appearance accordingly.

Wee have been likewise attended by Captain Poyntz, who has exhibited unto Us the Articles of Agreementaforementioned, making great Professions of Duty to your Majesty and

Resolution not to proceed on the Settlement of Tobago, without your Majestys Leave. As to the Ship which being bound for Barbados and Tobago, has been stopped by a Warrant from the Admiralty pursuant to an Order of Councill of the 14th of December last, the Commissioners of the Customes have informed Us, that the Master has made Affidavit before them, that he is at present bound for Barbados and Tobago, but that Captain Poyntz with Three Servants were going to Tobago only as Passengers, as the said Poyntz also informs us without his having any Interest in the Vessell.

The Matter of Fact being thus laid before your Majesty as it hath been related unto Us, Wee humbly take Leave to observe the great prejudice that may arise to your Majestys Plantations by the Scituation and Neighbourhood of Tobago to Barbados, and the other Caribbee Islands, with which and your other Dominions in case of a Settlement it will most probably enterteyne an unlawfull Trade, which by the aforesaid Grant may be conveyed to Dantzick, or to any part of the Duke of Courlands Territorys, And that in case the Settlement do not prosper, it will then be the ruine of your Majestys Subjects, who upon specious pretences may be enticed thither.

That in case this Island be reputed one of your Majestys Plantations by the tenure reserved in the said Grant, it will then be repugnant to the Acts of Parliament that any Trade be permitted from thence with Courland or Dantzick, or any other places then such as are belonging to England.

That if it shalbe esteemed a Plantation apperteyning to a Forrainer the said Acts do prohibite any Trade or Commerce between it and your Majestys English Dominions.

Besides that if your Majesty permit the Settlement of the Island by the Duke of Courland, that Duke will have the same Right to the Trade of Africa, from which he has been hitherto hindred not only by the Foresight of the ill Consequences that must happen by it, but upon a full Hearing of this Matter in March 1670 by a Committee of the Councill when (as Wee 1684.

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are informed) it was found that in regard the Duke of Courland had first sold the Fort St. Andrew to the Dutch, your Majesty was surprized in your Grant to the Duke of Courland.

That although the Grant from your Majesty to that Duke has restrained the Trade to the Ports belonging to England, Courland or Dantzick, Yet by these late Articles of the Duke of Courland, Liberty is given to Captain Poyntz and Company of Trading to all parts whatsoever, and of remayning Neuters in case of Warr between your Majesty and that Duke or any other Forrain Prince, with whom he may be allyed which Wee take to be a Violation, and may amount to a just forfeiture of Your Majestys Grant, although it were duly To which considerations may be added whether obteyned. this Island having changed Masters so often since the first Grant, and that Duke having not setled it in due time, nor furnished your Majesty with such a Ship during your Warrs, as is therein covenanted, Your Majesty should neverthelesse hold yourself obliged to allow a Title, which may prove of so very great prejudice to the Trade of your other Plantations.

Whereas his Majesty hath been pleased by his Letters Patents under the great Seale bearing date the 27th day of September 1672 to grant the Sole Trade to Africa from Sally to Cape buon Esperanza to the Royall African Company. And wheras his Majestys Subjects of this Island have made Complaint to [the Committee] that the said Company have not brought into this Island a sufficient quantity of Negros for the supply theref, wherby there is a great want of them to the great prejudice of his Majestvs Customes and the Inhabitants of this Island; To which the said Royall Company have answered and alleaged for reason of their not Importing into this Island quantity of Negros required the great number the of Interlopers who contrary to his Majestys said letters Patents Doe Trade on the Coast of Africa within the Limits aforesaid and freely bring Negros to this Island which doth disable them the said Company from bringing hither that quantity of Negros they otherwise should; Which his Majestys Subjects of this Island taking into Consideration and being willing to give all reasonable encouragment to the said Royall African Company to supply this Island with Negro Slaves, Do enact and Declare, and it is hereby enacted and Declared by the Governor, Councill and Assembly and by the authority of the same that it shall not be the practice of any of his Majestvs Subjects of this Island to encourage any Interlopers nor deale them for Negros, but whosoever of his Majestys with Subjects residing in this Island shall directly or indirectly by himself or any other or by any Covin or fraudulent way or means buy or Cause to be bought in this Island any Negro or Negros brought by any Interloper or any person or persons

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whatsoever, but such as are thereto impowered or appointed by the said Royall African Company from any of the Parts or Coast of Africa which are within the Limits of their Patent aforesaid shall forfeit and pay for every such Negro so bought the sum of ten pounds currant money of this Island, the one half therof shalbe to our soveraign Lord the King his Heires and Successors for the publique use of this Island, and the other half to him or them that shall first sue for the same in any publique Court of Record in this Island in which no Essoign, Protection or wager of Law shalbe allowed. And this Act to continue in force for one whole year to comence from four months after the day of the passing the same; and if within the said year the said Royall African Company shall have Imported into this Island five thousand Negros then to continue in force for one year more otherwise to cease and determine at the end of the first year. And if the said Royall African Company shall before the expiration of the second yeare have Imported into this Island the Number of Three thousand Negros, then this Act to be in force for one year longer comencing from the expiration of the second year, otherwise to cease and determine at the end of the second year, The true intent and meaning of this Act being that if the said Royall African Company do not bring in the full number of five thousand Negros before the expiration of one year . . then this Act to cease and determine at the end of one year [and so for 3000 more in the second year]. But in case the said Royall African Company do continue to bring in the full number of three thousand Negros yearly then this Act to continue and be in force from year to year reckoning from the expiration of the first year untill the end of that year wherin the said Company shall have failed to bring in the full number of three thousand Negros. Provided always that in consideration of . the uncertainty of timeing the arrivall of Negros there, It shall understood that the supernumeraries of any yeare shalbe accounted on to the next year and so from year to year to be continued on as long as this Act shalbe in force.

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And wheras this Island being of great extent and having many Bayes and Harbours where Interlopers may land their Negros and Dispose of the same to the Inhabitants of this Island in such manner that it wilbe very difficult for any one to prove that any Negros were bought from Interlopers, wherby the true intent and meaning of this Act may be frustrated, It is hereby further declared that if any new Negros be found in the possession of any of the Inhabitants of this Island, and he or she be sued for the penalty appointed by this Act on such as do buy Negros of Interlopers, and that the said Party in whose possession such new Negro or Negros are found cannot prove they have had the said Negro or Negros in their possession for the space of three months before the comencement of the sute for the penalty, nor prove that the said Negro or Negros were Imported into this Island by Persons therto authorized by the said Royall African Company or there sold by the said Companies Factors, that then it shall be taken for granted, they were Imported by Interlopers, and the Party or Partys in whose possession the said Negro or Negros were found to pay the penalty by this Act Imposed.

And I desire your Honors wilbe pleased, to put me in a method how I may proceed for the future in this affair ?

2. How comes a great many Ships from Ireland, with written Certificates from Galloway and from Belfast, with the clearing from Whitehaven, and from Biddiford, and from Plymouth and Mynhead, with written Certificates, and give Bond there, I desire your Honors would be pleased to put me in a method how I may proceed in this Affair likewise.

#### Answer.

1. No forrain built Ship ought to trade in the Plantations, but what shall produce a Certificate of his Freedome before October 1662, unlesse such Ships as his late Majesty was pleased to make free by particular Warrant, which Freedome ought to appear by the Certificate from the Registring thereof by Sir Jon Shaw in the Port of London, and in all such cases speciall care is to be taken, that good Proof be made, That the Ship claiming such ffreedome is the Ship for which the ffreedome and Certificate was given, and not another Ship applyed thereunto, and where Doubt doth arise, to take Bond to make their Freedomes appear more satisfactory to the Commissioners in England.

2. For the Ships coming from Ireland with English Certificates, it is to [be] doubted, that for the most part they are counterfeited, and if any have come since Christmas not attested by the Commissioners you may conclude them to be so, And for the future Care wilbe taken to prevent that ffraud by the Attestation of all Certificates, as is already practised, And the fformes and Copies thereof is herewith communicated, which wilbe sufficient Guide for all officers concerned in the Plantations, And tho' it be permitted that Bond may be taken in Ireland, and Certificates thereof given to returne to Ireland, as well as England, Yet all such Ships are to pay the Plantation Duty setled by the Act of the 25th of the late King, and for want of payment of that Duty, all the Goods are forfeitable, and ought to be seized in the Plantations or wheresoever they be met withall; But if any such Ships be already arrived from Ireland with true Certificate of Bond given there, of returning to Ireland aswell as England, not knowing of the late direction and Regulation made for the Certificates, and is willing to enter into Bond to returne to England. Only it may be admitted for the present, Returning the Bonds so taken to the Commissioners of his Majestys Customes in England, But this not to be drawne into Example in the future, nor further tolerated after this publique Admonition and Declaration.

3. There comes severall English Built Ships that clear in England for the Maderas, and for the Capes de Verd Island, and their Goods fit for this Country, and give no Bond in England, I would likewise desire your Honors wilbe pleased to put me in a way, how I shall proceed in this Affair, and

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would also desire your Honors would give me Instructions, whether I may let the written Passes go free, or none but Printed Passes that shall come from your Honors nothing else at present, only remain.

The Condition of this Obligation is such, That if the above bounden Hender Molesworth, shall upon his first Departure from this Island, repair for England, and then and there (Danger of the Seas and Mortality excepted) render himself to one of the Principall Secretarys of State, and answer unto his Majesty all such Demands, as shalbe brought against him on behalf of his said Majesty for or concerning any Treasure or Treasures taken out of the Wreck near Hispaniola, and imported here during the time of his being Commander in cheif, and before the Arrivall of his Grace the Duke of Albemarle, And do further Answer unto his said Majesty all such Matters and Things as shalle laid unto his Charge relating to his late Government, and shall not depart from his Majestys Court untill he hath given such other Security, as on the behalf of his Majesty shall then and there be required of him, And shall also remit unto his Grace (or his Majestys Governor for the time being) a sufficient Certificate from his Majesty or One of the Principall Secretarys of State, that such Security hath been given, in case it shall required, or that his Majesty is otherwise satisfyed concerning the Premisses, And shall also indemnify his said Grace, his Heires, Executors and Administrators and either and every of them, of and from all and all manner of Damages that may be legally objected and recovered against his said Grace his Heires, Executors and Administrators on behalf of his Majesty for or concerning the said Treasure so imported as aforesaid, untill his Graces Arrivall in this Island, Then this Obligation to be void, otherwise to stand and be in full force and vertue.

Trusty and Welbeloved Wee greet you well, Forasmuch as it hath pleased God to call Us to the Throne, and that thereby it is incumbent upon Us to provide in the best manner for the good Government of Our Colony and Plantation of Jamaica, Wee are pleased to Direct Hender Molesworth Esgr. Lieutenant Governor thereof, to repair forthwith thither, and to take upon him the Discharge of the Government according to the severall Commissions and Instructions to him in that behalf. And it being Our Intention that all things within that Government be put into the same State and Condition, wherein they were at the time of the Arrivall of the late Duke of Albemarle, Wee have thought fitt, That Roger Eletson Esqr. the present Cheif Justice of Jamaica, Sir Richard Derham Attorny Generall, and Thomas Wait Deputy Provost Marshall be removed from all Places of Trust within that Island, as Wee do hereby charge and require

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you forthwith upon receipt hereof, to remove the said Persons accordingly, And also to Restore John Bourden and John White Esqrs. to their Places and Trusts in the Councill, Samuel Bernard Esqr to the Place of Cheif Justice, Simon Musgrave Esqr to the Place of Attorny Generall and Smith Kelley Esqr to the Place of Deputy Provost Marshall within the said Island, As likewise all other Persons to the severall Places and Trusts they enjoyed in that Government at the time of the Arrivall of the said Duke of Albemarle, who are to be reinvested in the same immediately upon the Receipt hereof, if they shalbe then residing upon the Place, and in case of absence as soon as they shall returne to that Island, notwithstanding any Suspension, Dismission, or other Act to the contrary. And forasmuch as Wee are given to Understand, that the Assembly convened by the Duke of Albemarle had taken upon them to continue their Sessions since his Decease without any Legall Authority for so doing. Wee have thought fit hereby to disprove of such their Proceedings, And to Declare as Wee do hereby Declare all Acts and Orders of the said Assembly made and enacted since the Decease of the said Duke of Albemarle to be void and null. And Wee do hereby charge and require that no Assembly be summoned to take upon them to meet within that Island, untill the Arrivall of Our said Lieutenant Governor or such other Person as shalbe commissionated by Us to be Commander in Cheif of that Island. And in the mean time Wee do expresly charge and direct you to pursue such Methods in the Administration of the Government, as were used and practised by the late Governor Sir Thomas Linch, particularly Requiring you to take care, that no ffines or Forfeitures be taken or levyed upon any pretence whatsoever untill the Arrivall of the said Hender Molesworth, or that Our further Pleasure shalbe knowne. And for the further Settlement of the Peace and Quiet of that Island, Wee do hereby Direct and appoint that all other Persons, not being Papists, who at the time of the Receipt of these Letters shalle duly and

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lawfully possessed of any office or Place of Authority or Government either Civill or Military within that Island, Except as before Excepted, shall be, and hold themselves continued in the said offices or Places, under the same Condition as they formerly enjoyed the same, until further Orders from Us or that other Provision be made in pursuance of the Powers and Authoritys of the Government And that in the mean time, for the Preservation of the State and necessary Proceedings in matters of Justice, the said Persons of whatsoever Degree or Condition de not fail every one severally according to his Place, Office or Charge to proceed in the performance of all Dutys thereunto belonging as formerly apperteyned unto them. And Wee do hereby further charge and Require all Persons of what Estate or Degree soever within that Island to be aiding and assisting to the said Officers and Ministers in the Performance and Execution of their said Offices and Places, as they and every One of them will answer the contrary at their perill. Provided alwaies that nothing herein shalbe construed or taken to extend to give or continue any Authority Priviledge, Jurisdiction or Command to any Papist or Papists within the said Colony or Plantation. His Majesty was pleased to Order, That it . . be referred back to the said Committee to consider of, and prepare the Draft of a New Charter to be granted to the Inhabitants of New England, with such Powers and Clauses, as may suite with, and be agreeable to the Laws and Government of this Kingdome, and may preserve the Rights and Properties of those Colonies, and reserve such a Dependance on this Crowne, as is advised in the said Report, And that instead of a Governor to be sent in the room of Sir Edmond Andros, there be appointed Two Commissioners to take upon them the Administration of the Government there, with Directions immediately to Proclaim King William and Queen Mary, And his Majesty is graciously pleased further to Order, That such of the Merchants and Planters as are at present here in England do forthwith attend the said Committee in order to their Recommending to their Lordships One of the said Commissioners for his Majestys Approbation.

Secondly, whereas Complaint is made of a Fee of Two hundred Pounds of Tobacco, and Cask Lately Received by the Lord Howard, for the vse of the Publick Seale, Wee are humbly of Opinion, that altho' it appears unto Us that the said Fee upon Complaint thereof, was not disallowed or thought unreasonable by your Majestys Councill in Virginia yet inasmuch as the same hath not been Establisht by the said Councill as by the Commission to the Lord Howard is Requisite, and the same being also Represented as Burthensome and uneasy to the Colony, Wee are humbly of Opinion that it be discontinued, as also the Fee of thirty pounds of tobacco, demanded by the secretary of that Colony, for Recording Surveys of Lands, But as to the ffee of Five Pounds Sterlin Received by the Escheator, for every Office found, whereof Complaint is also made, Wee are humbly of Opinion that the same is Legall and fitt to be Continued as being an Ancient and Customary Fee, and paid only by such who receive a Considerable benefit thereby.

Lastly as to the Complaint made that ffines and fforfeitures in Virginia are not applyed to such purposes as by the said Representation is particularly sett forth and desired, Wee most Humbly Represent to your Majesty that the said ffines and forfeitures, having by Letters Patents, been granted by King Charles the Second, to the Lord Culpeper and others, were Repurchased, by the Late King for divers Considerable Summs of mony actually paid to the said Lord Culpeper, and a further Pension of Six hundred Pounds a yeare payable for Twenty One yeares, and now Charged upon the Establishment of your Majestys Army, so that the said ffines and fforfeitures are become wholly att the disposall of the Crowne as they were, before this purchase, the property of the said Patentees, Yet upon Examination Wee do find that since the said Purchase, no part of the said Revenue has been Employed or disposed of, otherwise than for the better Support of the Government of Virginia to which use, Wee are humbly of opinion, it may be hereafter applyed in such manner as your Majesty shall thinke fit from time to time to Direct, and not otherwise, The same being not in any manner appropriated to any particular use or purpose whatsoever. And upon this Occasion Wee humbly aquaint your Lordshipps that Wee having in pursuance of Her Majestys pleasure formerly signifyed directed Major Lane Surveyer of the Navigation with the Assistance of Mr. Whitehall to Repaire downe the River with Instructions to Execute the Quarentine at Holehaven, Have received from the said Mr. Lane and his Assistant a Letter (coppy whereof is herewith presented) giving their Opinion, That the Hope is a more Convenient and safe place for the ships from the West Indies to remaine in, during the Quarentine then Hole Haven; In which Opinion Wee are inclinable to Concurr with them, because upon discourse with Capt. Nash an officer of good Experience who Remembers the keeping a former Quarentine Wee are Informed That altho (the said former Quarentine being only upon ships from Holland and parts thereabouts, which are generally ships of smaller

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burthen then those that use the Trade to the West Indies) Hole haven might be Capable of Receiving them, Yet the ships from the West Indies being large, the Hope may be more safe and secure place for them to Ryde in, Hole haven being a Narrow Channell, and not soe secure for Numbers of ships of great burthen to Ryde in. And Wee humbly pray That her Majestys pleasure may be knowne concerning such ships who having touched in some parts of Ireland or Scotland the Islands of Scilly or Man, and spent some time there (divers instances hereof daily happen) Whether the time spent in those places, shall not be Accompted part of their Quarentine.

Farther, Wee humbly pray, That your Lordships will be pleased to Receive Her Majestys Commands touching what sort of Testimony of Health shall be required at the End of the Quarentine, Whether a Certificate of the Officer of the Customes respectively who shall be appointed to Execute the Quarentine, of his haveing frequently Mustered the Men on board during the time of the Quarentine; And also the Oath of the Master before the Mayor or other Magistrate of the place, Or what other Testimony her Majesty shall be pleased to require. And whatsoever Her Majesty shall be pleased to direct upon this occasion, Wee humbly pray may be put into an Order of Councill to be publickly shewne to all persons Concerned, Aswell to give the greater Countenance and Authority to the Persons that shall be appointed to Execute Her Majestys Commands, As to prevent Clamour.

And Wee humbly acquaint your Lordships That Wee have Recommended it to the Merchants of London Tradeing to Virginia and Maryland to agree amongst themselves the Distribution of Seamen for that Trade who acquaint us They will Adjust the Matter amongst themselves and Returne a Schedule of that adjustment in due time, But Wee crave Leave humbly to observe to your Lordshipps That Whereas the Number of Seamen allowed to the Trade for the Plantations in the yeare 1690, from this Port was as follows Vizt.

And Wee did by Our said Report humbly observe to your Lordships That Wee were Informed That the permisions which had been before granted for ships to carry their Majesties stores, and those obteyned for particular ships upon private application might prove a surprize to divers of the Traders in Generall unless some further Quota should be assigned them, And therefore Wee were humbly of Opinion, That a farther Quota of Men should be allowed to that Trade this yeare to be distributed among such as had not had the advantage of the former Permisions, If it might consist with their Majestys Navall Service. And Wee doe humbly acquaint your Lordships That the Merchants Tradeing to the Leeward Islands, have amongst themselves made an Adjustment of the Number of Seamen allotted to that Trade wherein they have Complyed with the Quota allowed them in the 90, including the three ships with 54 men above mentioned Permitted to goe by former Orders of Councill, A List of Which Distribution is herewith Presented. Besides which Wee doe humbly acquaint your Lordships That Wee find by our Booke that there was allotted to the Trade of New England in the yeare 1690, 70 men, and there have already gone to that place by particular permision from this Port 4 shipps with 54 men, soe that there Remaines of the former Quota to be Disposed off to that Trade this yeare 16 men, to Employ which, the

And whereas a Pinck, The Two Brothers, unfree bottom, George Lawson Comander was privately in an unlawfull Port of the Colony of the Massacusetts Loading goods, and as the Petitioner has reason to believe, had unladen there, without account on her Arrivall as Law Directs whereupon the Petitioner seized and brought her to Tryall at a County Court at Boston in that Colony the 25th of August 1691 where a Jury of Experienced Merchants and Comanders of ships found the said ship and Goods forfeited to his Majesty from which Verdict and Judgement in the said Court Lawson prevailed for an appeale to the next Court of Assistants at Boston on the 1st of September following where the Petitioners reasons Entred against the Appeale shewing it's repugnancy to Law and practice of the Colony, were overuled and the former Judgment given for his Majesty reversed by a Jury, ignorant in such affairs. And whereas another Pinck, the Three Brothers, Thomas Wilkinson Commander an unfree bottom Came Directly from Cales Loaden with Fruite, Wine, Oyle, Brimpston Salt and Woollen Cloath and was on the Coast of the Massachusetts, by two Privateer Sloops, Commanded by Thomas Griffin and George Dew taken and Carried into New Hampshire, where Griffin and Dew pretended to sit as Judges of Admiralty and to Condemn and sell the said Pinck and Goods to Wilkinson and others, and with force of Armes defended the same against the Petitioner who, with great Expence and hazard of his Life and the lives of those acting with him, made at Length Seizure of the said Pinck and part of her Loading, brought the same to Tryall at a Court of assistants in Boston where the same was Cleared, though in Justice, ought to have been Condemned. From both which Verdicts and Judgments the Petitioner Appealed to His Majesty in Councill, gave 1100l. Security to prosecute

the same Effectually, And praying his Majesty to allow of the said Appeale. His Majesty in Councill was pleased to admit of the said Appeale and to Order as it is hereby Ordered That Sir William Phips their Majesties Capt. Generall and Governor in Cheife of the Province of the Massachusetts Bay in New England as also their Majestys Lieutenant and Commander in Chief of the Militia within the whole Territory and Dominion of New England to take sufficient Security (not exceeding Ealeven Thousand pounds for the Petitioners prosecuting of his said Appeale, before his Majesty in Councill, and to answer such Determination as His Majesty shall think fit to award thereon; And it is further Ordered by His Majesty in Councill That the said Sir William Phips doe give directions that all Persons be permitted without Interruption to give Evidence, or discouragement to any to give their Testimony in behalfe of the Appellant, And that all Authentick Copies of all proceedings in the said Cases and of all Depositions taken thereon be Transmitted to the Right Honorable the Lords of the Committee of Trade and Plantations under the Publique Seale of the said Province. by the Lord Baltemore and his Councill, And as to his Lordships first Demand of 12d. per Hogshead for all Tobacco exported out of that Province, I find the said Duty is part of a certain Duty of Two shillings a Hogshead for all Tobacco Exported from that Province granted by an Act of the Assembly there of the 7th of March 1671. One Moyety whereof is by the said Act appropriated to the Publique Service for the better support of the Government, and the other Moytey (which is the 12d. a Hogshead now demanded by the Lord Baltemore) is thereby granted to the Lord Baltemore, to be received by him for his owne use as Proprietor of the said Province, and that the said 12d. a Hogshead was by Order of Councill the 26th of February 1690 directed to be answered and paid to the Lord Baltemore as Proprietor of Maryland, And I do not find, that the Assembly do much contest my Lords Right to this Duty of 12d. a Hogshead in the Representation they have made to their Majesties, where they say they are with their Majesties Royall Assent ready to confirm the same to his Lordship; Provided his Lordship grant the same Conditions of Plantations, he did before the happy Revolutions, or the same that their Majesties do to the Colony of Virginia, to the Inhabitants of that Province, But what those Conditions are, it doth not appear to me otherwise then by looking into the said Act of the Assembly in 1671, by which the said

Duty was granted to the Lord Baltemore, upon condition that his Lordship should accept a pound of Tobacco instead and in lieu of every 2d. Rent at any time reserved upon any Grant of Land made by his Lordship which Condition his Lordship affirms to me, He alwaies hath, and still is ready to comply with.

As to the Second Demand of Fourteen pence per Ton for all Tobaccos Exported out of that Province, I find that by an Act of the Assembly of that Province in 1661 It was Enacted, That all Vessells whatsoever, not properly belonging to that Province having a Deck flush fore and aft, coming in, and trading within that Province should pay for Port

Dutys and Anchorage a Pound of Powder, and Three pounds of Shot, or so much in value for every Ton of Burden to the said Proprietor and his Heires.

Which Duty hath by usage been turned into Money vizt. Fourteen pence per Ton, and so answered to the Lord Baltemore, and constantly applyed to his owne use, and not to the Support of the Government, as the Lord Baltemore affirms to me, and by Order of Councill of the 26th of February 1690, This Duty of 14d. per Ton, was directed to be answered to the Lord Baltemore, as Proprietor of the Province, and likewise Instructions given Col. Copley Governor of Maryland, to permit the Lord Baltemore or his Agents to receive the same without any Disturbance or Interruption, and I conceive, that upon the Words of the Act, this Duty doth belong to my Lord Baltemore as Proprietor, to be received by him to his owne use, and it would be a Thing of dangerous Consequence to admit of Paroll Proofe of an Intention in the Lawmakers different from the Words of the Law, to say that the Duty which the Act calls a Port Duty, was intended to be a Fort Duty, And it seems to be admitted by the Assembly, that this Duty of 14d. per Ton doth by Law now belong to the Lord Baltemore, by desiring their Majesties Royall Assent to an Act to invest it in their Majestys.

As to the Demands of Fines and Amerciaments I conceive upon perusall of the Charter granted by King Charles the 1st to the Lord Baltemore, and of their Majesties Commission granted to Col. Copley to be Governor in Cheif of that Province, that the Lord Baltemore hath not a Right to the Fines and Amerciaments that have accrued since their Majesties said Commission to Col. Copley, whereby their Majesties have taken the whole Government of that Province into their owne hands, Except only Fines and Amerciaments in the Courts of any Mannor of which the Lord Baltemore is Lord; because I do not find, that Fines and Amerciaments are expresly granted to the Lord Baltemore by the Charter of King Charles the 1st so that I conceive he never had any

other Title to them, but as Governor of the Province, the Courts of Justice being held in his name, which Title is now determined by their Majesties Assumption of the Government into their owne hands, and appointing a Governor there, who by his Commission hath expresse Power granted him, to Erect Courts of Judicature for the better administration of Justice, as Occasion shall require, which Courts I conceive being erected by their Majesties Commission must be held in their Names, and are their Courts and not the Lord Baltemores, and the Fines and Amerciaments there set, will belong to their Majesties and I conceive such a Right in the Lord Baltemore to all ffines etc. would be inconsistent with that part of their Majesties Commission to the Governor of that Province, whereby he hath Power granted him of Remitting and Pardoning Fines set upon offenders, according as he shall think them fit Objects of Mercy, which he cannot do, if the Lord Baltemore be intituled to them.

As to the Demand of Waifes, Strays, Wild Horses and Wild Hogs, I conceive that such Cattle as are mentioned in the Representation to be claimed as Strays, are not in Law such, because they are marked with the Mark of the Owner, Which Mark being on Record, Every Person is obliged to take notice to whom they belong, And I do not find, that Wild Horses or Hogs are granted to the Lord Baltemore by the Charter of King Charles the 1st and therefore I conceive the Right to them is in the Crowne as being Fera naturâ, and the Property thereof in no particular Person, And tho' there be an Act of the Assembly which gives such Goods (to which no Person hath a Right) to the Lord Proprietor, yet I conceive that Act cannot take away their Majesties Right thereto, unlesse the Royall Assent had been given to such Act, which doth not appear to me, was ever obteyned.

As to the last Demand in relation to Bills, Bonds, Records and other Writings belonging to his Lordships Lands, I conceive that the Bills and Bonds, if the Fact be as 'tis affirmed to me by the Lord Baltemore, that they are his

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securitys for the severall summes of Money agreed to be paid his Lordship by the Planters, upon his granting Land to them, and that they were in his custody, and seized and taken from his servant there, upon his Lordships being discharged of the Government. The Case being so, I thinke it may be just and reasonable, that they should be restored to his Lordship again, and I do not see any Prejudice can thereby happen to the Partys by whom such Bonds or Bills were given, tho' they have not Executed their Warrants, nor had Certificates returned, for the Bonds cannot be put in suit till the Lord Baltemore hath performed the Conditions on his part.

But I conceive it proper, that the Records which are of Publique Use to preserve the Inhabitants Title to their Lands should be kept under the Custody of the Governor.

All which is humbly submitted to your Lordships great Wisedome.

The Merchants of Jamaica do further pray, that a Fireship be sent thither to Lye att the Entrance of the Chief Harbour of the Island, which would hinder the comeing in of the Enemies Shipps.

That it has been proposed to the Committee by Collonell Codrington, Governour of the Leeward Islands and others that the Men of Warr in New England and Northern Plantations instead of being laid up there all the Winter by reason of the Ice and Ill Weather may be sent to Cruise amongst the Leeward Charibee Islands or Southern Plantations, where the Weather is more Favourable in those Seasons And Convoy the Merchants Shipps from New England and the Salt Tortudos. And Whereas Wee are Informed, that the said Henry Every [and his crew] have since they Committed such acts of Piracy, left the said Ship in the Island of Providence and are arrived in Ireland in Two small Sloops, and have there dispersed themselves, some of which persons remaine there and others are come into this Kingdome and the Kingdome of Scotland, as Two of their Accomplices, who are now taken and in Custody, have Confessed and Declared [They] may probably be knowne and Discovered . . by the greate Quantityes of Gold and Silver of forreign Coynes which they have with them. The Season of the Year Approaching for the usuall Convoys to be sent to Newfoundland, We humbly take leave to lay before Your Majesty such Account of the State of that Place as We conceive necessary for the further Security and Advantage thereof.

The Importance of that Trade and Fishery being very great, to this Kingdome and severall Provisions having been made by a late Act of Parliament for the better regulating the same, We did in pursuance thereof prepare particular heads of Enquiry and Directions, which were accordingly given by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to Captain Graydon Commander in Cheif of the Squadron sent thither the last Year unto which We received Answers; And humbly Offer to Your Majesty, that it does appear to Us;

That the Inhabitants in Generall have not a due regard to the severall Regulations for the more Advantageous, Managment of the Fishery; It being found that Northward of St. Johns as far as Carbonier, and to the Southward as far as Ferryland, the Trees are Rinded and the woods Destroyed as much as before the late Act.

That the Admiralls and Masters of Ships do not Exactly abserve the Rules prescribed by Act of Parliament.

That the Vessells from Newfoundland Supply the People of Newfoundland with Provisions.

That European Commoditys are carryed Directly from France, Spain, and Portugal to Newfoundland in English Ships, contrary to Law, and Sold or Truckt, with the Traders 1702.

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from New England, for Tobacco, Sugar and other of the Enumerated Commoditys, and carryed to Forreign parts; So that at the latter end of the Year the Masters are wholy taken up in the management of that Illegall Trade, which might in some measure be prevented, had the Officer or Officers, Commanding Your Majestys Ships, Power like that of a Custome house Officer, to Seize such Goods.

That the New England Traders Seldome depart the Country, 'til the Men-of-War are first Sailed ; And then they carry with them Numbers of Handy Crafts Men, Seamen, and Fishermen, whom they Entice thither in expectation of great Wages.

That the Masters of Ships are very negligent in bringing their Men Home, whereby they save the Charge of their Passage, and those Men so left are enticed and Carryed to New England.

Against which Irregularitys, We humbly conceive it necessary that the Commander of the Convoy now going thither be directed to take Care as far as in him lyes, that upon his arrival there, the best remidys be applyed for the prevention of those Mischeifs: And that upon his Report some further Clauses be Proposed at the next Sessions of Parliament, for. the more Effectuall regulating that Trade.

As to the State of the Fortifications in St. Johns Harbor which is the Principal Place of Defence, We have already humbly represented that Stone and other Materials are wanting for compleating the same, for the Transporting of<sup>"</sup> which, We have disposed some Merchants to be Assistant. with their Ships at easy Charge; and We humbly Offer that Your Majesty would be Pleased to give the necessary, Directions therein to the Master Generall of Your Majestys Ordnance.

And Whereas there is wanting a Boom and other Materials for Floating and Fixing a Chain, which has been sent thither some time since for the Security of that Harbour; And the Officers of Your Majestys Ordnance having alleaged that the Charge thereof ought to be born by the Navy Board, and that Board (on the other side) having insisted that the Care of this Service appertains to the Board of Ordnance; We humbly Offer that Your Majesty be pleased to interpose your Directions that this necessary Service be Performed.

And it having been further Offered to Us, that it may be usefull for the better carrying on the Works there, that the Seamen on Board your Majestys Ships of War have Orders to Assist therein, dureing their Stay in those Parts, We humbly Report to Your Majesty that those Orders have been formerly given, and further Offer that they be now renewed, as likewise that such other Workmen, and what ever else may appear necessary to the Office of Ordnance for these Services, by the Informations they have received, be sent thither with the aforementioned Materials.

And Whereas Your Majesty has there one Company of Foot consisting of Eighty Men beside Officers, for whom all necessarys are Yearly sent by every Convoy; We humbly lay before Your Majesty hereunto annexed the several accounts of what appears to Us to be wanting for the Support of the said Company in Subsistance, Cloathing, and Provisions for the Provideing of which the most Speedy Orders are requisite.

In relation to the said Company, We further humbly Report that We have received from Captain Powell their Commander, severall Letters of Complaints against the Agent Imployed in Transacting for them here, As if he had not duly remitted the Subsistence Mony allowed them according to their Establishment; To which having required the said Agent to give Answer, He has Stated, and layed before Us such Accounts of his Transactions as seem to Us to be without Exception; But in Order to the more perfect Examination of those matters, We humbly Offer that Copys of all Papers relating thereunto be given to the Commander of this Years Convoy and that he be Directed to Report his Opinion thereupon and redress as far as in h<sup>\*</sup>m lyes what he shall find amiss. 1702.

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Wee likewise humbly Represent to Your Majesty, that the Commander of the Newfoundland Convoy may have the like Commission to Command in Cheif the Soldiers in Pay there as has been given the former Years.

And Whereas We have also received from the Lord Bishop of London a great Complaint of the Ill and Scandalous Usage that Mr. Jackson the Minister of St. Johns in Newfoundland hath received from Capt. Powell, and Samuell Francis his first Lieutenant and of their Proffligate Lives. which is of very Ill Example to the Soldiers, and Inhabitants of that Place, We cannot but represent to Your Majesty that one or both of them be removed from their Imployments there, and Succeeded by such as may behave themselves as they ought to do.

And Whereas Mr. John Thurston has been Imployed for three Years past in the Business of Newfoundland, relating to the Soldiers there, which has been a matter of great Trouble and some expence, for which he has as yet had no reward. We do think he may deserve the summe of One hundred Pounds in Consideration of his said Services, and Expences, and that an Allowance of Forty Pounds per Annum be allowed him for the future during the said Agency the Company there no ways contributing thereunto.

That a Boom and other Materials be sent thither for Floating and Fixing a Chain sent some time since for the Security of that Harbour. That such Workmen and what ever else may appear necessary for carrying on the works at the Fortifications there according to such Informations as the Office of the Ordnance have received be also sent thither.   - [The Council approve, and give orders in accordance with 21 May. representation] their Lordships' That his late Majesty having judged it requisite for the Generall Security of the Plantations upon the Continent of America, that they should upon occasion asist each other in proportion to their respective Abilitys; and Signification having accordingly been made to the Governors of severall Plantations of the Quota of Assistance judged requisite for the Security and Defence of the Province of New Yorke, His Majesty was pleased by His Letters of the 19th of January 1700/1 to require Colonell Nicholson Governor of Virginia to recommend to the Council and Assembly of that Colony their furnishing their Share of a Contribution for that Service.

That the said Governor did accordingly communicate to them His Majestys said Letter, and Press them to a Complyance, but found them averse, and unwilling to furnish what was expected from them.

That upon this occasion, They constituted an Agent of their own Directing him to present their Address to His late Majesty and to Sollicit an approbation of their proceedings, tho' the same ought regularly to have been transmitted thro' the hands of Your Majestys Governor there, from whom they had received his late Majesty's Directions.

That we humbly conceive it would prove of very III consequence in the Government of your Majestys Plantations if countenance should be given to this manner of Applycation, And that the Councills and Assemblys should thereby be encouraged to make Representations to your Majesty by particular Agents of their Own appointment, without the Governors Consent; Except only when those Representations containe matter of Complaint against the Governor for Male Administration, or that he refuse to transmitt or represent what they desire.

That in the present Case no applycation was made to Your Majestys Governor for transmitting the said Address, Nor is any Complaint Offered against him in Reference thereunto. On the Contrary it has been acknowledged to Us, as well by the said Agent as by other Persons considerably interrested in the Trade of that Colony, that the Governor in all his Transactions with the Assembly had done his duty and that they had nothing to Object against him.

That the said Address presented in the Name of the Councill and Burgesses of Virginia is signed only by four Members of the said Councill.

That besides the Objections against the manner of presenting the said Address, We are humbly of Opinion that the reasons therein Offered for Excusing themselves from the foresaid Contribution are Insufficient: For that the Forts at New York are so far advanced towards Canada as to be a Common Security as well to Virginia as to New Yorke and both those Provinces, tho' they lye distant from each other, have no other Barrier against the French.

We therefore humbly Offer that Your Majesty would be pleased to write your Royall Letters to the Governor of 1702.

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Virginia, taking Notice of the Irregularity of this proceeding, and againe recommending what has been already proposed for an Assistance to be given by Your Majestys Plantations on the Continent to each other; which Letters the Governor may be Ordered (as formerly) to lay before the Councill and Assembly, and use his best perswasions to encline them to a Voluntary Complyance. [pp. 132-4.]

We have thereupon Received Her Majestys Commands and do accordingly Order and direct You to Mark and sett out to the said William Wallis such Masts and Timber Trees, belonging to Her Majesty in New England as shall be requisite for this Service, and permitt him to Cutt down and fell the same and no others, In Order to be Transported and furnished by him for the Service of Her Majestys Royall Navy according to his said Contract, a Copy whereof you will herewith receive for the enabling you to prevent the making any Spoils or Wast of the Masts and Timber Trees, belonging to Her Majesty in those Parts, further then shall And so not be absolutely necessary upon this occasion. Doubting of Your ready Complyance and Especial Care herein, [p. 82.]We bid You farewell.

17 April. [868.] [The Board of Trade are directed to make Barbados and Leeward a further report upon the address of the House of Common<sup>s</sup> Islands. for applying the 4½ per cent. revenue in Barbados and the

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Leeward Islands to fortifications and other public services there.] [p. 98.]

- [The Council refer to the Ordnance for an estimate a report 17 April. of the Board of Trade as to the defences of the Leeward Islands.] [p. 99.]
- [The Board of Trade represent] That in the years 1663 and 14 May. 1664, severall Acts were past in the Island of Barbados and the Leeward Islands for raising a Duty of four and half Per Cent. upon all Dead Commoditys Exported from thence, which was in consideration of an acknowledgement of 40 Pound of Cotton per Head, and all other Dutys, Rents and Arrears of Rents due to the Proprietor, and for Quieting the Possessions, of the Inhabitants of those Islands and for a full Confirmation of their Estates and Tenures, and for holding their severall Plantations to them and their Heirs for ever in free and Common Soccage, and in Consideration also of the Great Charges necessary for maintaining the Honour and Dignity of His Majestys Authority there, the Publick Meetings of the Sessions, the Often attendance of the Councill, the Reparations of the Forts and other Publick Charges incumbent on the Government; Which Duty or Impost was Granted to King Charles the Second, His Heirs and Successors for ever, and has been from that time let to Farm or managed by the Commissioners of the Customs here under the direction of the Treasury; and as we understand has one Year with another amounted in Barbados to about ten Thousand Pound <sup>Sterling</sup> and in the Leeward Islands to about three thousand pound Sterling per Annum.

And We further humbly Report to Your Majesty that by a Report of the 24th of January last, We laid before His late Majesty the present State of Barbados in relation to its Defence, upon the Information we had received on that subject from the Lord Grey and the Agents of the Island, By which it did Appear, that upon a Strict Survey of the Fortifications by his Lordship and Commissioners appointed for that purpose, he found (in 29 Forts and Batteries) 308 Guns of severall

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Sorts, whereof 58 only were Serviceable, and that most of the Forts and Batteries were out of repair; Upon which his Lordship (having also consulted with the most experienced Inhabitants of the Island) Offered his Opinion, that such of the Forts and Batteries as may be most usefull be forthwith repaired, And that there be sent thither at least a hundred great Guns of Twelve Foot long, together with a Suitable Proportion of that and all other Ordnance Stores needfull for them; Adding that there is a want of small Arms and Shot; Whereupon We humbly Repeat Our Opinion, that such a Number of Great Guns, as your Majesty may think convenient, together with a Quantity of small Arms and Amunition, the particulars whereof (as We have received them from the Agents) are Twelve hundred Fuzils Slung, Six hundred pair of Horse Pistolls with Holsters, Six hundred horse Mens Swords, Six hundred Belts, two hundred Musketoons and a Suitable Proportion of Bullets, Flints and Cartouch Boxes for the Fire Arms be speedily sent thither, and do humbly conceive that the Duty of four and half per Cent. arrising there is Chargeable towards this Expence.

The said Agents proposing also in a Memoriall Delivered to Us, that the present Forts and Fortifications be forthwith repaired, We are humbly of Opinion that the same be done under the Direction of Commissioners to be appointed by the Governor and Councill there, and that an able Engineer be sent from hence for that purpose, together with some experienced Gunners (the Agents mention the Number of Eighteen) as likewise that Magazines be built for the better preservation of Powder and other Ordnance Stores, for which we humbly Offer that your Majesty will be pleased to allow a Competent Summe out of the said Duty.

And We further Observe that the said Agents have likewise Proposed that an Hospital be Built for the Reception and accommodation of Sick and Wounded Seamen and Soldiers, which may be done when other more pressing Services are provided for.

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We have also very lately received Letters from the President and Councill of that Island (Dated the 19th of February last) expressing the Great Alarm they had received by the arrival of a French Squadron under the Command of Monsieur Chateau renaud at Martinico, And adding that tho' the said Squadron was Sailed to Leeward they should Still continue to be under apprehensions untill a Regiment of Foot be sent thither, and that they be Supplyed with the Great Guns formerly desired as is above mentioned.

### As to the Leeward Islands.

At St. Christophers there is a Fort called Cleverly Point Fort where Twenty Guns are mounted; Brimstone Hill Fort where there are Twelve. And a Small Platform where are Six. There being also Thirty Peices of Cannon brought out of the French Part of this Island, dureing the late War; Colonel Codrington the Governor in Cheif of those Islands has given Directions, for the mounting and Placeing them with all Speed; Which being done he conceives that there is not occasion at present for more Artillery there.

At Antego are severall little Forts and Platforms; The Governor Proposes the sending thither twenty long Sakers, which may serve as well against the Indians as any other Enemy; As likewise the building a Small Fort at Parham, for which he desires Twelve Guns. He would also make a New Platform in another Place where Privateers in time of War, and unlawfull Traders in time of Peace are very busy. He informs Us that they very much Want small Arms, Adding that those Arms which have been sent to those Islands from the Tower were Slight and of no Service.

At Nevis, He represents the want of New Carriages for the Guns, and desires further four long Sakers; Six Guns Twelve Pounders; and six Eighteen Pounders, with a sufficient quantity of shott for them, and five hundred Saker shot for the Guns already in the Fort and Platforms; together with Twenty Barrills of Canon Powder. And Six hundred Fire locks having been lately sent to this Island, for as many

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Matchlocks returned from thence, We are humbly of Opinion that upon the Receipt thereof, they will be Sufficiently provided with small Arms for the present.

As to Mountserrat We have no Account from the Governor of any Wants. Upon all which We humbly Offer that such part of this duty of four half per Cent. as Your Majesty shall direct be applyed towards the supply of these Demands.

And upon the whole, We further humbly propose, that Your Majesty would be pleased to send Your Royall Letters to the Governors of Barbados, and of the Leeward Islands to use their best endeavours to encline those Assemblys to continue the Publick Levies for the more Effectuall carrying on and Compleating the Services abovementioned and others conduceing to the Safety of those Islands. [The Council refer it to the Lord High Treasurer to consider what relates to the supplying money for the several demands therein mentioned, and to the Ordnance for an estimate of the stores required in addition to those ordered on 17 April.] [pp. 125-8.]

the Advance of one Quarters Sallary, And that the Residue of the said Three Thousand Five hundred Pounds be laid out in Fire Arms, and such Ammunition as is most wanted in that Island, as also that the remaining Sume of Two Thousand Pounds be Employed towards making good the Demands of Your Majestys Governor of the Leeward Islands, as far as it will Reach by a Proportionable quantity of each Species, and Especially of Fire Arms and the necessary Ammunition, and that as there shall be any further produce of the same Revenue over and above the Yearly Sume of One Thousand Pounds payable to the Heirs and Assignes of the Earl of Kinoul Your Majestys do give Order for the particular Application thereof from time to time as shall be found most requisite upon future Reports to be made to Your Majestys from Your Governors and Councills there.

Provided always that Your Majestys favour herein be not construed or extended in any manner to diminish or set aside Your Majestys Right and Title to the three lower Counties upon Delaware River adjoyning to Pennsylvania, And we further humbly take this occasion to pray Your Majestys Order to the said William Pen, that he be Oblidged to returne a speedy answer in writing to the four Queries delivered to him by Us in May last; The same very much importing the Good of the Trade and Settlement of those and the neighbouring parts. 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Majestys Governor in Cheif of the said Province, that in Case the said Allen shall be opposed by the Inhabitants and hindred from Entring quietly into Possession of the said Waste Lands or that he be Disturbed in the Possession thereof, Whereupon any Tryall or Tryalls shall be brought before Your Majestys Courts there for Setling the Title to the said Wast Lands, and that on such Tryall or Tryalls the said Allen do insist that the matters of Fact be Specially found by the Juries, Hee the said Governor in Cheif do all that in him lyes that the matters of Fact be specially found accordingly. And further that Exemplifications of the Entries of all Proceedings and other Papers, relating to the Setling of the Title to the said Lands be Delivered, under the Seal of the Province, to the Parties desireing the same To the end that upon an Appeal or Appeals from the Judgements thereupon given to your Majesty in Councill Your Majesty may be fully Informed of those matters, in Order to a finall Determination thereof. As to Barbados and the Leeward Islands, the  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. duty amounts one year with another to about 10,000l. in Barbados, and 3,0001. in the Leeward Islands :] For the Disposition whereof an humble Address was likewise presented to Your Majesty by the late house of Commons that the same (Subject to an Annuity payable to the Heirs of the Earl of Kinowle) be applyed for the repairing and Errecting such Fortifications and other Publick Uses for the Safety of the said Islands as Your Majesty shall Direct.

That out of the said Duty in Barbados there has hitherto been Assigned Twelve hundred pounds Sterling per Annum Salary to the Governors of that Island ; But that Sume having been Judged not Sufficient for their Support, they have been

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permitted from time to time to receive Presents from the Assemblys, and considerable Sums have accordingly been raised by Publick Levies, For the Preventing of which Practice, We humbly propose that Your Majesty would be pleased to Add the sume of Eight hundred pounds Sterling per Annum, out of the said Duty of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per Cent, to the present Salary of the Governor of that Island ; which by such Addition will amount to Two Thousand pound Sterling, and may be a Competent Maintenance for that Governor without dependance on the People.

And We humbly Offer that upon the Establishment of Two Thousand pound per Annum as aforesaid, Your Majesty do Signifie Your Express Pleasure that no Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Commander in Cheif, or President of the Councill of Barbados for the time being, do hereafter receive any Gift or Present from the Assembly; And likewise that no Assembly do make any such Gift or Present to him or any of them upon any Account whatsoever; except only that there being no House appointed or set apart for the Governor, and it having been Customary for the Assemblys to make a Temporary Assignment of a House, or Rent for the same, out of the Publick Levies; Your Majesty may be Graciously pleased to permitt the Assembly to Assign such a House, or Rent for the same not exceeding Three hundred pounds Sterling per Annum, out of the Publick Levies, And to allow the Governor to accept thereof, notwithstanding what has been before Offered, untill a House be built for him: Provided always that this be done at the first Session of the Assembly after such Governors arrivall, or Receipt of Your Majestys Order in this behalfe, And that it be Assigned him for the whole time of his Government.

And We do thereupon humbly observe, that the foresaid Increase of Salary being Supplyed by Your Majesty out of the Duty of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per Cent. The Assembly of Barbados (and other Assemblys in the like Case, will have an opportunity and be in a condition of Applying those large Sums which

they usually gave in Presents, by Yearly Levies, to their Governors, towards such other Publick uses as may be most necessary for the Defence and Safety of those Plantations. And We humbly conceive that in Consideration of Your Majestys Goodness in exempting them from this Customary Burden of Presents, they may be the more easily induced to contribute in such other manner to their own preservation.

As to the Government in the Leeward Islands, We likewise humbly Represent to Your Majesty that the present Salary of the Governor in Cheif, arising out of the said Duty of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per Cent. there, being no more then Seven hundred pounds Sterling, The Insufficiency thereof has been the reason (as in Barbados) that the Governors have been permitted to receive Presents from the Assemblys of those Islands : And We therefore humbly Propose that Your Majesty be pleased to add the Sume of Five hundred pounds Sterling per Annum out of the said Duty of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per Cent there, to the present Salary of the Governor in Cheif, which by that Addition will amount to Twelve hundred pounds Sterling, and may be a Competent maintenance for him.

And Whereas besides the Governor in Cheif of all the Leeward Islands there are particular Lieut. Governors of each of the said Islands, vizt. of St. Christophers, Antego, Nevis, and Mountserrat, who have no Established Salarys; We humbly conceive that if Your Majesty would be pleased to appoint the Sume of Two hundred pounds Sterling Per Annum to each of them out of the said Duty of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per Cent., if Your Majesty shall so think fitt, It would likewise be for Your Majestys Service and the Interest of this Kingdome in referrence to Trade, and otherwise, in Freeing such Lieutenant Governors from their Obligation to the Assemblys; Whereby Your Majesty may be likewise enabled to send from England fit Persons for those Commands as there may be occasion.

And We thereupon humbly Offer that the same Injunctions be Signified to the Governor, Lieutenant Governors Presidents and Assemblys of the Leeward Islands, as to the Governor 1703.

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and Assembly of Barbados, with the like Exception that the Governor in Cheif and Lieutenant Governors be permitted to accept of a House, or Rent for the same from the severall Assemblys in the same manner as proposed for Barbados.

As to Jamaica, there being an Established Salary for the Governor of Two Thousand per Annum currant Mony of that Island, out of the Revenue arrising there for the Support of that Government, We humbly Offer that the same be made up out of the said Revenue, Two Thousand five hundred pounds of such Currant Mony, which may amount to about Two Thousand pounds Sterling; And that the like Directions be given herein as in Barbados and the Leeward Islands; Excepting only what relates to a house, Your Majesty having already a House there convenient for the Residence of the Governor.

As to the Bermuda Islands there being a hundred and Sixty pounds per Annum, Settled by Your Majesty for the Support of the Governor out of the Shares of Land and Licences for Whale Fishing there, and the further Sume of Two hundred and Forty Pound out of Your Majestys Exchequer making in all four hundred pound Sterling; We humbly conceive that the Addition of a hundred pounds per Annum more out of the Exchequer may inable him to Support himself in that Government without Presents from the assembly.

The Sallary of Your Majestys Governor of Virginia being Two Thousand pounds Sterling per Annum, We conceive the same sufficient for his Maintenance without receiving any Presents from the Assembly.

As to the Government of Maryland, We find the constant Revenue arising by the Two Shillings per hhd. upon Tobacco exported, to have amounted in the Year 1701 to about Three Thousand Two hundred pounds; One Moyety whereof is belonging to the Lord Proprietor, And the other Moyety being for the support of the Government, One 4th part thereof i<sub>3</sub> by Act of Assembly to be Applyed to the buying of Arms, and the other  $\frac{3}{4}$ ths amounting to Twelve hundred pounds is

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applicable to the Governors Salary ; Besides which an Act was past upon the Arrivall of the last Governor in Maryland for raising a Revenue of 3 pence per Hhd. as an Additional allowance to him for his better maintenance dureing his Government, which may amount to five hundred pounds per Annum more, And there being no House in Maryland for his Reception, We humbly conceive Your Majesty may allow the Assembly to repass the like Act for the better maintenance of the present Governor, provided the same be for an Unlimitted time, or dureing his Government, And that the said Governor be not permitted to receive any Present or Gratification from the Assembly upon any Account whatsoever.

The Sallary Established to be payd out of Your Majestys Revenue in New Yorke to that Governor, being no more than Six hundred pounds Sterling per Annum, which is no ways Sufficient ; And that Defect having been hitherto Supplyed by Presents from the Assembly, We humbly Offer that Six hundred pounds more may be added to it out of the said Revenue, which Twelve hundred pound may be a Competency for his Support. And upon the Settlement thereof We humbly propose, That the like Directions be given in New York in reference to Presents as for other Colonys.

As to the Province of New Jersey which has been lately brought under Your Majestys immediate Government, and the Lord Cornbury constituted Governor of the same, as of New Yorke ; We conceive the Assembly there ought to Settle a constant and fixt allowance for the maintenance of their Governors, as also of the Lieutenant Governor who is to be resident there.

As to the Province of the Massachusetts Bay, which is a Charter Government, The Inhabitants have been always <sup>averse</sup> to any Complyance with the Directions that have been frequently sent from hence for Settling a fixed Revenue for the support of that Government or the Governor, and upon applycation made to the Councill and Assembly by Colonell

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Dudley your Majestys Present Governor, pursuant to Your Majestys Instructions to him, They have wholly declined the same, persisting in their usuall way of making only Temporary Provisions for the Charge of the Government whereby they have kept Your Majestys Governors there in a continual dependance upon them for Voluntary Presents, which to the Present Governor have been as yett very Inconsiderable.

Whereupon We humbly Offer that Your Majesty would be pleased by a Letter under Your Royall Sign Manuall, directed to the Councill of that Province, to be Communicated likewise to the Assembly to require them that in consideration of the great Priviledges they Enjoy, they do Settle a constant allowance Suitable to the Character and Dignity of that Government, without Limitation of time, upon the Governor; together with a fitting Provision for the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Cheif for the time being; In which Letter it may be intimated to them that if they neglect this opportunity of Complying with Your Majestys just expectations, Your Majesty will be oblidged to have recourse to such Remedies as may be proper and Effectuall, in Order to a due Provision herein.

As to New Hampshire, where no certaine Provision has yett been made, We conceive there ought likewise to be a fitting Salary, without Limitation of time, raised by the Assembly; And We humbly Offer that Directions be given accordingly.

As to the Proprietary and Charter Colonys, vizt. Rhode Island, Connecticutt, Pennsylvania, Carolina, and the Bahama Islands, We cannot propose any thing upon this occasion; The Governors of those Colonys not being appointed by Your Majesty, and depending either upon the Proprietors or the People from whom they have very mean and uncertaine Salarys; Which Incourages them to connive at unlawfull Trade, and other Irregularitys inconsistent with the Interest of this Kingdome, which great mischief can only be remedyed, as We humbly conceive by reduceing these Colonys to an immediate dependance on the Crowne. [*pp.* 353–356.]

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[Ten letters to colonial governors in accordance with this 17 April. order are submitted and approved—P.R.]. [p. 360.]

[897.] [A representation from the Board of Trade of 20 March. 19 March as to stores for Newfoundland is ordered to be put Newfoundland. in the hands of the Earl of Nottingham who is to see that the Admiralty, Treasury and other officials are notified to provide and send to Newfoundland the several particulars.] [p. 337.]

[Directions are ordered to be given to Lord Cornbury [898.] in accordance with a representation from the Board of Trade] Setting forth that by Letters and Papers lately received from the Lord Cornbury they are Informed, That the Forts in that Province are in a Ruinous condition, That his Lordship is rebuilding the Fort at Albany, and desirous to put the other Forts in a better State of Repair, Whereupon the said. Commissioners humbly Offer that the Lord Cornbury may be Ordered to use his best Endeavors with the Assembly to dispose them to make Suitable Provisions for repairing the Old and Erecting the New Fortifications, as he shall judge necessary, which together with the Quotas of the Neighbouring Plantations, wherein the said Lords Commissioners are humbly of Opinion, Her Majesty may be pleased to renew Her Majestys Directions, may be Applyed to this Worke, That the Militia of the Province is in a very Ill State, whereupon their Lordships humbly Offer, that among the Acts which the Lord Cornbury had Transmitted, there being one for the better Settling the said Militia and makeing it more usefull, His Lordship be Directed to take Care that it be duly Executed and that in Case the said Act be found by Experience to be Defective he move the Assembly that further Provision <sup>be</sup> made for that purpose, That the Lord Cornbury having had a Conference at Albany with the Cheif Sachims of the Five Nations of Indians, Bordering upon New York, had made them Presents as usuall in Order to confirm them in their Submission to Her Majesty, The said Lords Commissioners

are humbly of Opinion that the usuall Method of Engaging

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them by Presents be continued, and Especially as any extraordinary Occasion may require, That the Lord Cornbury having Informed the said Lords Commissioners that he found things in great Disorder, the Animositys between Partys being very high, Their Lordships humbly Report that having Recommended to his Lordship as well as to former Governors, the Endeavoring to reconcile all Partys, His Lordship Assures them he has accordingly applyed themselves to the Worke and will continue to do soe without exposing any party further then Her Majestys Service, and the Rules of Justice do oblidge him. [The governors and proprietors of adjacent plantations are also to be required to furnish their respective quotas for the assistance of New York.] [p. 343.]

[It is also referred to the Earl of Nottingham to give directions in accordance with the representation of the Board of Trade on Lord Cornbury's letters]—

That as to the Four Foot Companys, which ought to consist of four hundred Private Soldiers, besides Officers, There were not in his owne Company more then 76 Men; In Major Ingoldsbys Company 84 Men, and in Capt. Weems's Company 92 Men; so there are wanting 68 Men for the Compleating of the said Companys which his Lordship desires may be recruited.

In relation to the Cruits demanded by his Lordship for the Four Companys We find by the accompts layd before Us, that besides what is due from the Executors of the Earl of Bellomont there is remaining in the hands of Capt. Nanfan late Lieut. Governor of New York, the Sume of five hundred and Ten pounds for Respitts, from the 9th of March 1700, untill the 8th of May 1702, and in the Lord Cornburys hands, Two hundred Thirty Eight pounds for respitts from the 9th of May 1702, untill the 24th of December following, whereof a particular Accompt may be made up in the Pay Office; Which Respitts We humbly propose may be Applyed towards recruiting the said four Companys, and together with what shall appear to be further due from the Pay Office upon the

Clearings of those Companys (which We judge to be very requisite) may be Imployed, So far forth as the same is Applicable to this Service, towards providing Arms, Accoutrements and other necessarys which they stand in need of, according to the particulars hereunto annexed. [p. 344.]

[The Council also refer to the Lord Treasurer part of the representation recommending that Lord Cornbury should endeavour to induce the Assembly to make suitable provision for repairing old and creating new fortifications, that the respites mentioned in the last Order should be used as far as possible to provide for defence, and reporting that only 500l. out of 2500l. ordered for the assistance of New York by his late Majesty had been remitted: The Council also refer to the Lord High Admiral that part in which Lord Cornbury states] That the Earl of Bellomont having formerly contracted for a Parcell of Masts and Some Timber for the use of the Royall Navy, and a Vessell called the Benjamin, sent by the Commissioners of the Navy to fetch the same being lately arrived at New Yorke, he had upon Examination into the Condition of those Masts, found them to be Serviceable but not of the Demensions agreed for; And having thereupon prevailed with the Contractor to abate considerably of the Price, he had caused them to be put on Board the foresaid Vessell, together with so much of the Timber as was at New Yorke, adding that there was more Timber lying in the woods which should be brought downe as soon as the Frost was hard enough to bear a Sledge but could not be done sooner . . and proposals from the Lord Cornbury touching such naval stores as may be provided from New York]. [*pp.* 345–6.7 [A representation of the same date setting forth] That as to the Five Nations of Indians Bordering upon New York, least the Intreagues of the French of Canada and the Influence of their Preists who frequently Converse and sometimes Inhabit with those Indians, should debauch them from Her Majestys Allegiance, Their Lordships are humbly

of Opinion that besides the usuall Method of Engaging the

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said Indians by Presents, another means to prevent the Influence of the French Missionarys upon them, and thereby more Effectually to Secure their Fidelity, would be that Two Protestant Ministers be appointed with a Competent allowance to Dwell amongst them, in Order to Instruct them in the true Religion and Confirme them in their Duty to Her Majesty [is referred to the Archbishop of Canterbury to do what he shall think best. As to the ruinous state of the defences of New York, as reported by Lord Cornbury, it is referred to the Ordnance to consider the lists forwarded by the Governor and furnish an estimate of the stores which he thinks requisite—if not 60 cannon, 1000 firelocks and 200 barrels of powder as requested, at least one third the number of cannon and one half of the other stores.] [pp.346-7.]

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. [The Ordnance estimate—5568*l*. 1s. 6*d*.—is returned, and notice being taken of the great sums lately expended on stores of war for the plantations, the report and estimate is ordered to be laid before her Majesty by the Earl of Nottingham at a fitting opportunity to consider of the proper method of defraying such charges.] [*p*. 377.]

24 April. Massachusetts Bay and New Hampshire.

[899.] [The Council approve, and direct urgent letters to be sent to the Governor of Massachusetts Bay and New Hampshire in accordance with a representation from the Lords of Trade] laying before Her Majesty the last Account they have received from Colonell Dudley, Governor of the Provinces of the Massachusetts Bay and New Hampshire in New England relating to the State of Defence of those Provinces and other adjacent parts, and humbly Offering to Her Majesty that the Orders formerly given that the Assembly of New Hampshire be urged in the most pressing manner to do their utmost for their owne preservation and particularly in keeping the Fort at Pescataway in good repair be reinforced to which Charge also their Lordships humbly conceive the Assembly of the Massachusetts Bay be in like manner Exhorted to contribute, and that the Orders formerly sent requireing the said Assembly of the Massachusetts Bay to Exert their utmost Endeavors

in providing for their owne Preservation particularly in Building the Fort at Pemaquid and furnishing their other Fortifications and Stores with necessarys be likewise Reinforced. [p. 365.]

[It is referred to the Lord High Admiral to give directions upon Colonel Dudley's proposal, also included in the same representation] that a fourth rate Frigatt may be added to the fifth Rate now attending her Majestys Service in those parts, with which if no greater Force of Shiping be sent him, he hopes to doe some considerable Service, The People of New England Commissionated by him having already (as he represents) been very successful in their undertakings at Sea against the French. [p. 365.]

[It is referred to the Ordnance to consider the representation as to the defences of New England and to return an estimate of the stores therein mentioned. Colonel Romer, chief engineer in Massachusetts, had particularised 50 cannon of 18 to 24 pound ball shot: 2 mortars: grenades and bullets in proportion: 4000 hand grenades with fusees: 600 firearms, 400 heads for half pikes, and two master gunners and a bombardier. Colonel Dudley reports that the French had 400 men at Port Royal in Nova Scotia, and expected more, besides 200 Indians, listed, clothed, and armed. The Board of Trade propose to send 50 barrels of powder with small arms and appurtenances to New Hampshire, and 20 cannon and 2 mortars with bullet and shot proportionable to Massachusetts Bay.] [p. 365.]

[It is referred to the Earl of Nottingham to bring before her Majesty, when the squadron for the West Indies shall be going thither, the representation of the Board of Trade on Colonel Dudley's proposal to destroy Port Royal by sending three or four men of war with the assistance of some of the people of New England for the land part. Colonel Dudley also reports] that upon Intimation of an Invasion intended by the French and Indians by Land he had prevailed with the Assembly to agree to an Act for Listing every 4th Man in the Province to be ready Armed and Cloathed fit for a March in Twenty four houres. [The Council approve the compromise effected by the Committee, who report that Knights appealed from three decrees], the one made the 18th day of June 1684 in favor of John Woodward Merchant, against Colonell John Hallett, Richard Hallett and Christopher Fowler, Executors of Benjamin Knights late of Barbados in Trust for the Appellant, one other made the said 18th day of June 1684, in favor of Enoch Woodward against the Executors in Trust as aforesaid for the Appellant, and the other made the 6th day of August 1685, in favor of William Chester Executor of the said John Woodward, against Thomas du Boiss Attorney of Francis Bond Esqr. who was Attorney of the Executors in Trust as aforesaid for the Appellant, and having heard the

Partys concerned therein with their Councill Learned, and both the said Partys Declareing before the said Committee to be content that the said Decree made the 6th day of August 1685, stand confirmed by Her Majesty and that the two other Decrees made the 18th of June 1684, be reversed by Her Majesty and the Appellant lett into Possession of Twenty two Acres of Land in Barbados, late of the said Benjamin Knights, Extended by Force of the said Decrees, upon the Appellant's paying the Sume of Two hundred and Nineteen pounds ten shillings and Seven pence to John Edgington and Sarah his Wife Executors of William Chester Junr. Son and Heir and Executor of William Chester Senr. Deceased who was [pp. 386 and 392.] Executor of the said John Woodward.

[901.] [On reading a representation from the Board of Trade with the draft of a commission for John Usher as Lieut.-Governor of New Hampshire, and] the Petition of Major William Vaughan on behalfe of himselfe and other Inhabitants of the Province of New Hampshire . . . praying that the said Commission be Stopt, and that no Letter may be Writt to put Mr. Allen into the Possession of any Wast Lands till the Petitioner be heard by His Councill, [the petition is referred to the Board of Trade and Mr. Usher's commission is not to pass the Great Seal till her Majesty's further pleasure be known]. [p. 373.]

[The Council approve, and give orders in accordance with 10 June. the report of the Board of Trade]:—That Mr. Usher does not appear to Us to have been Guilty of the mismanagements and misdemeanors layd to his Charge by the Petitioner, dureing his being Lieutenant Governor there : But that the Disturbances which happened in that time did in great measure proceed from the disorderly Practices of some of those Men, who now oppose his being restored by Your Majesty to that Government.

And Whereas those Disorders seem to have arisen from the Difference in Point of Interest between the present Possessors of the Lands and Samuell Allen Esqr. the

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Generall Proprietor of that Country, to whom the said Usher is nearly related. We are humbly of Opinion that, upon the said Ushers receiving your Majestys Commission of Lieutenant Governor, he may likewise have special Directions not to intermeddle in any manner whatsoever with the appointing of Judges or Juries, or otherwise, in matters relating to the Disputes between the said Allen and the Inhabitants of that Province, but that Your Majesty do Impower and require Colonell Dudley Governor in Cheif of this Province to give all necessary Directions in those matters, and to appoint the Judges and other Officers that shall be concerned in transacting this particular business; By which means all pretence of partiality in the Execution of that Government relating to the said Differences will be taken away. [p. 398.]

Instructions for Governors Dudley and Usher in this

matter are approved.—P.R.]

[905.] [The Council approve, and give orders in accordance with, the report of the Board of Trade of 7 July]:-Having had under consideration the Great Inconveniencys arrising from the Different Rates at which foreign Coins do pass in Your Majestys Plantations in America, and particularly upon a Complaint that the Advanceing the Rates of Coin in Pensylvania much higher than in other Places has drawn away the Money from Maryland, and does tend greatly to the Prejudice of that Province: And finding accordingly that there is an Act in Pennsylvania appointing the Rate of Money or Coin within that Province, whereby Peices of Eight and Dollars of fifteen penny weight are made currant at Seven Shillings per peice, and that for every penny weight under or over there is to be abated or advanced four pence per peice, So that a Peice of Eight of Seventeen penny weight and a half (which is the due weight) is made currant  ${

- [The Committee for Appeals agree to report to Her Majesty] That Mr. Atturny and Mr. Sollicitor General having Reported that the said Charter as proposed is to Incorporate Mr. Byfeild with Eleven Persons more by name, and all others concerned with them to Carry on a Generall Trade to the Plantations in America without any Clause obliging the Petitioners to Apply themselves to the Importation of Navall Stores from thence except for two years, So that the Charter may be made use of only to Carry on a Generall Trade to the Plantations for Private advantage, and not to Supply Her Majesty and her Subjects with Navall Stores, Whereupon they doe not See any reason to Incorporate the Petitioners for the Plantation Trade, unless they be obliged to Import Navall Stores in time of War when they may be Imported without loss as the Petitioners alledge they cannot be in time of Peace, the Freight being then of greater Value then the Goods will be if Imported from Sweeden. That all that is Proposed in the Draught as to Navall Stores is that the Company be Impowered to make Pitch, Tarr, Rosin and Turpentine in the Plantations, which others may now make, and that they

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be Obliged to Import from thence in the First Year 200 Barrills of Pitch and 400 Barrills of Tarr; In the Second 400 Barrells of Pitch and 800 Barrells of Tarr which is mentioned in the Bond annexed to the Draught, but not in the Charter to be the Produce of the Plantations, unless prevented by Casualtys at Sea, Enemys or other inevitable Accidents and if they cannot have them in the Plantations that will be an Inevitable Accident. That there is no Obligation after the first two Years to Import Navall Stores, Nor to Sell those that are to be Imported to Her Majesty, nor are they Obliged to Import Masts, the One reason given for making the Corporation, is for that the American Plantation abound in Pine Trees in those Parts fitt for the Navy. Wherefore it is to be Apprehended that the Errecting such a Corporation will be prejudiciall to the rest of Her Majestys Subjects Trading to the Plantations. That by the said Draught Notice is taken that the Twelve Persons therein Named with Divers others had for severall Years Carryed on a Joynt Trade to Pensylvania, Carolina and other Parts of America with a Joynt Stock of 20,000l. which said 20,0001. is Declared to be the Capitall Stock of the said Company which Recitall will give great Countenance to the Practices that have been of late, of Great Numbers of Persons to Joyne together in Trade, and Act as a Corporation without Her Majestys Charter which is Illegall, and that it will be presumed that Her Majesty has had full Satisfaction that the present Stock is 20,000*l*. That in the said Draught it is Provided that the Company shall not Carry Navall Stores from the Plantations to any Country or Place other then Her Majestys Dominions, without Her Majestys or the Lord High Admiralls Licence, Which Mr. Atturny and Mr. Sollicitor Generall are of Opinion is against the Act: 22: Car: 2; whereby all Goods of the Produce of the Plantations are to be brought That the Persons Interested in the Directly to England. Company object against the Power reserved to Her Majesty by the said Draught to Determine the Corporation by Order in Councill, if they misuse the Power to be Granted them, and

make them Grievous to any if Her Majestys Subjects, or prejudiciall to the rest of the Traders or Inhabitants in the Plantations, alledging that it will be hard on them to be lyable to be Determined on less then Three Years Notice to gett in their Estate, Whereupon Mr. Atturny and Mr. Sollicito. Generall are of Opinion that if such Charter shall be Granted to Reserve a Power to Determine it, if the Company shall not make themselves usefull to Her Majesty and her Kingdome in Importing Navall Stores. That the Petitioners Absolutely Refuse to be Obliged to Import Pitch and Tarr in time of War other than for Two Years, or to furnish Her Majesty with any Certaine Quantity unless Her Majesty shall Agree to take them at a Certaine Price, But Declare themselves willing to give Her Majesty the Refusall 1800 Barrells of Pitch and Tarr, and what other Quantitys they shall Import at the Markett Price, Her Majestys Officers Declareing their Acceptance or Refusall within a reasonable time after Tender. Which Report having been Communicated to the Petitioners they have Represented in Answer thereunto. That they are willing the said 1800 Barrells of Pitch and Tarr be Exprest to be of the Produce of the Plantations. That the said Draught may be so altered, That their not being able to procure Navall Stores in the Plantations be not Allowed as An Inevitable Accident but that they be Obliged to Ship the said Quantity in Order to be Imported into England. That they never proposed to Import Masts tho' they have good Prospect that they may be Able to Effect it. That their present Stock was 20,0001. : and they have Exported Great Quantitys of Woollen Manufactures of England and Imported great quantitys of the Produce of the Plantations without having been Complained of as prejudiciall to any other Traders, and they have very near their first Stock, But they are Willing the Recitall thereof be left out, That as to their being Obliged not to Carry Navall Stores from the Plantations to any Place other than Her Majestys Dominions without Licence, if such Licence be not Lawfull, they are willing the

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same be left out. That they are Willing to be Disolved on Three Years Notice upon Misdemeanor or Misuser, But hope their Trade Interferring with others, or their not being useful to Her Majestv or the Kingdome in Importing Navall Stores, may not be a Sufficient Cause of such Disolution. That they are willing to be Obliged to Import a Sufficient Quantity Yearly for ever at such a Price as not to be loosers by it. That they are willing to give Her Majesty the Refusall of all the Pitch and Tarr they Import, Her Majestys Officers Declareing their Acceptance or Refusall within a reasonable time after They remark, that the Pitch and Tar Imported from Tender. Sweeden is pavd for with ready Money whereas what shall be Imported from the Plantations will be payd for with the produce and Manufacture of England. That they think they cannot Answer the Intent of the Government without a Charter, without which they shall Desist. Whereupon the Petitioners being heard before the Committee, they persisted in the severall Articles proposed by the said Draught, except what alterations they agreed to in their Answer and Particularly to be Incorporated with Power to Trade Generally to the Plantations, except further that they Agreed that Her Majesty by Order in Councill might Disolve them upon Misdemeanor or Misuser upon One Years Notice if the same shall be found prejudiciall to the rest of Her Majestys Subjects, And Provided Power might be Continued to them for the Recovery of Whereupon the Committee having Referred the their Debts. said Draught with the Report of Mr. Atturny and Sollicitor Generall and the Petitioners Answer to the Consideration of the Commissioners of the Customes, and Particularly the Clause in the said Draught, Empowering them to Carry on a Generall Trade to the Plantations; The Commissioners of the Customes have Reported, That having heard some of the Petitioners One of the Principall Merchants Concerned and Disowned and Quitted all his Pretentions thereunto, as they have understood some others have also done. That some very Considerable Merchants who have perused and Considered

the said Draught and Report, have Offered by Memorial under their hands to Deliver a larger Quantity of Pitch and Tarr at Reasonable Rates and in a Lesser time without any That upon the Discourse they have had with the Charter. Petitioners and others, they are Inclined to believe That the Charter desired is designed more for a Private advantage than for any real Service to the Publick in the pretended Importation of Navall Stores at Cheaper Rates than they can be had from particular Merchants and therefore can by no means think it adviseable to Incorporate them under such a Specious Pretence of serving the Government with Navall Stores from the Plantations, being assured that other very responsable Merchants will undertake it at better and Easier Terms to the Government. Which Report together with the Memorialls of Mr. Renew and other Considerable Merchants Proposing to Engage at reasonable Rates to Deliver a larger quantity of Pitch and Tarr in a lesser time without any Charter, having been read to the Petitioners at the Committee, they continued to Insist upon a Charter, without which they would not Engage in this matter. That Upon the whole matter the

By the first of which Acts it is Enacted, that if any Popish Bishop, Priest or Jesuit, shall Baptize any Child or Children other than such who have Popish Parents, or shall say Mass or Exercise the Function of a Popish, Bishop or Priest, within the said Province, or shall Endeavour to perswade any of your Majestys Subjects to imbrace the Romish Religion, and shall thereof be Legally Convict, shall forfeit the Sume of Fifty pounds Sterling for every such Offence, and suffer Six Months Imprisonment; That if any such Popish Bishop, Priest, or Jesuit, shall After such Conviction say Mass or Exercise any other part of the Office or Function of a Popish Bishop, or Priest; Or if any Priest or other Person professing the Popish Religion, shall keep School, or take upon themselves the Education of Youth, such Person shall upon Conviction be Transported to England in Order to his Suffering such Pains as are Provided by the Statute of the 11th and 12th Year of the Reigne of his late Majesty King William Entituled, An Act for the further preventing the Growth of Popery. And to the end that Protestant Children of Popish Parents may not in the life time of such their Parents for want of fitting Maintenance be necessitated, in Compliance with their Parents to Embrace the Popish Relegion contrary to their owne Inclination, It is further Enacted, That the Governor or Keeper of the Great Seal for the time being do make such Order therein as shall be Agreeable to the intent and meaning of the said Act.

By the Second Act, which is for Suspending part of the former Act, It is Enacted, That no Popish Bishop, Priest or Jesuit, shall be prosecuted by Vertue of the former Act for Exercising his Function in a Private Family of the Roman Communion untill the full end, and expiration of Eighteen Months from the Publication of this Law, or untill Your Majestys Pleasure be Declared therein. All the other Clauses in the other Act being to remain in full force and Vertue, any thing in this Act to the Contrary notwithstanding.

Having Considered of both which Acts, and advised thereupon with the Right Reverend Father in God the Lord Bishop of London, to whom the Care of Ecclesiastical matters in the Plantations do's belong, We humbly Offer Our joynt Opinion, That Whereas the first Act will forbid the Exercise of the Popish Religion even in Private Familys, tho' in the most inoffensive manner, Which We humbly conceive is not Your Majesty's Gracious Intention And that the Rigorous Execution of the said Act would in a great Measure tend to Depopulate, That Your Majesty's profitable Colony, Considering also that the Design of this Law was only to restrain the Exorbitant Practices of the Romish Clergy, which were Increasing in Maryland, Your Majesty would therefore be Graciously pleased by Your Royall Letter to Direct the Governor of Maryland to Represent to the Assembly of that Province, That the Second Act beforementioned vizt. We further humbly Represent to Your Majesty that the Boom which by Your Majestys Order, and the Care of the Office of Ordnance was placed at the Entrance of St. Johns Harbour has been also Damnified by the French, for the Repairing whereof and rendring the same more Serviceable there will be wanting the particulars also hereunto annexed.

Particulars of what is wanting for the Boom that is Cross the Entrance of the Harbour of St. Johns Newfoundland.

Three 5 Inch hasers instead of those that the French destroyed.

One Anchor of 10 hundred Weight.

And Whereas we understand, That severall of Your Majestys Subjects were taken out of the Harbours at Newfoundland and out of severall Vessells there by the French, some of which are detained Prisoners at Placentia, and others sent to Canada or France, We humbly Offer, That Your Majestys particular Directions be given for Remanding or Exchangeing the said Prisoners not only as they are Your Majestys Subjects but Persons well versed in that Trade and Fishery.

And Whereas it is necessary for the better Security of Newfoundland that a Militia be settled there, We humbly Offer that your Majesty by Your Royall Declaration to be Published by the Commodore, to Constitute such and so many Militia Officers in the respective Harbours there, as shall be found most Conduceing to Your Majesty's Service and the Security of the Land : The said Officers to Inlist the Inhabitants of their respective Harbours, and Discipline them in the best manner they can, and to Appoint a Constant Watch to be kept the Winter Season, for the prevention of any Surprizes.

We further humbly Offer that the Officers of the Garrison of St. Johns be Strictly Prohibited from Trading for that they may have Oppertunitys of Engrossing the Trade to themselves and forestalling the Markett, to the great Discouragement of the Merchants and Fishermen.

And We likewise humbly Represent, that the Prize Officer there be for the same reasons prohibitted to Trade otherwise

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than according to such Instructions as he shall Receive from the Commissioners of Prizes here, for the Disposall of such Ships and goods as shall be brought as Prize into Newfoundland. [pp. 105-6.]

That upon the present occasion we have discoursed with severall Persons lately come from thence, and particularly with John Graves late Collector of Your Majestys Customes there, who had lived many Yeares there and was taken Prisoner. in the Disolation of those Islands who has acquainted us that the Fort there upon the Island of Providence was in part Demolished by the Enemy, and the Guns Nailed up and Carriages broke and that the Towne was also burnt, and that upon a further invasion soon after the Inhabitants were again Surprized and made Prisoners or forced to make their Escapes, amongst whom was the said Graves, and that at his coming away there was about four or 500 People remaining Scattered in the severall Islands, the Enemy having then left the same.

Wee also humbly Represented that after the Arrivall of the Convoy One of the Ships of Warr might remain dureing the Winter Season in the Rivers of Virginia another in Maryland, and the rest in Case they arrive soon enough to Wood and Water and fit themselves for a Cruise before the Setting in of the Frost, may be ordered to Cruise off of Barbados and the Leeward Islands, or else where within the Tropics, in such manner as his Royall Highness the Lord High Admirall Should Direct, for the better Security of the Trade of those Southern parts which has lately very much Suffered by the Enemy, We did likewise humbly Offer Our Opinion, That if Your Majesty should be pleased to agree to the September Convoy as proposed it would be necessary that the same do Commence and take Place in the Month of September 1707; That in the mean time the Merchants here and the Planters in Virginia and Maryland may have due Notice thereof, and Order their affairs with relation to such Stated Convoy accordingly. I have <sup>considered</sup> of the same and have taken the Opinion of Doctor Bramston Surrogate to the Judge of the High Court

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of Admiralty, who having Examined thereinto, Reports unto me as followeth, vizt.:

"I have in Obedience to His Royall Highness's "Directions considered of the Petition of Richard "Johnson, and doe from the Affidavits and Certificates "thereunto annexed, with the proceedings had here in "the Court of Admiralty, beleive the severall Facts in "the Petition to be true and realy done as therein is "Sett forth. And am humbly of Opinion that the "Capture is so Remarkable and Redounds so much to "the Honour of the English Nation, that it deserves all "Incouragement and Reward Possible, and that due "Consideration should be had of the Petitioners Meritt "and Bravery. Wee further Represent to Your Majesty, that wee find the said Sampson Broughton, upon the Death of his Father (who was made Attorney Generall of New York by his late Majesty, in the Year 1700, and Dyed in that Office) did Exhibit a Petition to the then Commissioners for Trade and Plantations, praying to be recommended to Your Majesty, for the place of Attorney General of New York ; which petition (so Originally brought before them, and not by way of Reference as in the petition of the said Rayner is Suggested) was by the said Commissioners, referred to Sir Edward Northey, Your Majestys then Attorney Generall for his Opinion as to the Qualifications of the said Broughton, but no Report was made thereupon; for soon after, the said Broughton (who had taken the Degree of a Barrister at Law in the Year 1700, as appears by the Register of the Middle Temple) did procure Your Majestys Letters Mandatory to the Lord Cornbury, dated the 18 of June, in the fourth Year of Your Majestys Reign, directing his Lordship to Constitute the said Broughton, Attorney Generall of Your Majestie's Province of New York.

Wee find that the Lord Cornbury did receive Your Majestie's said Letters, and that upon the 22d of August 1706, he did Communicate the same to the Councill there, declaring at the same time, that there were many actions Depending at Your Majestys Suit in the Supreme Court of that province (then near at hand) wherein Mr. Broughton could not be timely Instructed, and therefore he thought proper to Deferr the passing a patent to the said Broughton till that Court was over, whereby, the person, who then Officiated as Attorney Generall, might have the management of those Tryals, as appears by a Minute of that Councill of the said 22d of August 1706: So that the not admitting the said Broughton into the Office of Attorney Generall at that time, appears by the said Minute to have been for the reason aforesaid nor is there mentioned in the said Minute, that it was on Account of his Inability, for the Discharge of that Trust as is alledged by the petitioner Rayner.

Wee further find that on the 26th of June 1707, the said Broughton petitioned his Lordship (as appears by a Minute of the Councill of New York of that Date) to Grant him Letters patents under the Seal of New York, for the said Office of Attorney Generall according to Your Majestys beforementioned Letters Mandatory; That thereupon his Lordship informed the Councill he had writ to one of Your Majesties principal Secretarys of State, and to Your Commissioners For Trade and Plantations in relation to the said Broughton and that he Expected an answer thereunto. Wee Cannot tell Whether any such Letter has been Writ to Either of Your Majesties principall Secretarys of State, but Wee have received none such from his Lordship, nor has he at any time given Us an Account of his proceedings in relation to the said Broughton.

Wee further humbly Represent to Your Majesty That since the Receipt of Your Majestys Order of Reference upon the petition of the said Rayner and while that matter was under Examination, Wee have received Your Majesties Order in Councill of the 23d of June 1707 (which however it may have happened, was not delivered to Us till now) referring to

Us the petition of the said Sampson Broughton, wherein he Complains, That the Lord Cornbury, contrary to Your Majestys foresaid Gracious Letters, Long since Granted on his behalfe, had refused to admitt him the said Broughton, to Act as Attorney Generall, without assigning any Crime or Misdemeanor against the petitioner; for such his Lordships Refusal, and therefore the said petitioner prays Your Majesties Gracious Directions therein.

Upon which Wee humbly Represent to Your Majesty that We find the Case of the last mentioned Petitioner Sampson Broughton to be, as set forth in His petition, and as the same is herein before more fully Stated, in Relation to the first mentioned petition of John Rayner.

Upon Mr. Broughton's Arrivall here from New York, he Applied to Us, whereupon Wee directed him to attend Sir Edward Northey to whom his former petition had been referred, for a Certificate of his ability for the Discharge of the said Office of Attorney Generall; and he has brought Us a Certificate in the Words following; Vizt.:

"Mr. Sampson Shelton Broughton the Father of the "present Mr. Broughton, I knew many Years; he was "a Barrister of Long Standing in the Middle Temple " and his son was bred there under him, and was called "to the Barr at the time his Father want to New York, "and went thither with him: He not having practiced "in England before he went to New York, I am not "able to give any Account of what proficiency he had "then made in the Study of the Law, but that being "Seven Years Since, by the Account he and others have "given me of his Application to his Studies in New "York, and the Knowledge he has gained of the people, "Laws and Methods there; it seems probable to me, "that he will be able to serve Her Majesty there in the "place in which She was pleased by Her Letter to Direct "him to be placed."

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Upon the whole matter Wee are humbly of Opinion that in due Obedience to Your Majestys foresaid Letters Mandatory, the Lord Cornbury ought to have admitted the said Broughton in the Office of Attorney Generall; the not doing whereof has been Injurious to him in Depriving him thus long of the Sallarys and Fees belonging to the said Office; And if his Lordship after Tryall of him, had any Just Objections to the said Broughtons being Continued in that Employment, he should have made them known to one of Your Majestys principall Secretarys of State, or to Your Commissioners for Trade and plantations, for Your Majesties further pleasure This Method ought to have been Observed, but m therein. the Case before Us, Wee find neither Want of Ability, nor any Misbehaviour proved upon the said Broughton nor any Legal Objection made against the manner of Obtaining Your Majesty's Letters Mandatory; for as to the Objection of their being Obtained without any Report first made to Your Majesty from the Commissioners for Trade and plantations, there is no weight in that, the Disposition of places and Offices being entirely in Your Majesty; Nevertheless if Your Majesty shall be Graciously disposed to Gratify the petitioner Rayner by a Grant of the said Office of Attorney Generall (his Qualifycations for the Discharge of that Trust appearing very fully by the said Annexed Certifycate) Wee have no Objection to the said Rayner's receiving the benefitt of such Your [Vol. IV. pp. 129-32.] Majestys Royall Favour.

Fee for Entring and Clearing of Ships, which his Lordship in Exchange took to his owne use; That the said Governour arrived in Maryland before the Petitioner and obtained an Act of Assembly for Settling the Benefitt of those Ordinary Licences upon himselfe, which Act upon the Petitioners Complaint to his late Majesty was Repealed by Order in Councill of the 2d of March 1693, and another Act passed for making the profitts of the said Ordinary Licences payable to the Secretary for the time being; which Act was accordingly complyed with till October 1703, when it expired being Temporary; That the House of Delegates in October 1703 and in Aprill 1704, upon the arrivall of Your Majestys present Governour, reviving the said Law for keeping Ordinarys, Applyed the said Profitts of those Licences towards Defraying the Charge of the respective Counties in which the said Ordinarys are kept, by which means a Branch of the said Office, to the Yearly Value of at least 1501. Sterling is cut off; and that the Petitioner applyed himselfe to Your Majestys said Governour and Councill in Assembly who referred the Consideration of this matter to the Assembly who appointed to meet in September.

Whereupon the Petitioner humbly prays, that Directions may be sent to Your Majestys Governour of Maryland, for preserving the Office of Secretary of that province in the Quiet Possession and Enjoyment of its just Rights.

And having taken the Opinion of Your Majestys Attorny Generall upon the Petitioners Case. We doe humbly take leave to lay before your Majesty his Report as follows, vizt. :

"That he had perused certaine Letters Patents of their "late Majesties King William and Queen Mary, bearing "date the 5th of September in the 3d Year of their Reign, "whereby the said Sir Thomas Lawrence was Constituted "Secretary of the said Province of Maryland, dureing their "Majesties Pleasure and his Residence in the said Province.

"That there is not any Salary Granted by those Letters "Patents, nor any Express mention that the Ordinary Licences,

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" or any other matter in particular is Granted to the Secretary, "But that the Patent contains a Grant of the Office, with all "Rights, Privileges, Profits, Perquisites and advantages to the "said Office belonging, incident or appertaining, and in such "manner and form as any Secretary of any of their Majesties "Provinces in America for or by reason of the Exercise of such "Office might lawfully have or enjoy.

"Under the Generall words of which Patent, Mr. Attorny "conceives, Sir Thomas Lawrence, as Secretary of Maryland, "ought to have the benefitt of the Ordinary Licences, the "same having been usually enjoyed as perquisites of that "Office, under the Government of the Lord Baltimore, the "late Proprietor thereof, untill his late Majesty with the "consent of the Lord Baltimore, thought fitt to take that "Government under his immediate Care and Protection, "But by the said Act of Assembly for Regulating Ordinarys, "past in Maryland the 3d of October 1704 (which Act is to " continue from the making thereof for three Years and from "thence to the end of the next Assembly) the benefitt of the "Ordinary Licences. is taken away from the Secretary of that "Province, and applyed in ease of the Publick Charge of each "County in which such Ordinary keepers live, and that this "Act is the Second Attempt of this Kind that has been made "since the Resuming the Government of this Province by "the Crowne.

"That the first act, whereby this Perquisite of the Secretarys "Office was taken away, passed at an assembly held m "Maryland the 10th day of May 1692, under the Government "of Colonell Copley, by which Act the Benefitt of Ordinary "Licences was Granted to Colonell Copley himselfe, and that "Act of Assembly by his late Majestys Order in Councill the "2d March 1692, upon a Report of the Lords of the Committee "of Trade and Plantations was Disallowed; and his Majesty "in Councill was then pleased to Order That the said Sir Thomas "Lawrence should enjoy the full benefitt of his Office of "Secretary of Maryland, according to the said Letters Patents

"In Obedience to which Order, severall Temporary Acts of "Assembly, from three years to three years, have since passed "whereby the profitts of the Ordinary Licences, dureing the "Continuance of those Acts, were given to the Secretary of the "Province of Maryland, by Vertue whereof Sir Thomas "Lawrence Enjoyed the same, but the last of those Acts being "Expired the Act of Assembly now under Consideration "passed in October 1704, whereby the profitts of those Licences "are appropriated to Defray the Charge of the Publick.

"And he further Adds, That he is humbly of Opinion The "last mentioned Act of Assembly is Derogatory to Her Majestys "Prerogative in taking away from the Secretary of that "Province who is a Patent Officer of the Crowne the just "perquisites of his Office, without any previous Order from "Your Majesty for that purpose; and that it will be for "Your Majestys Service that this Law be Disallowed as soon "as conveniently may be, especially since the like Act hath "been once already Disapproved in Councill and Disallowed."

With which Opinion of your Majestys Attorny Generall We concurr, and thereupon humbly offer, That the Act being now expired it will not be proper for Your Majesty to Repeal the same, but that Your Majesty may Signifie to the Governour of Maryland, under your Royall Signature, Your Dislike of the said Law, requiring him not to pass any Law for the future, whereby the advantage of the Ordinary Licences shall be taken from the Secretary's Office.

The Granting of Licences by the Justices of each County, to such Persons as they think proper for keeping Ordinarys having been found for many Years to be of great Conveniency; there seems to be no reason why the said Act should be made Temporary from three Years to three Years only; And therefore we humbly conceive it for Your Majestys Service, that at the next Assembly the Act concerning Ordinarys be made perpetuall, or at least for a much longer duration than it has hitherto been made, and the benefitt of the Licences appropriated to the use of the Secretary for the time being

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as fully to all intents and purposes as the said Sir Thomas Lawrence, or any other Secretary of that Province has at any time heretofore held or enjoyed the same; which will not only be some satisfaction to Sir Thomas Lawrence for the Damage he has sustained by this Act of Assembly, but will be a certain Establishment for the Secretary of that Province whereby his Office will be rendred less precarious and dependent upon the Inhabitants of that Province, than at present it is. Seymour, Governor of Maryland, has not procured the Act ordered, but has allowed the Assembly to make an Ordinance of themselves and to address her Majesty against the Order of Jan. 1708; and that he has suffered great oppression from the Governor and William Bladen, his chief instrument, in the matter of several years' arrears due to him; and praying that the matter be referred to persons named in his petition, as the proper means of making the truth of his allegations appear.]

30 March. [Order in accordance with the report of the Board of Trade]
. as to what relates to the Complaints against the Said late Governor the Petitioner has waved the Same; It appearing from the Minutes of Assembly, That on the 30th of November 1708, the said Governor Recommended the Petitioner's Case to them in the Words following,

Gentlemen: Her Majesty thinks Sir Thomas Lawrence hardly used in respect of the Ordinary Licences, which Sir Simon Harcourt Her late Attorney General has Reported to belong to the Office of Secretary; Mr. Speaker shall have that Report and Her Majesty's Order thereon, and what Orders I have receiv'd from the Right Honourable. The Lords Commissioners of Trade and Plantations on Sir Thomas's Complaint, whereby you will perceive how

earnestly Her Majesty recommends a Law to appropriate the Fines of those Licences to his Office for a longer Duration of Time than three Years, therefore I hope You will be so prudent to shew Your ready Compliance herein.

Upon this Several Conferences were had between the Council and Assembly, and on the 3d of December 1708 They Resolved That in Consideration of the low price of Tobacco the mony arising by Ordinary Licences be Applyed to defray the Charge of the several Counties.

And Whereas Your Majesty was pleased by Your 'foresaid Letter to direct the Governor not to pass any Law for the future, whereby the advantage of the Ordinary Licences should be taken from the Secretary's Office ; The Council and Assembly Considering, That the 'forementioned Act (of 1704) for Regulating Ordinaries, would Expire at the Conclusion of that Assembly, did on the 9th of December 1708, Pass an Ordinance Directing and Empowering the Justices of the County Courts to Grant Licences to Ordinary Keepers, and to take Recognizance for their Keeping Good Rules and Orders in their Houses, And Settling the Rates of Liquors etc., a Copy whereof is hereunto Annext.

Upon this We humbly take Leave to Observe, That the passing the said Ordinance by the Council and Assembly is not Warranted by Your Majesty's Commission or Instructions to the Governor; On the Contrary, it is expressly Declar'd by the Commission, That Laws, Statutes and Ordinances shall be past by the Governor, with the Advice and Consent of the Council and Assembly; And this Ordinance having been passed by the Council and Assembly only (it not appearing that the Governor was Concern'd Therein) is in Our Opinion Null and Voyd, and therefore We humbly offer, that your Majesty be pleas'd to Signify Your Dislike of such manner of proceeding.

As to the Petitioner's particular Case, We did by Our Representation of the 23d of October 1707 (having had the Opinion of Your Majesty's Then Attorney General) lay before Your

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Majesty a full State of the Hardships the Petitioner had Suffered by the 'forementioned Act of 1704, And We are Still of Opinion, that the Said Act was derogatory to Your Majesty's Prerogative in taking away from the Secretary of that Province, who is a Patent Officer of the Crown, the just perquisites of his Office, without any previous Order from Your Majesty for that purpose; and therefore We humbly Offer, That when Your Majesty shall be pleas'd to send a new Governor to that purpose, he be directed to Use his Utmost Endeavors with the Assembly, that a new Law be passed for Regulating Ordinaries without Limitation of Time, or at least for a longer Duration than it has hitherto been made, and That the Benefit of the Licences be Thereby Appropriated to the Use of the Secretary for the Time being, as fully to all Intents and purposes, as the said Sir Thomas Lawrence or any Other Secretary of that Province has at any time heretofore had, or lawfully Enjoy'd the Same, And that they give him a Consideration for the Loss of the Mean Profits [Vol. IV. pp. 561-2.] Since the Year 1704.

8 Jan. Leeward Islands. [1043.] [An instruction to be sent to Col. Park in accordance with a representation of 7 Nov. from the Board of Trade]—Her Majesty having been pleased by Her Instructions to restrain the Governours in the Plantations from receiving any Gifts or presents from the Generall Assemblys in their respective Governments excepting only that they may receive any annual allowance for House Rent in Case there be no house for their Residence; And provided the said Allowance be made at the first Sessions of Assembly after the said Governours Arrivall, and Settled on them for the whole time of their Government.

The Generall Assemblys of Antigoa and St. Christophers have lately pass'd two Acts, the one Entituled,

An Act for the payment of the Value of One Thousand pounds Currant Mony Annually to Daniel Park Esqr. in lieu and Satisfaction for the Rent of a House for his Accomodation dureing his Residence and Abode in that Island past at Antigoa the 26th July 1706. And the other Entituled,

An Act for raising the Quantity of One hundred Thousand pounds of good Muscovada Sugar per annum for Discharging the Rent of a house for the Accomodation of Daniel Park Esqr. dureing the continuance of his Government past at St. Christophers the 4th of September 1706.

Whereupon Wee take leave to Observe that the Mony given by the first of these Acts may amount to between five and Six hundred pounds Sterling, which being given to Colonel Park dureing his Residence at that Island, he may from the Ill Penning of the Act pretend to the said Allowance (if he reside there) though he should not be Governour; That the Sugar given by the Second of these Acts may likewise amount to between five and Six hundred pounds Sterling and being Granted to Colonel Park dureing the continuance of his Government (without Limitting it to his Residence) he may Claime the same though he should not reside upon the Island.

And Whereas Her Majesty has been pleased by Her Instructions to other Governours to limit the Allowance for a House to three hundred pounds Sterling, it was thought fitt to leave that of the Leeward Islands undetermined by reason of the Governours being obliged frequently to Transport himselfe from One Island to another : Yet Wee think the Sumes given by these two Acts too much to be allowed for house Rent.

Wee further take leave to observe, that these Acts were past as incouragements to the Governours Residing upon those Islands, But Wee find by the Extract of a Letter from Sir Charles Hedges of the first of August 1706 Communicated to Us, that Colonel Park is thereby Directed to make his Residence at St. Christophers or Nevis, or the rather at Nevis (where there is a house for the Governour) since by his Authority and Presence he will be better able to put an end to the Disorders that have been Committed and still continue to be Committed there.

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Upon which Wee humbly Offer, that though it may be for the Incouragement of the Inhabitants of Nevis (who have very much Suffered by the French) That the Governour make his Abode on that Island, Yet it appears to Us more for Her Majestys Service that his Cheif Residence be at Antigoa That being the Windermost Island and from whence he may by Consequence more easily and speedily come to the Assistance of the others in Case of need, and therefore Wee pray Her Majesty would be pleased to Signifie Her Pleasure in this particular.

And if Her Majesty shall be pleased to permitt Colonel Park to make Antigoa the Cheif Place of his Residence, Then Wee humbly Offer That Her Majestys Royall Pleasure be Signified to Colonel Park that he may move the respective Assemblys in his Government That New Acts be past for Settling the Value of four hundred pounds Sterling per annum upon Her Majestys said Governour in Cheif for House Rent, to be payd in proportion to the Number of Days he shall Actually reside upon each Island respectively. [pp. 491–3.]

18 Jan. [1044.] [Extracts from a report of 1 July from the Board Tobacco. of Trade on the tobacco trade are referred :---to the Lord Admiral, a proposal that pursers in the Navy be restrained from buying foreign tobacco and obliged to buy such as has paid the full duty :--- to the Secretaries of State to have proper applications made by her Majesty's ministers in the Courts of Spain, Portugal, Sweden and Muscovy for the encouragement of the tobacco trade :-- to the Lord Treasurer, and also, for a legal opinion, to the Attorney, Solicitor and Advocate General, \* proposal that neutral ships be permitted to load tobacco in this kingdom on the account of foreign merchants in amity with her Majesty and to carry the same directly to France [pp. 498-9.] and further.]

20 Feb. [The Lord Treasurer presents a report from the Customs] That they find not any Law that hinders the Subjects of Neutrall Princes or States from Loading Tobacco here on Neutrall Ships and when they have done soe from Carrying <sup>it</sup> (being not a Contraband Comodity) where they think fitt. [The proposal of the Board of Trade is accordingly approved, and fitting directions ordered to be given to the Customs, to the commanders of ships of war and privateers and to the Dutch Government for communication to their naval commanders also.] . [p. 532.]

[1045.] [Extracts from a representation of the Board of Trade relating to Newfoundland are referred for the issue of the necessary directions—(1) to the Lord Treasurer an account by the agent for the company of soldiers at St. Johns of things required by them, viz.]:— l. s. d.

[(2) to the Master of the Ordnance to provide bedding for 80 men and take care that the supply be not again rendered rotten and unserviceable by its usage on shipboard:—and (3) to the Lord Admiral a proposal, in view of probable Frenchretaliation for injuries inflicted on their fishery last season, that six ships be ready to sail in February with the ships going to Portugal for salt, and to depart thence by the first

[1046.] [The Council refer to the Lord Chancellor the petition of Bridget, widow of Philip Ford, and her children, Setting forth, that William Penn Esq. had first Mortgaged and afterwards for 106581. Conveyed to the said Deceased Philip Ford and his heirs Pennsylvania and other Lands in America, That the said Mr. Penn by his Power and Interest there retains the Possession from the Petitioners, whereby they are deprived of their Subsistance, and praying Her Majesty to Grant to the Petitioners Effectual Powers by Her Royall Letters Patents for the purposes Specified in the Letters Patents, Whereby the said Mr. Penn held the said Lands, and that Her Majesty would be pleased to Assist the Petitioners in the Putting and Quieting them in the · Possession of the premises, and to prevent the said Mr. Penn [p. 508.] from making any Sayles of any Parts thereof. Report from the Right Honourable the Lord High Chan-[Vol. IV. p. 59.] cellour . . Nothing.

[1047.] [The Council refer to the Board of Trade the petition of Samuel Cox, Clerk of the Naval Office in Barbados] Setting forth, That he had a Grant of the said Office under the Great Seal of England, and Enjoyed the same for severall years, but the present Governor Mr. Crow has seized on it as a perquisite belonging to him, And praying that his said Office may be Restored unto him and the profitts thereof.

[1048.] [The Council refer to the Board of Trade the petition of James Bengar of Newfoundland merchant and Mary his wife praying examination of their complaint that they have been] unjustly and arbitrarily Dispossessed of a certain Plantation in that Country to them belonging. [p. 508.]

[Order is given in accordance with the report of the Board 15 April. of Trade]—We have Examined the petitioners allegations, and heard severall Persons thereto and have likewise received the Affidavits of Capt. Tho. Claisby and other persons, The said Claisby having in the Years 1696, 1697 and 1699, been Commander of Your Majestys Ships the Lime and Mary Galley Employed in those respective Years at Newfoundland. Whereupon Wee humbly take leave to Represent to Your Majesty the State of the Case as it appears to Us From the said Affidavits, Vizt. :---

That Sir David Kirke in the Reigne of Your Majestys Royall Grandfather King Charles the first was possessed of Ferryland and of a plantation there, called Pool Plantation, upon which he lived during his Life And that after his Death the same was possessed by His Widow, and after her Decease, by David Kirke, second Son of the said Sir David with the Consent of His three other Brothers.

That David Kirke continued in the peaceable possession of the said plantation for many Years together. But at Length permitted Philip his Younger Brother to enjoy it in Order to the Setting of him up in the World.

That upon the Death of Philip, who left no Issue and Likewise upon the Death of David, who was the petitioner Mary

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Benger's first Husband, the said Plantation, by Davids Wil, became Vested in Her and Her Heires; but that before the said David Kirk Dy'd the Country was Invaded and plundered by the French and the said David Kirke and his Wife, with all the other Inhabitants of Ferryland, were taken and Carryed away prisoners to Placentia.

That thereupon in the Year 1697, Captain Cleasby was sent to recover the Country; and upon his arrivall found it Abandon'd and wasted And that while he was there the petitioner Mary Benger came to the Harbour of St. Johns, and related the Death of her said Husband, David Kirke, during his Imprisonment.

That after the Act of Parliament passed in 1698 relating to Newfoundland, the said Captain Cleasby was again sent to put the same Execution, Upon whose arrival, and also of Commadore Leake a Court was Opened for the Settlement of the properties of the Inhabitants, pursuant to the said Act, and upon proclamation made for any persons to come in and Claime Pool plantation aforesaid, a Master of a Fishing Ship appear'd and Insisted that he had a Right Thereto by Virtue of the said Act Under pretence that the same Was deserted and not Built upon; But that upon a Hearing of the Matter before Commadore Leake and Captain Cleasby, it appeared that the said Mary Benger had a plain and full Right by a Continued and Long Succession of possession, and that during all that time the Stages Rooms and all other things requisite for the maintenance of the Fishery, were Annually erected and kept up and had been so then, if not unavoidably hindred by the Invasion, and there being carryed away to Placentia; Upon which it was adjudged That she had an undoubted Right to the said plantation and a quiet possession thereof accordingly given her by the said Comadore.

That in all the time She has enjoyed the said plantation, no person appeared as Claimant thereunto, but the Mas<sup>ter</sup> of the Ship aforesaid nor has any other person Offered <sup>to</sup> Disturb the petitioners, till of late when Major Lloyd as <sup>is</sup> alledged in favour of —— Kirke who claims as Heir at Law has not only forbid the Tenants to pay the Rent for the said plantation, but has also threatened to Dispossess the said Benger of Her Dwelling House and plantation at St. Johns.

For Our further information we sent to Mr. Merrett Agent for the said Major Lloyd to know if he had anything to Offer against the petitioners Claim who inform'd Us, That he had nothing to Offer in this Matter; but that he has heard of it and believes it true that the petitioners have been Disspossessed, but knows not that it was by Major Lloyd's Order.

This being the State of the Case, as it appears to Us, wee take leave to Represent to Your Majesty That the petitioners have been Unlawfully Dispossess'd of the said plantation and humbly Offers That Your Majesty would be graciously pleased to send Order to the Commadore of this Year's Convoy, That he put the petitioners in possession of the said Plantation at Ferryland, unless full and sufficient Proof be made to him that the petitioners were not in actual and Quiet possession pursuant to the said Act of Parliament, according to the aforesaid State of the Case. [Vol. IV. pp. 56–7.]

[1049.] [On a representation of the Board of Trade of 24 5 Jan on a clause in the Revenue Act disallowed this day as to the admeasurement of ships, it is ordered that a letter be sent to the Governor of Virginia directing the passing of a new law to that end in accordance with the rule of the British Act of 1695 if practicable in those parts : otherwise, according to the method prescribed in the representation.] [p. 519.]

[1050.] [The Council refer to the Lord Treasurer the 20 petition of Captain Richard Long for payment of 80*l*.] which he disburst in the Reign of his late Majesty when he was sent Commander of the ship Rupert Prize, to make Discoverys on the Coasts of America. [p. 534.]

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and others owners of the ship *Grand Canary*, praying, in consideration of their good services in Newfoundland, that 35%, the proceeds of the *St. John Baptista*, a prize taken by the said ship while on loan in her Majesty's service, may be divided between them and the lieutenants and men who were the captors.] [*p.* 544]

10 May. [In accordance with the Lord Admiral's report, the ship and lading are awarded to the petitioners after deduction of the Lord Admiral's tenths and other incident charges. The report is based on the opinion of Sir C. Hedges, Judge of the Admiralty, who said]—"I do find that the ship Grand Canary was a prize ship sold at Newfoundland and fitted out there by the Petitioners upon a Cruize in pursuit of a French Privatier on that Coast, at their own Charge, and mann'd by Capt. Underdowne Commander in Chief at Newfoundland and Major Lloyd Commander of Her Majesty's Garrison there, upon the representation and at the request of the Inhabitants and Traders.

> I do further find, that by this ship so fitted and mann'd, the Coast was cleared of the Enemies Sloops, and the Prize called the St. John Baptista laden with Fish was taken and carried to Newfoundland, and afterwards sold there, for Four hundred and One pounds, and that the said summ belongs to Your Royall Highness as a perquisite of the Admiralty, the said Ship Canary which made the Capture, having <sup>10</sup> Commission, But I am humbly of Opinion the Service was so well undertaken and performed that the petitioners <sup>may</sup> reasonably hope Your Royall Highness will give so favourable an Ear to their request as may not only compensate their Charge and hazard but also be such a reward for their zeal in this service as may be an encouragement for the like attempts upon the Enemy for the future.

[1052.] [The Council refer to the determination of the Lord Admiral the petition of Sir Thomas Webster and others], setting forth, That they have fitted out and with great expence Cleared at Gravesend ever Since the 26th day of January last, the Ship Alexander Gally with a very considerable Cargo for Guinea, and from thence designed with Staves to Potuxant River in Maryland, and takeing the Opportunity of sailing in Company of three Dutch Men of Warr from the Downs to Portsmoth, all Her Men as well as Her Carpenter were taken from Her to serve on board the Berwick to the Distruction of the Voyage and great Losse and Damage of the petitioners, and therefore praying that the said Men may be restored, and the Ship permitted to proceed in Her Voyage. It is Ordered by Her Majesty in Council, that It <sup>be,</sup> and It is hereby referred to His Royal Highness Lord High Admiral who is desired to Cause the allegation of the Said Petition (a Copy whereof is hereunto annexed) to be Examined, and to Report to Her Majesty at this Board His Royal Highness's Opinion Thereupon. [pp. 35-6.]

[The Lord Admiral] having made report, That he has no objection to the Petitioners request, And it having been this <sup>day</sup> taken into consideration at the Board, It was thereupon <sup>Ordered</sup> by Her Majesty with the advice of Her Privy Councill, That the said Ship Levant Gally be not detained Embargoed in Jamaica nor in any other of Her Majestys Plantations, But that she be permitted to Depart when the Commander of the said ship shall think fit; And the Governour

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or Commander in Cheif for the time being of Her Majestys Colonys or plantations in America and all others whom it may concerne, are respectively to take Care of this Her Majestys Pleasure and not to lay any stop or embargo on the said ship, but to permit her to proceed in Her said Voyage accordingly.

A like Order upon the Petition of Hugh Hayward for the ship Stonehedge Galley Burden 80 Tons four Guns and 20 men Samuell King Commander Bound to Barbados.

Two Maryland Acts dealing with the subject of tobacco hogsheads are disallowed, because] The first doth Enact That no Tobacco Hodgs-. . . . heads shall exceed Fourty Eight Inches in Length, and Thirty two Inches in the Head, and that in case any person shall make Hodsheads of a Larger Demension he shall forfeit One hundred pounds of Tobacco for each Hodgshead so made which the merchants complain of as a great Hardship upon them for though by this Maryland Act, their Hodgsheads exceed those of Virginia but two Inches in the head Yet in the Loading of a ship the Difference is Considerable for a ship built to carry 7 Hundred Virginia Hodgsheads cannot Load above Six hundred of those of Maryland, Besides that very often such ships do take in part of their Lading in Virginia and part in Maryland so that by reason of the Different Sizes of the Cask the Masters cannot take in their full Lading, nor stow the Cask so conveniently and without Loss of Room, as if they were of an equall Size which is a great Discouragement of the Navigation of this Kingdom.

The second Law enacts, That every Master of a Ship, taking freight shall give Bond with One Surety in the sume of Two hundred pounds Sterling that he shall not for that Voyage, cut, Cropp, lessen, Diminish, Deface, or Impair any Tobacco Hogsheads taken on board his said ship or suffer the same to be done under the penalty of Three pounds Sterling for every hodgshead so defaced, This the Merchants complain of as an other Hardship upon them for the penalty upon those that shall make the Hodgsheads larger than the Size in the

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aforementioned Act is to forfeit but one hundred pounds of Tobacco amounting to about Six Shillings Whereas the penalty for defaceing or Endamageing a Hodgshead in the Stowing, being Three pounds Sterling, is more than the Value of Hodgshead of Tobacco there which the said Commissioners Conceive to be unreasonable; for the Large Size of Maryland Hodgsheads, ablidges the Masters to Use Screws to squeeze them in their Stowage which is liable to be interpreted a Defacing or Endamaging the said Cask; And therefore Wee humbly Offer to Your Majesty That this Law be also repealed.

[1062.] [Orders are given in accordance with the following report of the Board of Trade of 28 April] :- Having in Obedience to Your Majesties Commands signifyed to Us by the Right Honorable Mr. Secretary Boyle, considered the petition of Joshua de Kocherthal, the evangelical minister, in behalf of himself and several poor Lutherans, come hither from the Lower Palatinat in Germany praying to be Transported to some of Your Majestys plantations in America, We humbly take leave to Represent to Your Majesty, that they are in Number Forty One Vizt. Ten Men, ten Women, and twenty One Children, That they are very necessitous and in the utmost Want, not having at present any thing (but what they get by Charity) to subsist themselves, That they have been reduced to this Miserable Condition by the Ravages committed by the French in the Lower Palatinat, where they Lost all they had; That they have produced to Us several Testimonials from the Bayliffs or principal Magistrates in the Villages where they dwelt, which, by the Assistance of the Ministers of the Lutheran Church here, We have Examined, and find they give a good Character of the said Minister and the others with him, Whereupon We would have Offered, that these people might be settled in Jamaica or Antego, there being large Tracts of Land not taken up or Inhabited, and great Want of white people; But in regard that the Climate of those Islands is so much hotter than that part of Germany from whence they came, it is to be fear'd, it may not be agreeable to their Constitutions; And therefore We humbly propose, that they be sent to settle upon Hudson's River in the province of New York, where they may be Usefull to this Kingdom, particularly in the production of Naval Stores, and as a frontier against the French and their Indians: and this Your Majesty may be enabled to do by granting them the usual Number of Acres of Land, if Your

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Majesty shall please to Confirm the Act passed at New York the 2d of March 1698 Entituled An Act for Vacating Breaking and Annulling Several Extravagant Grants of Land made by Colonel Fletcher late Governor of that Province, as We humbly offered to Your Majesty by Our Representation of the 29th of July last, without which, there is no Land, but what is Engrossed by the Patentees of the foresaid Extravagant Grants.

And in Case Your Majesty shall approve of their going to New York, We humbly represent to Your Majesty, that the Cheapest way of Transporting them, will be in the Man of War and Transport Ship, that shall be ordered to go with the Lord Lovelace, for We do not find, they can be carryed thither, by any other way, under Eight or Ten pounds per head, for the Men and Women, and proportionably for the Children.

And We further humbly Offer, that they be supplyed here with the Necessary Tools for Agriculture, to be sent with them, to enable them to begin and make Settlements.

As these people are in the Utmost necessity, they will not be able to subsist there, till they can reap the fruit of their Labour (which will not be till after One Years time) unless assisted by Your Majestys Bounty, or that the province of New York contribute towards their Maintenance during that time, but as We are informed that province is at present very poor and much in Debt, there will be no Reason to Expect any great Supply from thence.

We further offer, That before their Departure they be made Denizens of this Kingdom, for their greater Encouragement in the Enjoyment of the priviledges accruing by such Letters of Denization. [pp. 74-5.]

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Considered of the Address of the House of Commons to Your Majesty of the 31th March last humbly beseeching Your Majesty to give directions that the Laws relating to the Trade and Fishery of Newfoundland may be Effectually put in Execution against such Commanders of Her Majesty's Ships of Warr and of the Forts, or Fortifications there, as have, or shall presume to exact demand, or receive any sume, or sums of Money, or other reward from any of Your Majesties Subjects in their Voyages, Trade, and Fishery to, from or at Newfoundland; and that the Commanders and Officers be strictly forbidden to keep, Use or Employ any Fishing Boats for their Own private Use or Advantage, as Likewise that the Laws relating to the said Fishery be put in Execution against all other persons who shall offend therein.

Upon which Wee humbly take Leave to represent to Your Majesty that as to what relates to the Commanders of Your Majesties Ships of Warr no complaint has been made at this Board of their having exacted, demanded or received any Money or other reward from your Majesty's Subjects trading at, to, or from Newfoundland, But in regard such Corrupt practices do very much tend to the Discouragement of a Trade so Beneficiall to this Kingdom, they ought to be strictly forbidden; Wherefore, if upon Complaint and due proof, it shall be found that any Commanders of Your Majestys Ships of Warr have been Guilty thereof, Wee Cannot but think they have justly Incurred Your Royall Displeasure and are punishable by the Loss of their Severall and respective Employments or otherwise according to the Discipline of Your Royal Navy; And Wee are humbly of Opinion, that they may be further proceeded against, upon the 13th Article in an Act of the Thirteenth Yeare of King Charles the Second Entituled An Act for the Establishing Articles and Orders for Regulating and better Government of His Majesty's Navy, ships of Warr and Forces by Sea, Whereby it is provided "that if any such Commander shall Demand and exact any Money or other Reward from any Merchant or Master for Convoying of any

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such ships or other Vessells belonging to Your Majesties Subjects, he shall be Condemned to make reparation of the Damage to the Merchants, Owners and Others, as the Court of Admiralty shall Adjudge; and also be punished criminally according to the Quality of his Offences, as shall be adjudged fitt by a Court Martiall."

As to what relates to the Commander of the Forts at Newfoundland, We further humbly Represent, that upon severall Occasions wee laid before Your Majesty the ill Consequences that may attend such Commanders, Trading by Himselfe or by any other person for his Benefitt, during his stay there; Whereupon Your Majesty was pleased to send an Instruction to Major Lloyd the present Commander of the said Forts and Garrisons dated 11th of Aprill 1706, Directing that neither he nor any Other Officer there, by themselves Agent or Factor, should Carry on any Trade during their stay in Newfoundland, to prevent any further Complaint of his or their Engrossing the Trade to themselves, and forestalling the Markett to the great Discouragement of the Merchants and Western Fishermen. Notwithstanding which Instruction, We have been Inform'd that Major Lloyd has, by his Agents, Traded very Considerably; But as the Examination into that Matter is still depending, We cannot at present lay before Your Majesty a full Account thereof; however We beg leave to mention that We have Several Affidavits that Major Lloyd has let the soldiers out to hire, during the Fishery, taking to himself three fourth parts of their Wages, and that he has, during the two last Summer Seasons, laid a Duty of three Quintals of fish upon every Fishing Boat, and the like upon the Inhabitants, under pretence that the same is for a Maintenance to the Minister there, which if duly Collected, would amount (as is suggested in the Affidavit) to fourteen of fifteen Hundred <sup>pounds</sup> Sterling a Year; Whereas We have been informed that <sup>the</sup> Minister has not One Hundred pounds a Year out of the said Collection. All which when more fully examin'd We shall <sup>humbly</sup> lay beforeYour Majesty, for Your Royal pleasure therein.

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Upon this Occasion We further beg leave to Represent to Your Majesty, that in Our Opinion the most proper Method to prevent the Arbitrary proceedings of Commanders of the Forts and Garrison in Newfoundland, with relation either to that ffishery, or to the Good of the Inhabitants, is by giving the Commodore of the Convoy for the time being, a Commission with Power to Command at Land, during his stay there, as was practised from the time of the first sending over of a Garrison, till about three Years ago, when that method was discontinued.

One Reason for such a Method, is, that there is no Governor or other person Commissionated by Your Majesty, to see good Order kept among Your Majesty's Subjects there (who are very numerous, during the Fishing Season) whereby frequent Complaints have been made, as well by the Soldiers against their Officers, as by the Planters and Inhabitants against both Officers and Soldiers; so that, without some such power, the said Officers and soldiers will not be under a due Disciplin, nor will the Inhabitants and Fishermen have a speedy Redress of such Abuses as shall be put upon them. And We further think that such a Commission Annually to be granted to the Commodore of the Convoy will contribute very much to the Security of the Forts there, by enabling him to demand an Inspection and Account of the Stores, Ammunition and Provisions, and by viewing the Condition of the said Forts, and taking the Muster Rolls of the Company there.

To which foregoing Reasons, it may be added, that such a Power lodged in the Commodore, will enable him to make more full and sufficient Returns to the several Heads of Inquiry, Yearly given him in Charge, with Regard to the Fishery and Inhabitants there than what have hitherto been made.

As to the putting the Laws relating to the said Fishery in Execution against all other Persons who shall offend therein, We humbly Represent to Your Majesty, That there are several Abuses still practised by the Masters of Ships, and by the Inhabitants, contrary to the Directions of an Act past in the Tenth and Eleventh Years of His late Majesty's Reign, Entituled, An Act to encourage the Trade to Newfoundland Vizt.

The Inhabitants do continue to rind the Trees.

They ingross and incroach upon Fishing Ships Rooms.

They frequently in the Winter destroy Several of the Stages, Flakes and Cook Rooms.

The Fishing Admirals are very negligent in seeing the Rules and Orders concerning the Regulation of the Fishery, duly put in Execution and in keeping Journals of the Fishery, or in transmitting Copies thereof to Your Majesty's most Honourable Privy Councill as directed by the said Act.

The said Fishing Admirals being Traders themselves, are very partial in their Determination of Differences. And the Appeals from their Sentence to the Captains of Your Majesty's Ships of War are seldom heard, by reason of their Arrival so late in the year at Newfoundland.

Lastly, Masters of ffishing Ships and of By-Boats do very often neglect to produce Certificates of their having their Complements of Green Men or ffresh men, as by the said Law they are required to have, for the better Increase of Seamen.

All which Offences have been committed in manifest contempt of Law, the Offenders having been encouraged thereto, in regard there is no particular penalty, or Reward to any prosecutor expressed or given in the said Act; And for the same Reason the like Offences may still be continued to the great prejudice of that Fishery, unless prevented by a due Execution of the Law, in punishing such persons as shall for the future offend therein. Though We made no doubt but this might be done, Since every Breach of a Law is punishable, though no particular penalty be adapted to that Offence; yet on this Occasion, We consulted Your Majesty's Solicitor-General, who is of Opinion, That tho' there be no Particular Penalty mentioned in an Act of parliament requiring or prohibiting the doing of any thing, yet if any person shall offend against such Acts, he may be Fined at the Discretion of the Court, upon being found Guilty on an Indictment or

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Information which may be exhibited against him for acting contra Formam Statuti. Wherefore if Your Majesty shall think fit to approve of what is before proposed in relation to the Commodores having a Commission to Command at Land. during his stay in those parts, We humbly offer that he be fully impowered thereby to redress and punish all such Abuses or Offences as shall be committed at Newfoundland, contrary to the said Act in such Manner as the same have formerly been or lawfully may be redressed or punished according to the known Usage or Customs there, and that in all other Cases not to be redressed there, he be strictly required to inform himself whether the several Directions and provisions in the said Act, particularly those relating to the Complements of Green Men or Fresh Men, as likewise the keeping of Journals by Admirals of Harbours, be duly observed and complyed with, and if he shall find they are not then and in such Case to transmitt to One of Your Majesty's Principal Secretarys of State, and to Your Commissioners for Trade and plantations, the Names of the Several persons so offending, with a particular and exact Account of their respective Offences, and how proved, to the end such Offenders may be proceeded against and punished here according to Law in such manner as is before mentioned.

We further humbly offer to Your Majesty, that the Collector or other Principal Officer of the Customs in every Port of this Kingdom, from whence any ffishing Ship or By Boat shall sail, on account of the said Fishery, be required to transmit to the Commissioners for Trade and plantations every Year (or oftner if need be) Compleat Lists of the Names of all Masters of such Fishing-Ships and By-Boats, distinguishing therein the Names of such Masters as have duly complyed with the Directions in the said Act, with regard to their respective Complements of Green Men or Fresh Mén, and of their having made Oath, and taken out a Certificate thereof, as the said Act directs, and of such others who shall refuse or neglect so to do.

And to the end all persons concerned in the said Fishery, may have due Notice of Your Majesties Royall Intentions, at the humble suit of Your Commons in Parliament, to put the said Act in Execution against all such who shall for the future offend therein, We must humbly submit it to Your Majesty, whether according to Your Majesty's wonted Justice and Goodness, it may not be convenient to Issue. Your Royall Proclamation for the better putting in Execution and observation of the several Matters and things in the said Act, contained, upon pain that every person thereafter offending shall be proceeded against and punished according to Law.

On this Occasion We must further beg leave to Represent to Your Majesty, that considerable Quantities of Wine, Brandy, Salt, Oyl, French Linnens, &c., are carryed to Newfoundland by the ships that fetch salt from Portugal, which Goods are trucked at Newfoundland with the Masters of New England ships for Tobacco, Sugar, and other enumerated Goods which are then carryed to portugal and other Foreign Markets in the Streights; This illegal Trade (for some time carryed on in those parts) ought to be prevented: But We do not see how it can be effectually done otherwise than by an Officer appointed by the Commissioners of the Customs to reside there, for that Purpose, And We hope, the Service to be performed may answer the Charge of such an Officer. [*pp.* 80–83.]

> That Wroth Delamaine, of the Island of Jamaica about Twenty five Years since, Dying Intestate, Administration of his personall Estate, was granted to Francis Vincent Esqr. Deceased, Negroes being at that time Deemed personal Estates though since made real Estates by the Laws of that Island.

> That the said Wroth Delamaine being at his Death indebted to Sarah, Wife of the said Whitchurch, in a Considerable sume of mony, the said Francis Vincent sold and Delivered to the said Sarah a Negroe Woeman Slave belonging to the Estate of the said Delamaine, called Catalena in Satisfaction of the said Debt.

> That the said Whitchurch in the Year 1682 intermarried with the said Sarah and became Entituled to the said Negroe Woeman and was in quiet possession for about twenty five Years without any Interruption or Disturbance during which time, she has had Tenn Children and Grand Children, born on the said Whitchurch's Plantation.

That by the Earth Quake and Fire at Port Royall in Jamaica great Part of the Records of the said Island were Destroyed as were likewise the Papers and Writings of the said Whitchurch whereby as he Suggests he could have made out his title to the said Negroe Woeman and Her Children.

That the Loss of the said Records being a Generall Calamity, by which all the Inhabitants must inevitably suffred had not the Generall Assembly passed an Act Entituled An Act for Confirming and securing Titles to Estates, whereby it is Enacted, That the Present Possessors of Lands Tenements, Hereditaments, or Negroes who had been five Years in Quiet and peaceable possession without Claim or Interruption, or should remain Quietly or peaceably possessed, without Claim or Interruption for the Space of five Years from the time of each possession should for ever after hold the same against all persons Whatsoever.

That notwithstanding the said Whitchurch having had many years quiet possession of the said Negroe Woeman and Her Children, as well before as since the making the said Act without any Claime or other Interruption and that the said Children and Grand Children were born on his plantation and bred up at his Charge, Yet the petitioner being necessitated to come to this Kingdome, for the Recovery of His Health during His Absence the said Negroe Woeman and Her Children being Eleven in Number, were upon an Inquisition found adjudged to be Escheated to Your Majesty, on a Suggestion that Charles Delamaine, Son of the aforesaid Wroth Delamaine, Dyed without Heire, That Brigadier Handasyde had Contrary to the Opinion of the Cheif Justice of that Island, procured <sup>such</sup> Inquisition to be Executed, on a Writ of Escheat, before it was possible for the said Whitchurch to send any Direction to his Agent there for his Defence or could Informe his said Agent What title he had to the said Negroe Woeman, and her Children, and altho' the said Agent Desired time, to send for Instructions from hence, yet the said Brigadier, did make <sup>a</sup> grant of the said Negroe Woeman and Her Children to Richard Rigby provost Marshall, and Secretary of the said Island.

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This being the state of the Case, as it has Appeared, unto Us, Weesent the same, together with a Copy of the Act therein mentioned, to Your Majestys Solicitor Generall for his Opinion, Whether the Limitation of five Years, mentioned in the foresaid Act does bind the Crowne, Upon which he has reported to Us as follows, Vizt.

That the Crowns Title is not bound by any thing in the said Act because the plea of five Years possession, is only to barr a Plantiff or Demandant that is not a Minor or under Coverture, both which Disabilitys, or rather protections, are in no wise applicable to the person that wears the Crowne, which shews the Designe of the said Act to be only to barr such Demandants and plantiffs as are sometimes lyable to those Incapacities.

But that notwithstanding the petitioner cannot make Title against the Crowne by force of that Act of Assembly Yet he humbly Conceives, the Inquisition which finds Your Majestys Title is not Valid in Law, and that Consequently Mr. Whitchurch's Right to the Negroes mentioned in the Writ, is not thereby set aside, for that the Inquisition does not find the Negroes mentioned in the Writ to be the same as Charles Delamaine Dyed seized of but only says, That the Jurors do believe them to be the same and that therefore since it is asserted, That the Negroe Woeman from whom the rest have Issued, was many Years ago sold to the Wife of the petitioner by the Administrator of Wroth Delamaine, whose property she was at the time of his Decease, for a Debt owing bonâ fide from the said Wroth Delamaine, And that the said Charles Delamaine was never seized of Her, or any of Her Offspring which if true, will take away all pretences of an Escheat, and after so long and uninterrupted Enjoyment every thing ought to be presumed that can be thought of, in favour of the possessor; and since this Inquisition was sett on foot in the Absence of the petitioner even when he was out of the Island, after all his papers had been Destroyed by the Fire at Port Royall Your Majestys Solicitor Generall is of Opinion That it will be more for Your Majestys Service to direct a Grant

to be made ad Corroborandum Titulum of the Petitioner. than to give any Countenance to the grant which Brigadier Handasyde has made of these Eleven Negroes to the Provost Marshall and Secretary Mr. Rigby. With which Opinion Wee humbly Concurr, and further take leave to Represent to Your Majesty, That by one of Brigadier Handasyd's Instructions, he is directed not to remitt any Fines or forfeitures whatsoever above the sume of tenn pounds nor to Dispose of any Escheats, Fines, or Forfeitures whatsoever, untill upon Signifying to Your Majestys High Treasurer or the Commissioners of Your Majestys Treasury for the time being, and to Your Commissioners For Trade and Plantations, the Nature of the Offence and the Occasion of such Fines forfeitures or Escheats with the particular sums or Value thereof (which he is to do with all Speed) he shall have received Your Majestys Directions therein But that he may in the mean time suspend the payment of such Fines and Forfeitures; which Instruction he has not Complyed with having granted the said Escheat without having signifyed the Nature and Occasion thereof, and received Your Majestys Pleasure thereupon as directed thereby. The appeal came up on 17 June, 1707, when the 7 Councillors present resolved that  $^3$  of them were disqualified by the Act of 9 and 10 William III, providing that no judge in her Majesty's plantations should be a factor of the African Company, and 3 others as having been judges in the case in the Grand Court, and that they were therefore not a quorum for the purpose of hearing the appeal. The petitioners therefore pray to be heard before Her Majesty in Council, while the defendants seek to have the appeal heard before the Governor and Council, of whom, as the petitioners point out, only five, a bare quorum, are possible judges in the case, Charles Long the defendant and the six mentioned being disqualified. 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largest Size, that it supplies Masts and other materials fit for the use of your Majestys Royall Navy, We are therefore of Opinion That all due Care should be taken, and fitting Provision made for the security of that Province, which (in Regard of the present Condition of your Majesty's Subjects there) will require a Supply from your Majesty of such Stores of War as may be proper for their Defence.

Colonel Dudly, your Majestys Governor of that Province having omitted to transmit to the Commissioners of Trade and Plantations a State of Ordnance-Stores there (for the Doing whereof Circular Letters have lately been sent to him and to the other Governors in America) On this Occasion we writt to the Principall Officers of your Majesty's Ordnance for an Account of what Stores of War were last issued by them for the use of New Hampshire, and when issued, who having made a Return (whereof a Copy marked A. is hereunto annexed) we find that in July 1692 a Supply of Powder and smal Stores was sent thither from that Office, but it does not appear that any Cannon or small Arms were then sent, or that these last mentioned, Or any other Stores of War, have at any time since been odered for the use of that particular Province; However Supplies of Ordnance Stores having at severall times been sent to the Massachusetts Bay (as the said Principal Officers do alledge) the Province of New Hampshire might upon any Exigency have been supplyed from thence.

For our further Information, and in Order to our Laying before Your Majesty a Proportion of Stores of War suitable to the present Want of that Province, We consulted Colonel Romer, one of your Majesty's Ingeniers (who for several years was employed in Raising Fortifications in those Parts of your Majesty's Dominions and particularly in the Province of New Hampshire till he was relieved by Ingenier Redknap now in service there) and having received from the said Colonel Romer the annexed Account marked B. of Ordnance, Powder, Shott &c. remaining in your Majesty's fort William

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and Mary in that Province, taken the 29th of September 1707, and signed by the Commander of the said Fort, We beg leave humbly to offer to your Majesty that a further Supply of Ordnance Stores (as mentioned in the annexed Paper marked C.) be sent to New Hampshire; Which supply we judge may be necessary, and do hope it will be sufficient to the Security of that Province.<sup>\*</sup>

A Proportion of Stores of War necessary for a Supply of the Province of New Hampshire, as delivered in by Colonel Romer late Engenier there.

One Hundred Barrils of Powder.—15 Barrils Ditto for small arms.—12 Minions of Iron with Feild Carriages, for each Town, 3.—25 Rounds for Each Gun.—15 Cartridges of Tinn fill'd with Carbine Bullets.—Powder in Proportion to the Rounds, Partridge-Shott, Ladles &c.

This will serve to alarm the Country, and to defend their Town Garrisons. I am humbly of Opinion that the Powder and Partridge-Shott should be delivered for Her Majesty's Service to some Justice of the Peace or Cheif Magistrate of the Place, for fear of Embezelment.

Board of Trade of 3 Dec.]:-Having received Letters from Colonel Sharpe, Mr. Walker and Mr. Berresford, Three of the Members of Your Majesty's Councill in Barbados Complaining of the Proceedings of Mr. Crowe, Your Majestys Governor of that Island, Wee humbly Represent to Your Majesty That they set forth in their Letter to Us, that it was hoped, after Sir Beville Granvilles departure from that Island, the Measures which were then taken, would have allay'd and pacifyed the Heats and Animositys, which had long and unhappily divided that Island, But that upon Mr. Crowe's Arrivall, they were soon convinc'd of their Error, for upon his first Entrance upon the Government as they allege, he has been so farr from endeavouring or promoting an accomodation, that he has

added Heat and Violence to their Animositys by countenancing sometimes One Party, sometimes another, By turning in and out most of the Cheif Officers of the Militia, according to the temper of the Party he was engaged with, By rejecting the Advice and Aid of your Majestys Councill, By adjourning the Councill, and let the Assembly sit and dispose of the Public Money, without the Concurrence of the Councill, By determining Causes himself cognizable only in Your Majestys Established Courts; And by Imprisoning and Oppressing Your Majestys Subjects contrary to Law.

This Behaviour of Mr. Crowe's obliged the aforesaid Three Councellors to draw up a Representation of some of his Misfeazances, which they presented to himself; and which he acknowledges in his Letter to us to have received, and says, he hopes it will make no Impression till the next opportunity, when he shall vindicate himself, a Copy of which Representation from the said Three Councellors is hereunto annexed; and Wee observe thereupon, though the Matter conteyned in their Representation has the appearance of Truth, From the manner it is drawn in, From their presenting it to himself, and offering to prove the same, and acquainting him with their Design of transmitting it to Us to be laid before your Majesty, Yet Wee do not think it agreeable to Justice to condemn the said Governor without his being heard. However the severall matters laid to his Charge, as set forth in the said annexed Representation, are of so high a nature, that Wee are humbly of Opinion that he be required to give an immediate answer thereunto; But whether the said Answer shalbe given in here by himself in Person, or he be strictly required by Your Majesty to transmit hither his Answer, in the same manner as Sir Beville Granville was, upon Complaints against him by Your Majestys Letter of the 30th of November 1704, a Copy whereof is hereunto annexed, Is most humbly submitted.

[Letters are ordered to be prepared to be sent to Mr. Crowe] taking notice of the aforesaid Letter of Complaint, a Copy

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whereof may be likewise transmitted unto him for his Answer which he is forthwith to return to the said Lords Commissioners of Trade and Plantations, with such Depositions to other Proofs in his own behalf, and relating to the said Complaint, as he or any other Person concern'd shall think fit or send to their Lordships. It being Her Majestys further Will and Pleasure, that free Liberty be given to the Complainants and other Persons concerned, to make Affidavit before any Judge or Magistrate of what they know in the said Matters, and that such Judge or Magistrate do summon before them such Persons, as the Complainants shall name, which the said Governor is to signify to such Judge or Magistrate as soon as may be, Her Majesty likewise Requiring that the Complainants do give unto the said Governor Authentic Copies of such Affidavits as they shall make in those Matters, As also that the said Governor do deliver unto the said Complainants Copy of his Answer so to be transmitted, and of such Depositions as he shall think necessary for his Defence within the space of One Month after the publishing of Her Majestys Letters (which he is to do as soon as he shall receive the same) As also that within Twenty days after receiving each others Proofs, the said Governors do in like manner Exchange with the said Complainants the Replyes that shalle made by Affidavits or otherwise, before they be transmitted to Her Majestys Commissioners of Trade and Plantations as And Her Majesty is further pleased to Direct, aforesaid. that an authentic Copy or Duplicate of such Her Majestys Letters be delivered to the said Complainants for their better [pp. 225-6.] Guidance herein.

[Mr. Crowe is ordered to come over without delay to 22 Aug. answer the complaints against him, the Board of Trade having represented on 19 August]:-In December 1708 Wee humbly laid before Your Majesty a Representation from Mr. Sharpe, Mr. Walker and Mr. Beresford three of the Members of Your Majestys Councill of Barbados Containing Severall Articles of Complaint against Mr. Crowe Your Majesties Governour of that Island, upon which Your Majesty was pleased by Your Letters Mandatory, Dated the 22d of January 1708 to require the Governour to Send Over his Answer to the said Articles of Complaint, with Such Affidavits as should be taken in his behalfe And that the Complainants be Allowed to take Affidavits, and Transmitt the same for the Support of their Charge, And both the Governour and Complainants, were further Directed to Interchange their prooff in One Month after the receipt of Your Majestys said Letter.

But before the Receipt thereof the Governour (to whom the Complainants had Delivered a Duplicate of their Representation) Transmitted to Us his Answer with such Affidavits and other Papers as he thought necessary for his Defence.

When Your Majestys said Letter arrived in Barbados the <sup>Complainants</sup> applyed to Mr. Crowe for an Order to One of (1709.)

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the Judges there to Issue Summons and take Affidavits according to Your Majestys Directions but the Governour refused to Comply therewith upon pretence that he had not received with your Majestys said Letter a Copy of the representation of the Complainants mentioned to be there Inclosed, and that he had already transmitted his Answer. However Pursuant to Your Majestys Directions, the Complainants at the expiration of a Month attended the Governour with such Affidavits and other proofs as they had been able to procure which he absolutely refused to receive, whereupon they have transmitted to Us those papers which they intended to have presented to him, this has been further Confirmed to Us by a Letter from Mr. Cox, and Mr. Pilgrim two other Members of Your Majestys Councill there.

Wherefore there being Just Cause to beleive that these proceedings of the Governour tend only to Delay an enquiry into the said Complaints and that in the mean time Your Majestys Subjects of that Island may Suffer by a Continuance of the Administration of that Government in the hands of one against whom there are so many other great Complaints; Wee humbly represent to Your Majesty

That the said Governour has taken upon himselfe, out of Court, to sett aside Orders Solemnly made in the Court of Chancery, which has been proved by Certificates from the Register in Chancery particularly in the Case of Manasses Gillingham, to which the Governour was a party and in Some other Instances.

Another Article of Complaint is that the Governour has rented Out the Office of his private Secretary for an Excessive Annuall Sume, greater than the Legall ffees would amount to, And the better to Enable his said Secretary to pay the said Rent, The two following Methods were taken Vizt. Fees were Exacted from Plantiff and Defendant, and the Governour took Sole Cognizance, by way of petition of matters Cognizable only in Your Majestys Courts of Law and Equity as in the Case of Mr. Summers, where the matter in Dispute was a

promissory Note, which the Governour upon a petition Commanded to be paid on pain of Imprisonment. In the Case of Bamfield and Waterman where the Governor Ordered Severall Negro Slaves to be Surrendered on the same penalty, besides Severall other Instances, where, the Governour has taken upon him at his own House by way of petition to give Judgment in Cases of Debt &c. which last mentioned Cases have been fully proved. And that Mr. Crowe did rent Out the place of his private Secretary to Mr. Alexander Skeene for 400*l*. per Annum (which place of Right belonged to the said Skene by Virtue of Your Majestys Letters patent) was fully laid before Your Majesty by Our Representation of the 18th of Aprill last, And upon which Your Majesty has been pleased to Direct Mr. Crowe to restore him to his said place of private Secretary.

It has been Likewise proved by Severall Affidavits, that while Suits have been Depending in the Courts of Chancery, Error and Grievances the Governour has received Considerable presents from parties Concerned in Such Suites as in the Case of Mr. Slingsby Mrs. Chamberlain and Mr. Gibbs and others, which practice has drawn his justice, very much in Question.

And further that the Governour has taken upon him to Imprison Mr. Buckworth Sole Judge of Your Majestys Court of Admiralty there, for Supposed Contempts in Not Obeying Illegall Orders made by him as Ordinary, And that too in Cases where Such Orders were not Served upon the said Buckworth.

That the Governour has also Imprisoned your Majestys Subjects for Supposed Contempts of his Extrajudicial Orders has kept them in prison Severall Weeks without Bail or Mainprize till they have been necessitated to lay downe Offices of proffit thereby takeing an Opportunity of Conferring the said places upon his Creatures in the Case of Mr. Small, and Paule Manier.

That the Governour has Oblidged Masters of Ships to have their petitions to him for leave to Sail drawn by his private

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Secretary even when they had their petitions already drawne by others so that they have doubly paid for the same, which is a Burthen upon Trade.

This They say may be proved by the Masters of Ships that were then there And upon this, Wee take Leave to Observe that by Our Representation of the 18th February 170§ Wee had Occasion to lay this matter before Your Majesty. Upon which Your Majesty was pleased to Signifye Your Pleasure that it should not be done any more.

That by frequent and Unusuall Adjournment of the Assembly to prevent their Complaints of the Governours undue Administration the Excise Bill for 1708 was not renewed till Severall Months after the Expiration of the former dureing which time a Considerable Quantity of Liquors was Imported without paying the Dutys to the prejudice of the publick Revenue of that Island.

That the Governor has made many and unreasonable changes in the Militia in Turning Out the best Qualifyed Officers of the Island, and granting Commissions to others to Serve his private Ends.

The Affidavits Certificates and other Proofs which have been Produced to Us on one part and the other and which Wee have fully Considered upon the Examination of the Complaints, are so Voluminous that Wee have forbore to repeat the same or to annex them to this Report But they are ready to be laid before Your Majesty whensoever Wee shall be thereunto required.

There are severall other Articles of the said Charge which Have been in like manner proved, But Wee<sup>•</sup>do not trouble Your Majesty with them these being the most Materiall.

Upon the whole matter it Appearing by the Aforesaid proofs that the Governour has been Guilty of such High Crimes, and Maladministrations as are Contained in the said Severall Articles of Complaint against him, and in reguard he is involved in many Law Suits there, in the Right of his Wife, which have had an Influence upon him in the Administration of Justice.

> For putting an end to the said Disputes Wee find that Depositions have been taken to support their Respective claims, as Likewise persons appointed on one part, and the other to view those Boundaries, and that Severall other Transactions have passed between the Governments of Virginia and Carolina, but without any Success hitherto, notwithstanding the reasonable advances which seem to have been made for that purpose, by the Government of Virginia.

> While these Disputes continue (which are like to last, till the Bounds between those Countries are Setled) many of Your

Majestys Subjects of Virginia who (by the Laws and Constitution of that Colony) have a Right to take out patents for Lands lying in that part of the Colony, will be great Sufferers in being Debarr'd of their Right and thereby Your Majesty will Loose a Considerable Increase of Quit Rents, Issuing out of so large a Tract of Land, which as computed does Contain Severall Thousands of Acres, besides, that under Colour of this Claim, the Maherine Indians (who are Tributary to, and by Treaty, ought to have the protection of that Your Majestys Government of Virginia) have been fallen upon, and in an Hostile manner Threatned to be Dispossess'd of their Settlements by some of the Inhabitants of North Carolina, not only to the Lessening as much as in them lay, the Honor and Authority of Your Majestys Government of Virginia but Tending to an Open Rupture with those Indians who will no Longer continue Tributary, than they find Themselves protected, and it is to be apprehended, that the like mischeifs will hardly be prevented till the Bounds between those Neighbouring Governments are Settled.

Wee further humbly Represent to Your Majesty That the making Grants of those Lands lying on the South Side of Black Water Swamp and Elsewhere, in the manner and on the Terms or Conditions the same were made, haveing been judged a Less'ning of Your Majestys Revenue, and not so Beneficiall as might be to that Colony in the Year 1705, a particular Instruction for Granting Lands was given to Colonel Nott, the then Governour which Instruction was afterwards comunicated to the Councill there, and some Difficulties arising upon it, the said Governour forbore to make any Grants of Lands till Your Majestys further pleasure were known therein. In the Year 1707, the like Instruction (a Copy whereof marked A is hereunto annexed) was renewed to Colonel Hunter the present Governour, but he falling into the Hands of the Enemy, as he was going to that Government, and Continuing <sup>still</sup> a prisoner in France, the president of Virginia (in whom the power of Granting Lands, with the Advice and Consent of

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the Councill does reside, in the absence of the Governour Subject nevertheless to the Strict meaning of the said Instruction) has hitherto forbore to make any Grant of Lands till Your Majestys further pleasure be Declared ; which restriction and Forbearance gives occasion to Severall of Your Majestys Subjects of that Colony to take Grants of those Contested Lands, upon easy Terms from the Government of Carolina, though the same persons would much rather take them from Your Majesty, were they allowed so to do, upon as easy Terms.

For preventing all which Disputes and Inconveniencies for the future Wee are humbly of Opinion it is absolutely necessary that the Bounds between Virginia and Carolina be Settled, and do therefore propose that Commissioners duly qualified, be respectively appointed on the part of each of those Governments with full powers, to take Depositions to survey or Cause a Survey to be made of the Lands in Dispute, and to do whatever may be further necessary for the better Ascertaining and Fixing the said Bounds by a Line or Lines of Division to be drawn between Virginia, and North Carolina. And if the said Commissioners so to be appointed shall not Ascertain and Settle those Bounds (within a reasonable time to be for that purpose prefix'd) in such Case the proprietors of Carolina shall Oblidge themselves (by a Clause to be Incerted in their Commission, or by some other Instrument in Writing, previous to the Issuing such Commission) to Submit the final Determination of that matter to Your Majesty.

It seems reasonable that the Charge of performing this Service be defray'd by those Countries respectively, but in regard the Inhabitants of Virginia under their present Circumstances from the Decay of the Tobacco Trade will look upon it as an hardship to be put upon this Expence, Wee humbly Offer that Your Majesty be pleased to allow a Certain sume, such as your Majesty shall think fitt out of Your Quit Rents, towards their proportion of the said Charge, (The Duty of two Shillings per Hogshead on Tobacco being already

burden'd by other payments) which Revenue of Quitt Rents will be Considerably increased by the Addition of many Thousand acres to that Colony, if as has been mentioned the said proprietors of Carolina, are Confined to Weyanoak Creek the Bounds prescribed by their Charter.

As to the patenting Lands in that Your Majestys Colony of Virginia Wee begg leave to Offer that the said annexed Instruction (containing a proposall for a New Method to be Observed in the passing such Grants) having been communicated to the Councill There, as Wee have already mentioned, they have returned the Annexed Answer to it marked B, wherein they affirme That the method proposed by the said Instruction, is Contrary to their Charter the Laws of that Colony, and to Express agreements made with severall of Your Majestys Subjects, who under the Directions and powers in the said Charter and Laws, have purchased Rights to Lands and actually paid the Consideration money for the same. They further add That the Terms of purchase prescribed by the said New Method are so impracticable; that no persons will take up Lands upon such hard Terms; while there is Land to be had at much Easier Rates in the Neighbouring proprietary Government of Carolina for which purpose 'tis said great Numbers of people have lately removed and others are removing thither.

Wherefore Wee humbly Offer That the Governour or Commander in Cheif of Virginia now, and for the time being be impowered and directed by and with the Advice and Consent of the Councill there to make Grants of Your Majestys Lands lying on the South Side of Blackwater Swamp, or Elsewhere, in such Forme and manner and under the like Conditions Covenants, and Reservation of Quit Rent as are by the Charter and Laws of that Colony allowed and directed to be made, and as were by Your Majesty permitted to be made before the said Instruction given to Colonel Nott due Care being taken that all Such Grants of Lands hereafter to be made, be as Beneficiall with regard to Your Majestys Revenue

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as may be Consistent with the Charter and Laws of Virginia, and with the particular Rights of any of Your Majestys Subjects of that Colony. All which is most humbly Submitted

And the said Representation being approved in Council, It was thereupon Ordered That the Lords Commissioners of Trade and plantations doe propose to the proprietors of Carolina the Issuing such a Commission as mentioned in their said Representation with such powers and numbers and Qualifications of Commissioners as shall be thought fitting, and as to the Charge of such a Commission and Commissioners That it be, and it is hereby Referred to the Right Honourable the Lord High Treasurer to Consider in what manner the same or what proportion on the part of Virginia may be fitly borne by Her Majesty out of the Quit Rents in that Colony as proposed by the said Report or otherwise. And it hereby further Ordered that in Refference to the manner of taking up and patenting or Granting Lands in Virginia the Methods proposed by Her Majestys president and Councill in that Colony as by their Answer Annexed to the said Representation be Observed so far forth as shall be agreeable with, or Consonant to the Laws and Customes of that Colony, notwithstanding any late Instruction Contradicting the same or [pp. 237-40.] Interfering therewith.

of Your Majesty's Colony of Virginia, as likewise on the Part of the Province of Carolina, for Setling the Bounds between those Governments, And they have met Several times for that purpose, but have not agreed upon any one Point thereof, by reason of the triffing Delays of the Carolina Commissioners, and of the many Difficultys by them Raised in relation to the proper Observations and Survey they were to make; However the Commissioners for Virginia have deliver'd to Your Majesty's Lieutenant Governor of that Colony an Account of their Proceedings, which Account has been under the Consideration of Your Majesty's Council of Virginia, And they have made a Report thereon to the said Lieutenant Governor, who having lately Transmitted to Us a Copy of that Report, We take Leave humbly to lay the Substance thereof before Your Majesty, which is as follows,

That the Commissioners of Carolina, are both of them Persons Engaged in Interest to Obstruct the Setling the Boundaries between That Province and the Colony of Virginia; For One of them has for Several Years past, been Surveyor General of Carolina, has Acquir'd to himself great Profit by Surveying Lands within the Controverted Bounds, And has taken up several Tracts of Land in his own Name, and Sold the same to Others, for which he Stands still Obliged to Obtain Patents from the Government of Carolina : The Other of them is at this time Surveyor General, And has the Same Prospect of Advantage by making future Surveys within the said Bounds: That the Behavior of the Carolina Commissioners has tended visibly to no Other End than to protract and Defeat the Setling this affair; And particularly Mr. Mosely has us'd so many Shifts and Excuses to disappoint all Conferences with the Commissioners of Virginia, as plainly Shew his Aversion to proceed in a Business that tends so manifestly to his Disadvantage; his prevaricating on this Occasion has been so indiscreet and Unguarded, as to be discover'd in the presence of the Lieutenant Governor of Virginia; he Started <sup>so many</sup> Objections to the Powers Granted to the Commissioners

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for that Colony, with design to render their Conferences ineffectual, that his Joint Commissioners could hardly find an Excuse from him; And when the Lieutenant Governor had with much ado prevail'd with the said Mr. Mosely, to Appoint a Time for Meeting the Commissioners of Virginia, And for bringing the necessary Instruments to take the Latitude of the Bounds in Dispute (which Instruments he owned were ready in Carolina) he not only fail'd to Comply with his own Appointment, but after the Commissioners of Virginia had made a Journey to his house, And Attended him to the Places proper for Observing the Latitude, he would not take the Trouble of Carrying his own Instrument, but Contented himself to find fault with the Quadrant produced by the Virginia Commissioners, though that Instrument has been approved by the best Mathematicians, and is of Universal use. From all which it is evident how little hopes there are of Setling the said Boundaries in Concert with the present Commissioners for Carolina. That though the Bounds of the Carolina Charter are in express Words limited to Weyanoak Creek, lying in or about 36 Degrees and 30 Minutes of North Latitude, Yet the said Commissioners for Carolina have not by any of their Evidences pretended to prove any such Place as Weyanoak Creek: the Amount of their Evidence reaching no further than to prove which is Weyanoak River, and even That is Contradicted by Affidavits taken on the Part of Virginia; by which Affidavits it Appears, That before the Date of the Carolina Charter, to this day, the Place they pretend to be Weyanoak River, was, and, is still Call'd Nottoway River; but Supposing the same had been Call'd Weyanoak River, it can be nothing to their Purpose, there being a great Difference between a River and a Creek : Besides, in that Country there are divers Rivers and Creeks of the same Name, as Potomack River and Potomack Creek, Rappahanock River and Rappahanock Creek, and several Others, though there are many Miles in distance between the Mouths of those Rivers and the Mouths of those Creeks. It is also Observable,

that the Witnesses on the part of Carolina are all very ignorant Persons, And most of them of ill Fame and Reputation, on which Account they were forced to remove from Virginia to Carolina. Further, there Appear to be many Contradictions in their Testimonies; Whereas on the Other hand, the Witnesses to prove that the Right to those Lands is in the Government of Virginia, are Persons of good Credit, their knowledge of the Tract of Land in Question is more antient than any of the Witnesses of Carolina, And their Evidence fully Corroberated by the Concurrent Testimony of the Tributary Indians. And that Right is further Confirm'd by the Observations of the Latitiude lately taken in those Parts, by which it is plain, that the Creek proved to be Weyanoak Creek by the Virginia Evidences, and Sometimes call'd Waycocon, Answers best to the Latitude describ'd in the Carolina Charter; for it lyes in 36 Degrees and 40 Minutes (which is 10 Minutes to the Northward of the Limits prescrib'd in the Carolina Grant) whereas Nottoway River, which they pretend to have been Call'd Weyanoak River, lyes exactly in the Latitude of 37 Degrees, and can by no Construction be Suppos'd to be the Boundaries Describ'd in their Charter. So that upon the whole Matter, if the Commissioners of Carolina had no Other View than to Clear the just Right of the Proprietors, such Undeniable Demonstrations would be Sufficient to Convince them; But the said Commissioners give too much Cause to Suspect, that they mix their own private Interest with the Claim of the Proprietors, And for that reason Endeavor to gain Time, in Order to Secure Grants of the Lands already unwarrantably taken up, And to Survey the Rest: On this Occasion, We take Notice that they proceed to Survey the Land in Dispute, notwithstanding the Assurance given by the Government of Carolina to the Contrary, by their Letter of the 17th of June 1707 to the Government of Virginia, by which Letter they promist that no Lands should be taken up within the Controverted Bounds, 'till the same were Setled.

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Whereupon We humbly propose, that the Lords Proprietors be Acquainted with the foregoing Complaint of the triffing Delays of their Commissioners; which Delays, 'tis reasonable to believe, have proceeded from the Self Interest of those Commissioners, And that therefore Your Majesty's Signifyed to the said Lords Proprietors, Pleasure  $\mathbf{be}$ That by the first Opportunity they Send Orders to their Governor or Commander in Chief of Carolina for the Time being, to Issue forth a New Commission, to the purport of that lately Issued, thereby Constituting Two Other Persons (not having any Personal Interest in, or Claim to any of the Lands lying within the Boundaries now in Dispute) to be Commissioners for the Setling the 'foresaid Boundaries in the room of Edward Mosely and John Lawson, The Carolina Commissioners So to be appointed, being Strictly Required to finish their Survey, And to make a Return thereof in Conjunction with the Virginia Commissioners, within Six Months to be Computed from the time that due Notice shall be given by Your Majesty's Lieutenant Governor of Virginia to the Governor or Commander in Chief of Carolina, of the Time and Place which Your Majesty's said Lieutenant Governor shall appoint for the first Meeting of the Commissioners on One part and the other. In Order whereunto We humbly Offer, that Directions be sent to the said Lieutenant Governor to give Such Notice Accordingly. And if after Notice so given the Carolina Commissioners shall refuse or Neglect to Joyn with those on the Part of Virginia, in the Making Such Survey, as likewise a Return thereof within the Time before Mentioned, That then and in such Case the Commissioners on the part of Virginia be Directed to draw up an Account of the proper Observations and Survey, which they shall have made for Ascertaining the Bounds between Virginia and Carolina, And to deliver the Same in Writing under their Hands and Seals to the Lieutenant Governor and Council of Virginia, to the end the Same may be laid before Your Majesty for Your Majesty's final Determination therein, with regard to the

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I have considered the Allegations of the said Petition, and have discoursed with severall Persons, who are well versed in the affairs of the Plantations, and some of them have seen the Modell of this Engine, and are acquainted with the Methods now used for grinding and Pressing the Sugar Canes in the West Indies, and they do inform me, that they look upon this Engine of the Petitioner to be a new Invention, and in all probability wilbe of great use to the Plantations, Wherefore I do humbly conceive, the Petitioner may be intilled to the sole making of this New invented Engine for Fourteen Years, if your Majesty shalbe graciously pleased to grant him your Royall Letters Patents according to the Prayer of his Petition. And Whereas by the abovesaid petition Severall Concessions were desired, which would be Chargeable to Her Majesty and which are not granted to Her Majestys Subjects, who take up Lands to Settle and plant there, the foresaid Graffinried and Mitchell who are authorized from the Canton of Berne, have with drawn the said Petition and given Us another proposal, a Copy whereof is hereunto Annexed, by which they propose to Settle a Colony in Virginia of about 5 or 600 persons, at their Own Charge But at first they intend only to Carry over 60, to prepare and begin a Settlement there, and they pray

That Her Majesty would be gratiously pleased to grant them Lands for such A Settlement upon the South West Branch of Potomac River.

That they may enjoy the same Advantages Liberties and Priviledges which Her Majestys Naturall born Subjects do enjoy in those parts.

That they may have a minister from their own Country who speaking their own Language will be the better able to teach and instruct them in their Religious Concerns.

They are willing to be Subject to the Laws and Government of Virginia and in all matters, Ecclesiasticall, Civil and military they will be Conformable to the Constitution of that Colony.

Whereupon having Consulted with some of the principall persons Concerned in Virginia who have testifyed to Us their ready Concurrence therewith, Wee pray Your Lordship to represent to Her Majesty Our humble Opinion, That the Settlement of Such a Colony in the place desired will be a publique benefitt and Advantage, By Strengthening the Frontier of Virginia against the French of Canada and Missisipi and by the increase of Trade and Navigation, and therefore Wee see no Objection why Her Majesty may not be graciously pleased to grant their Desire and to Direct Her Governour upon their Arrivall to Allot them Lands on the South West Branch of Potomac (which is a piece not yet Seated by any of her Majestys Subjects) in such manner and forme, and under the like Conditions Covenants and reservations of Quitt Rent, as are by the Charter and Laws of that Colony Allowed and Directed to be made, due Care being taken in all such Grants of an Equal Distribution of the proffitable and unprofitable Acres; And particularly that every patentee be Oblidged in the best and most Effectuall manner to cultivate and improve three Acres part of every fifty Acres granted to them within the Terme of Three Years, after the passing such Grant, and in Case of failure thereof, such Grant or Grants to be Void and of none Effect, according to her Majestys Additionall Instructions to Colonel Hunter Dated 19th February  $170\frac{8}{9}$  provided always that in all things they duely Conform Themselves to the Severall Acts and Laws of Trade and Navigation . heretofore made or which hereafter shall <sup>be</sup> made relateing to Her Majestys forreigne plantations.

> In Answer Whereunto they say that a Law was lately passed in Carolina for the Support and Maintenance of their Clergy, whereby a Small Duty is laid upon all Skins Exported out of that province and that by Virtue of the said Law, Some Skins were stopped till the said Duty was Paid, but on payment thereof, were immediately Discharged.

Whereupon Wee humbly take leave to Represent to Your Majesty the State of that matter, as Sett forth in the Minutes of Councill in Virginia of the 28th of Aprill 1708, And in Other Accounts Transmitted to Us from thence, whereby it appears, That Severall Indian Traders Inhabitants of that Colony, having in September then foregoing, been Tradeing with the Westerne Indians, and having purchased a Considerable Quantity of Skins and Furrs which they left in the Towns of a Certain Nation of Indians, Called the Usherees ; The Government of South Carolina, called all the said Skins, with other Goods belonging to those Virginia Traders to be Seized and Carryed to Carolina, And at the same time gave Orders (as one of them was Informed) to Seize the said Traders in their returne, to Strip them of all they had and send them back to Virginia, That one of them went afterwards to Charles Towne, to know the Cause of the Seizure; At last after an Attendance of severall Weeks, and a Considerable Expence in presents to the Governour and other Persons, upon his Entring into Bond, with a penalty of 5001. Sterling never to Cross Santee River again he procurred Restitution of some of the said Goods but the rest were Detained without any Satisfaction made or Reason given for such Treatment.

It further Appears by the said Minutes and Accounts That the president and Councill of Virginia Writ to the Governour of South Carolina to Complain of such Unjustifiable proceedings Desireing that the Bond so Extorted might be Cancelled and the abovementioned Restriction taken off, But Wee do not find that the same has yet been Complyed with.

Wherefore Wee humbly Offer to Your Majesty that the Western Indians with whom the said Trade has long been <sup>Carryed</sup> on, by the Virginia Indian Traders, are not under the Government of Carolina and Consequently that Government has no power to lay Duties on Goods Carryed to those Westerne Indians, or brought from thence, That the laying Duties on European Goods Carryed through one plantation to another, has ever been and ought Still to be Discouraged;

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That the Goods Vended in this Trade being Coarse Cloaths. Gunns, Hatchets, Beads, Powder, Shott, and other European Manufactures which the Inhabitants of Virginia Import Directly The Consumption thereof will be much from Great Britain. Lessened, if the Trade between that Colony and the said Westerne Indians is interrupted, and Carolina permitted to Ingross the same, In regard the Inhabitants of Carolina have a Constant Clandestine Trade with Currasao, and St. Thomas, and Import European Goods from those places, which they Purchase with Rum and Spirits, Nor have they Such Conveniency of Shipping from Great Britain to Supply them with European Goods as Your Majestys Subjects of Virginia have for which Reason those of Carolina Cannot Export from Great Britain so great Quantities, nor Afford to Sell what Goods they do Export at so Cheap Rates. To all which Wee may Add, That the Stopping the Indian Trade from Virginia, and permitting it to be Ingrossed by the few Inhabitants of Carolina Concerned therein will be attended with Consequences very Dangerous to Your Majestys Service and to the peace of Your Colonies in America For the Inhabitants of Carolina not being able to Supply the Indians with European Goods, for want of Conveniency of Shipping from Great Britain as has been Observed) when they have Shutt Out the people of Virginia from Tradeing, they will raise the price of their Goods as they think fitt, the Consequence Whereof will be, that, those Indians who are near Neighbours to the French at Mishasipi, will be Supplyed from thence whereby the Trade will be in Danger of being Entirely Lost, And the French have it in their power to make Use of those Indians to annoy Your Majestys Subjects in those parts. Whereas on the other hand, if this Indian Trade is left Open the Cheapness of Brittish Goods will not only Secure the Friendship of the Indians already known but give an Incouragement to Your Majestys Subjects there to Attempt the Opening a Trade with other Indians Yet Undiscovered.

For these reasons Wee look upon this Duty (which as Wee are Informed is heavy and Equal to a prohibition) or any

other restriction on that Trade with regard to the Virginia Indian Traders to be highly Injurious and prejudiciall to Your Majestys Subjects, and are therefore of Opinion that the same ought to be taken off and the Trade left Free and Open to Virginia.

In Order Whereunto Wee humbly propose, That Your Majesty will be pleased to Signifye Your Royall pleasure to the Lords proprietors of Carolina That they give Directions to their Governour not to Demand or Levy the said Duty upon any goods or merchandizes which shall be Carryed by the Virgina Indian Traders to the Western Indians or which shall be brought back from thence by Way of Trade but that the said Trade be permitted to be Carryed on Without any let hindrance or molestation whatever, And that the said Governour of Carolina be Reqired to Transmitt to the Commander in Cheif Virginia the Bond so Extorted in Order to be Cancelled. [pp. 430-3.]

[Orders in accordance with a representation from the Board of Trade of 19 Dec., 1712.] A Complaint having been made from Virginia in 1709 of Obstructions the Virginia Indian Traders mett with in their Trade with the Western Indians from the People of Carolina by reason of a Law passed in that Province for Laying Duty on Skins Exported out of Carolina, and that matter having been fully Laid before Your Majesty with the Consequences of the said Obstructions, Your Majesty was pleased to direct the Lords Proprietors of Carolina to Give Orders to their Governor there not to demand or Levy the said Duty, upon any Goods or Merchandizes, which Shall be Carried by the Virginia Indian Traders to the Western Indians, or which shall be brought back from thence by way of Trade, But that the said Trade be permitted to be Carried on without any lett, hindrance or molestation whatsoever.

Notwithstanding which Wee are informed by a Letter from Colonel Spotswood Lieutenant Governor of Virginia, that the Government of Carolina did in July 1711 pass an other Act, whereby they Impose the Duty and all the hardships upon (1713.) 8 Jan.

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the Virginia Indian Traders which your Majesty Gratiously intended to remedy by the forementioned directions a Copy of which Act as transmitted to Us by Colonel Spotswood, We take Leave to annex thereunto.

The pretence for Exacting the said duty and imposing the said Hardships, is, that the Virginia Indian Traders in Going to the Western Indians pass through the Province of Carolina the Boundaries whereof are not yet settled: And notwithstanding the Signification of your Majestys pleasure the 1st March 1710 to the Lords Proprietors, to appoint Commissioners to meet with others on the part of Virginia, the Same has not yet been done, though the Lieutenant-Governor of Virginia has often prest the Government of Carolina to it, they pretending they had no directions; Wherefore Wee humbly Offer that your Majesty be pleased to renew your Majestys directions to the said Lords Proprietors, that they may immediately Appoint Commissioners to Meet with those of Virginia for that purpose.

Wee further humbly Offer that your Majesty be likewise pleased to signify your Royall pleasure to the said Lords proprietors of Carolina, that they immediately (if the same be not already done) take care that the foresaid Act passed in July 1711 so prejudiciall to your Majesty's Subjects of Virginia be repealed. Penn Proprietary of that province for Making and Enacting Laws, there is 5 years time-Allowed to him to lay his Laws before Her Majesty, and but 6 Months to Her Majesty to Consider thereof; whereby it may happen, that so great a Number of Laws may be at one time transmitted, as that it may without difficulty be impossible, Considering the other Business That may intervene, to Examine the same as they ought to be : And also representing another ill Consequence of a Clause in the said Charter, That temporary Laws prejudicial to the Trade of Her Majestys other Subjects may be Enacted there which will Expire before Mr. Penn is Obliged to Lay the Same before Her Majesty Which the said Lords Commissioners judge unreasonable, and a Burthen on the Trade and Navigation of this Kingdom, as well as an invading Her Majestys right of repealing such Laws as may be prejudicial to Her Majestys interest and the Trade of Her Subjects: And Her Majesty being likewise informed that there is the like practice in most of her plantations in America for Making Laws to Continue and be in force one Year only whereby her Prerogative of disapproving or Confirming such Laws is also invaded. It is Ordered by Her Majesty in Councill That the Consideration of these matters be and it is hereby referred to <sup>a</sup> Committee of the whole Councill, Who are at the same time to Examine into the State of the Agreement with Mr. Penn for surrendring the Government of Pensilvania into Her

Board of Trade]: We have considered a Petition in behalf of Francis Pouch of Antegoa and Daniel Gashet of Martinico, Setting forth, That a ffrench Sloop called the Society, belonging to the said Gashet, having on board Brandy, Wine and other Goods for Guardaloupa, was in June 1708 by Order of the Governor of Martinico pressed, and not allowed Time to unlade, to carry the English Prisoners as a Flagg of Truce to Guardaloupa, where she was to take in One Lapoterye, appointed to manage the Exchange of Prisoners, and from thence was to sail to Antegoa; That being near Guardaloupa, the English Prisoners on board, coming in Sight of Her Majesty's Ship the Hector, forced the said fflagg of Truce to Change her Course, and bear down upon Your Majesty's said Ship who <sup>took</sup> her, and Carried her into Antegoa, where, upon a Tryal, the Sloop was Cleared, but the goods on board Condemn'd as Prize.

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That some time after this the Sloop St. John Baptist, belonging to the Petitioner Pouch, was laden with Goods for Montserrat, and in like manner pressed without having time to Unlade, by Order of Colonel Parke to go as a Flagg of Truce with firench Prisoners to Martinico, and in her Voyage thither was mett and plundered by a firench Privateer; That upon Complaint thereof the Governor of Martinico caused Restitution to be made of all, but so much as amounted to an Equivalent for the Goods taken on board the firench Sloop Society, which he detained as Reprizal; Wherefore the Petitioners humbly pray, That Satisfaction may be made, and some method taken to prevent Such Violences to be Used on either side for the future.

Upon this We humbly take Leave to Represent, that though Several Papers under the hands and Seals of the Governor, Intendant and Notary Publick of Martinico have been produced to Us, in Order to make Good the Allegations in the said Petition, relating to the ffrench Sloop; Yet We have reason to believe from Several Instances, that the whole proceeding was with intent to Colour an Illegal Trade; Some of which Instances We shall humbly lay before Your Majesty as follows,

The Two Sloops were in the like Case; The firench Sloop was pretended to be loaded for Guardaloupa, but pressed to go to Antegoa, and the British Sloop was likewise pretended to be loaded for Montserrat, but pressed to go to Martinico: This has the appearance of a Contrivance to Carry on an Illegal Trade, especially Considering that the said British Sloop Carryed but Two firench Prisoners as We find by a memorial presented to Colonel Parke and the Council of Antegoa by the aforementioned L'aposterye, which in Our humble Opinion did not deserve the Expence of a Flagg of Truce, if there was no other Intention in the Voyage.

It further appears by the Tryal of the said ffrench sloop at Antegoa (a Copy whereof has been laid before Us) That one of the Witnesses who had been a Prisoner at Martinico,

Declared upon Oath, That the Petitioner Gashet told him There, That he had Goods on board the said Sloop which were to be landed at St. Christopher's. In Answer to which the said Gashet Said, That part of the loading of the said Sloop Consisting of Beef, it was not reasonable to believe the Same was Intended for Your Majesty's Islands, from whence the ffrench commonly have such Provisions, which is another Confirmation of such Illegal Trade being Carried on there.

We further find, That another fflagg of Truce had been sent from the Leeward Islands in May 1708 loaden with Beef for Martinico, where it was publickly Sold.

There are several Other Instances of an Illegal Trade Carryed on from the Leeward Islands, Barbadoes, and Other of Your Majesty's Plantations, by means of such fflaggs of Truce; But We think These are sufficient to trouble Your Majesty with at present, And therefore are of Opinion, that there is no Reason why Your Majesty should Gratify the Petitioners, by Directing a Restitution as is desired by the Petition.; And That for preventing the like Illegal Practices for the future, Your Majesty's Pleasure be Signifyed to the Several Governors, That whenever they have Occasion to send out Flaggs of Truce, no more Goods or Provisions be permitted to be laden on board such Vessells than what shall be necessary for the Voyage.

That by One Clause of his Instructions he is Required, To take Care that in all Patents of Lands for the future, there be a Covenant to Oblidge the Patentees to Plant, Settle and Effectually Cultivate at least 3 Acres of Land for every 50 Acres within 3 years after the Date of their respective Patents, upon Penalty of Forfeiture of every such Grant.

Upon which the said Governor Observes, that most of the Unpatented Lands lye Remote and very much Exposed to the French of Canada, and their Indians, so that during the War, no Settlement can with safety be Attempted on the Frontiers, whereby your Majesty loses so much of Quit-Rents as would Arise from the Grants of such Lands, Wherefore We humbly Offer that Your Majesty be pleased to Allow of an Alteration in the said Instructions, vizt. That the Covenant in every Grant of Land on the Frontiers be to Plant, Settle and Effectually Cutlivate at least 3 Acres for every 50 Acres of Lands in 3 Years after the End of the present War with France, which will Encrease Your Majesty's Quit Rents in the mean while, and Facilitate the Seating of the Frontiers after a Peace, and that Your Majesty's Pleasure [pp. 142-3.] herein be Signifyed to the said Governor.

[An instruction for the Governor of Maryland ordered to be prepared in accordance with the following report of the Board of Trade of 8 May -- Wee have considered the Address of the General Assembly of Maryland, wherein they complain of some Hardships they lye under with regard to the Freight of British Shipping, employed in the Tobacco Trade of that Province particularly, in that the Gauge of the Tobacco Hogsheads is not allowed to be Two Inches in the Diameter of the Head longer than those of Virginia, To justify which Encrease of Measure, they say that Maryland Tobacco being more Chaffy, and consequently much lighter than that of Virginia, 3200li. weight of the Virginia is generally brought hither as cheap as 2200li. weight of the Maryland Tobacco And therefore pray they may be permitted to pass a Law for the making their Tobacco Hogsheads Two Inches in the Diameter of the Head, larger then those of Virginia, yet of equal length with them.

Whereupon Wee take Leave to Represent to your Majesty That an Act having been sometime since pass'd by the General Assembly of that Province, whereby it was Enacted That the Gauge of Tobacco Hogsheads to be made there, should be larger than that of Virginia Hogsheads according to the abovementioned difference of Proportion And Wee having laid the said Act before Your Majesty the 23rd of March  $170\frac{2}{5}$  with our humble Opinion that for the Reasons then given the same was unfit to be approved, Your Majesty was pleased by your Order in Council of the 20th of April 1708, to repeal the said Act, and notwithstanding any thing in the said Address, We are still of Opinion, that the Maryland Hogsheads ought to be of the same size as those of Virginia.

That though the sweet sented Virginia Tobacco will bear Pressing better than the Maryland Tobacco, and consequently a Hogshead of the former sort will weigh considerably more than a Hogshead of the latter; Yet the Virginia Tobacco by being press'd too close, dos frequently become Black and of less value, whereby, the Owner thereof looses in Price, what

Besides Wee are inform'd. That in he gets in Freight. several parts of Virginia particularly on James's River, the same sort of Tobacco is produced as in Maryland so that it were but reasonable, that the like Encrease of Measure in the size of Tobacco Hogsheads should be allowed to the Planters in those parts of Virginia as is desired by the People of Maryland, which would be a considerable Loss to the Owners of Shipping with regard to Stowage, The Ships employed in the Tobacco Trade being built to the Size of the Virginia Hogsheads, that is, to contain in the Hold seven Hogsheads in depth, Whereas should the Maryland Hogsheads be Two Inches larger in the Diameter of the Head, those ships would contain but six Hogsheads and an half in depth, were a Hogshead divided into Two, So that the Owners of Shipping wilbe under a necessity, either of Cropping the Hogsheads of building New Ships, or of leaving off that Trade.

Wee have likewise been inform'd, that if the Maryland Planters should take the same care (which some of them do) in Packing their Tobacco, as is taken by the Planters in Virginia, every Hogshead would contain near a Fourth part more than it now usually contains, for 'tis found by Experience, that sometimes a Maryland Tobacco Hogshead is from seven to 800 weight, which is as heavy as a Hogshead of the light sort of Tobacco from Virginia.

The Generall Assembly dos complain in this their said Address of frequent abuses committed by the Masters of Ships in Cropping the Hogsheads, whereby great Quantitys of Tobacco are much damaged; For remedy whereof the Assembly say they found it necessary to pass an Act, but the same has since been repealed by your Majesty Whereupon Wee further take Leave humbly to Represent to your Majesty, That the abovementioned Act concerning the Gauge of Tobacco Hogsheads, and the other against Cropping them, were Repealed at the same time by Your Majestys aforesaid Order in Council, in regard it was not thought reasonable, that One should continue in force, and not the other, that is the Masters of Ships

1711.

subject to a Penalty of Cropping the Hogsheads, and yet the Planters under no Tye as to a reasonable Gauge of them, Besides that the Penalty in the Act against Cropping was much greater than in the other.

As to the passing a New Law in Maryland for preventing the Cropping Tobacco Hogsheads, The Owners of Shipping employed in that Trade, who have attended us on this occasion, do say they have no Objection thereto, Provided a Law be passed there at the same time to reduce the Maryland Hogshead to the Size of that made in Virginia, and that the Penalty be the same in both Laws which appears to us very reasonable. Wherefore Wee humbly offer, that your Majestys Pleasure be signifyed to the Governor or Comander in Cheff of the Province of Maryland for the time being to acquaint the said General Assembly, that they may pass Two Acts for the several purposes with a like Penalty for enforcing the same as aforesaid.

Lastly, They desire that when any Merchant or other Person dos apply to Your Majesty in opposition to any of their Laws, they may have an opportunity of being heard in support of them. This wee have always lookt upon as a Rule of Common Justice, and have accordingly observed it in all Matters that have come before Us, with regard to such of the Plantations as have an Agent or Agents, which at present is not the Case of the People of Maryland, who for some years past has had no Agent here. But when a Law pass'd there shalbe transmitted hither in order to its being laid before Your Majesty and the same shalbe lyable to such Objections as not to be fit for your Royall Assent, Wee cannot think it advisable, that the said Act should nevertheless continue in force, till those Objections are communicated to the General Assembly of Maryland, and Answers thereto returned from them, whereby the Mischiefs or Hardships complained of in such Law must necessarily continue a much longer time than would be fitting.

Therefore We humbly propose, that it be recommended to them to appoint some fitt Person or Persons residing here

to be Agent or Agents for that Province, who being fully empowered and instructed may from time to time, as occasion shall require take care of and negotiate all such Matters as may concern the said Province. [pp. 252-3.]

[The objection made by the President, Council, and General 14 June. Assembly of Maryland to the Governor's having the Seal is that in an appeal from the Chancery Court to the Governor and Council, the Governor acts as judge of his own decree. Order is given in accordance with the report of the Lords of Trade] that the Inconvenience complained of is occasioned by an Act passed in October 1704 Entituled an Act for Appeals and Regulating Writs of Error, whereby all the Matters and Clauses that were conteyned in an Act with the same Title which passed in July 1699 are Revived and Reenacted And therefore humbly Offering their Opinion, That Her Majesty would be pleased to signify her Disallowance of both the said Acts, Which being repealed, a Power of bringing Appeals and Writs of Error from the inferior Courts to the Governor and Council, and from thence to Her Majesty in Council here will subsist by Her Majestys Instructions to the Governor, in like manner as is practised in other Plantations in America, and will best answer the abovementioned Address. of Exchange drawn by the Engineer upon the Honourable The Pay-Masters of Her Majesty's Ordnance, the truth of which may be known by Reviewing the Accounts for the Year 1707, wherein Your Lordships will find Charg'd upon the Government three Setts of Bills of Exchange drawn by Robert Latham for three Hundred and odd pounds, Value received of William Keen, which Value was Rum, Molosses and Tobacco Sold Major Lloyd by Messrs. Andw. and Jona. Belcher, and deliver'd by me according to a Contract between the said Belcher and Lloyd. Mr. Belcher being to Supply Lloyd with Rum, Molosses and Tobacco, to the Value of Fifteen Hundred or Two Thousand Pounds Sterling, And to receive in Exchange Good Bills payable to them or their Order. 2dly. Your Lordships will find the Government Charged

with Several Summs of mony paid for Palisadoes, and Repairing the Garrisons, which Article is Utterly false, the Inhabitants of Newfoundland having constantly Supply'd the Commanding Officer with what Palisadoes have been demanded at their own proper Charge from the year 1706, untill the taking of the Garrisons by the ffrench.

3. At the Yearly Survey of Provisions, such as were Condemned (instead of being thrown into the Sea) were resalted, And the Condemned Bread pack'd in Cask and Serv'd out to the Soldiers, And the good Provisions, under pretence of being lent to the Inhabitants were Sold them, And the Value paid to the Order of Major Lloyd. The Steward that deliver'd the Provisions was One Mr. William I'anson Factor for Major Lloyd and Quarter Gunner to the Garrison.

4. It has been the Custom of the Officer to lett out Soldiers to hire, during the ffishing Season, for which the Officer receiv'd from Twelve to Eighteen pounds each man. The Hardships the Soldiers underwent during Major Lloyd's command, put them upon Committing Several Robberies, as breaking open Her Majesty's Store for Provisions, and Several Merchants Storehouses, taking Provisions and Cloathing to a Considerable Value.

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5thly. Some time before the taking of St. John's, Her Majesty's Arms and Ammunition were deliver'd out to the Several Commanders of the Militia for their respective Companys, with Two Charges of Powder and Ball for each man and no more, although Major Lloyd Oblig'd the Commanders of the Militia to give their Receipts for four Charges of Powder and Ball upon his promise of delivering the remaining Two Charges before they should have Occasion, which Promise was never performed.

6. On the 2nd of November 1708, One Neal a Canadian and firench Prisoner at St. John's, was Transporting himself in the William Pink for New England in Order to be Exchang'd; But Major Lloyd Ordered him on Shore and made him Officiate as Gunner. This Neal was Officer of the Guard the Morning the Fort was taken and not punished by the firench as an Offender, when an other Prisoner that had taken up Arms in the English Service, was Condemn'd to the Gallies.

7. The 21st December about 4 in the Morning the Garrison was attackt by 156 ffrench men and four Indians, And taken in less than half an hour, no Defence being made, nor One Cannon fired from the Fort, although the Centinel in the New Garrison (where the Inhabitants Guard was kept) Advertis'd the Centinel of the Fort of the Enemy's Approach, neither did the Soldiers come out of their Barracks, excepting Some Eight or Ten Men of which One was a Serjeant. Major Lloyd was taken in his Gown just risen from his Bed, Capt. Gully in his Chamber Sick of the Gout, and Mr. Phillips Lieutenant had been suspended by Major Lloyd some time before.

After the Surrender of the Fort the Castle took the Alarm, but for want of an Officer, it was Surrendered the 22nd December without firing a Gun.

Her Majesty taking the said Memorial into Consideration is pleased with the Advice of Her Privy Councill to refer the Same to the Principal Officers of Her Majesty's Ordnance, and to the Lords Commissioners of Trade and Plantations, who are to take Care to stop the Payment of any Monys, that shall

be found due to the late Major Thomas Lloyd for his Pay or for Disbursements at Newfoundland during his Command There, or in any Other manner whatsoever: And are to be also Carefull to prevent for the future the Abuses Sett forth in the said Memorial, whenever Her Majesty shall think fit to send another Commander into those Parts. [pp. 197-8.]

The last Act of Assembly whereby a Revenue was Granted to Your Majesty for Defraying the publick Charges of that Government, Expired the 18th of May 1709; The Governor who Arrived There in June 1710, did on the first of September following, in his Speech at his Opening the first Session of Assembly, among other things earnestly Recommend to them, the providing a fitting and necessary Supply for the Service of Your Majesty's Government, And that they would take Care to restore the Publick Credit. In Order whereunto, at the Desire of the Assembly an Estimate of the Yearly Charge of that Government was laid before them, Part of which Estimate they disallow'd, And prepared another Estimate of the Charges of that Government.

On the 25th of October following, the Assembly Voted Two thousand Five Hundred Ounces of Silver, towards Defraying the Governor's necessary Expences for One Year; The Value of which Quantity of Silver he computes at little more than half of what Your Majesty has been pleased to appoint for his Salary; Whereupon he Communicated to them, that Part of Your Majesty's Instructions, whereby he is Impowered to receive to his own Use as Governor Twelve Hundred Pounds Sterling a Year, out of the publick Revenue of that Province, And Added, that he presumed They would not Dispute Your Majesty's Right of appointing a Salary for the Use of Your Governor.

They struck out some Entire Articles in the said Estimate of the Yearly Charge of that Government, And Retrenched Others to less than One half, though some of the Members proposed, That what the Governor Offered, might be further Considered, and one of them having prest it with some Warmth was Thereupon Expell'd the Assembly. Afterwards on the

2nd of November they Voted Twelve Hundred Pounds more, for Defraying the Charge of the Government and for the Security of the Frontiers.

On the 6th of November following a Bill was brought into the Assembly, giving a Power to the Treasurer of that Province, out of the Publick Treasure lying in his hands (unappropriated) to Issue Five Thousand, Six Hundred and sixty seven Ounces and a Half of Silver, for the Use of the Garrison and other the Uses therein particularly mentioned : Which Summ the Governor informs Us was little more than half of what was necessary, and very much less than what has Usually been Allowed for those Services.

To this Bill the Council made an Amendment, by which the Mony was Directed to be issued by Warrant of the Governor, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Councill, Conformable to Your Majesty's Instructions in that behalf, And to former Practice there. The Assembly Disagreed to this Amendment, And there were several Conferences between the Council and Assembly on the Subject Matter of that Amendment, without any good Effect. Whereupon the Governor found himself Obliged on the 25th of the said November last to prorogue the Assembly to the first of March next, in hopes they will Then meet in a better Temper. In the mean time by this Proceeding of the Assembly there is no Provision made for the Payment of the said Governor's Salary, or for Defraying the Other Publick and Necessary Charges of that Government; Except what may Arise from the Two Acts past that Session . <sup>for</sup> setling an Excise on Strong Liquors, and for laying Dutys on the Tonage of Vessells and Slaves; All which 'tis Computed will fall much short of the 'forementioned Services.

The Governor has inform'd Us, of what Reasons some of the Members of the Assembly give for their not providing for the Support of that Government as formerly, with his Observations upon Such their pretended Reasons. And We further beg Leave humbly to lay the same before Your Majesty,

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They pretend that the Expence of that Province on Account of the late intended Expedition against Canada, has so Impoverish'd them, That they are not able to Raise Mony to Answer the Usual Charge of the Government: Upon which the Governor Observes, that the Service of that Expedition was defrayed by a Land-Tax (the greatest part whereof we presume was spent among themselves) whereas the Mony given for the Charge of the Government, was usually Raised by Dutys on Goods Imported and Exported, and on Excise.

Another Reason they give is, That the Misapplication of Revenues formerly Granted, has, as they Alledge, brought a Considerable Debt on the Country.

To Remove that Objection the Governor proposed to several Members of the Assembly, That a Clause might be inserted in the Revenue Bill, to Oblige the Receiver General to be Accomptable to the Assembly as well as to Your Majesty; That such other Clauses might be Added, as would Effectually Restrain the Governor and Councill from loading the Country with further Debts by any Payment to be Issued out of the Revenue.

But 'tis believ'd the true Reasons of this Proceeding of the Assembly, are, First, That in a Great Measure some of the Neighbouring Governments are Exempted from so great a Charge.

As to this, the Governor Observes, That the Province of the Massachusets Bay is at Twenty Thousand Pounds yearly Charge, for the Defence of their firontiers, whilst those of New York, are for the most Part Defended and Secured by Your Majesty's Regular Forces There.

Another Reason is, That by Act of Assembly every Assembly man being allowed Six Shillings a day, during the sitting of the Assembly, the better to secure his being Chosen from time to time, he only Considers the saving of the Country's mony, without having any manner of Regard to the necessary Services of the Government.

Lastly, the Governor adds, That of late a Notion has very much prevailed among those People, that Your Majesty has

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not a Power of Appointing Salaries out of the Revenue Raised by them, and the pretended Right they have Assumed to themselves of Retrenching the Governor's Salary, in the manner beforementioned, is founded on that Notion, which in Our Opinion, should not be Countenanced.

This being a State of the Difficulties the Governor has met with from the Assembly, in relation to his procuring the Grant of a Revenue, as it appears to Us from the Journal of Assembly, and from the Governor's Letters, We beg Leave to Offer to Your Majesty Our humble Opinion,

That Your Majesty's said Governor be Directed to Represent to the Assembly, That it being Your Majesty's Undoubted Prerogative to Constitute a Governor of that Province, with an appointment of such Salary as your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom, has judged Suitable to the Character, and necessary for the Support and Maintenance of that Government, it has therefore been justly displeasing to Your Majesty, to find they have Refused or Neglected to make the like Sufficient Provision for the 'foresaid purpose, as has been made in the time of Your Majesty's late Governors. And Thereupon that the said Governor be further Directed in the most Effectual manner to Recommend to them the Granting the like Revenue for the Support and Maintenance of that Government, as has Usually been Granted. And the better to induce the Assembly to Comply therein, We humbly Conceive it may be proper to intimate to them, that if they shall persist in refusing or Neglecting to provide for the Necessary Support and Maintenance of that Government under the Administration of Your Majesty's present Governor, in like manner as the same has hitherto been Supported and Maintained, they must Expect, that such their Refusal or Neglect will give a just Occasion to the passing an Act by the Parliament of Great Britain, for Granting to Your Majesty the like Revenue to Arise, and be paid there, for the Support and Maintenance of that Government as has Usually been granted by Act of Assembly for that Service.

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Her Majesty in Councill Approving of the said Representation is pleased to Order, as it is hereby Ordered, that the Right Honourable The Lords Commissioners of Trade and Plantations do forthwith draw up Heads of a Bill to be layd before the Parliament of Great Britain for Enacting a Standing Revenue of what has been Usually Allowed within the Province of New York for the Support of the Governor there, and the necessary Expences of the Government, according to former Acts of Assembly: And that they present the same to Her Majesty at this Board, in Order to Her Majesty's further Pleasure Therein. In further Obedience to Your Majesty's Order in Councill of the 23rd of May last, we have also considered the Petition of the said Robert Lowther Esqr. setting forth, that a Controversy having arisen between him and the forementioned Alexander Skene, about severall Fees and Perquisites, he had referr'd the matter in dispute to the Councill and Assembly of that Island; That they had upon Examination reported the said Governor's Right to the said Fees and therefore praying that Your Majesty will be graciously pleas'd to permit such person as he shall appoint to be his Private Secretary to receive the same.

That Your Majesty in the first year of Your Reign was pleas'd to Grant to the said Skene by Letters Patents the severall Places following Vizt. The Office of Secretary of Barbados, The Office and Place of Secretary to the Governor, The Office and Place of Secretary to the Governor and Councill for the time being, and to the Councill in the Absence of a Governor, together with the Office and Place of Clerk to the Severall Courts in that Island, with all the Rights Profits, Advantages, Fees Rewards, Powers and Emoluments, to the said severall Offices respectively belonging.

In the time of the late Governor a Dispute upon the same Account happen'd between him and the said Skene and upon a hearing of that matter before Your Majesty's then Commissioners of Trade and Plantations and their Representation to Your Majesty thereupon, Your Majesty was pleas'd to Order, that the said Skene be restored to the Severall Places granted him by Your Majesty, and to the Enjoyment of all the Rights, Profits, Fees and Advantages thereunto belonging, and upon the passing of the present Governor's Instructions a Clause was inserted by Your Majesty's Order, taking notice, that though Your Majesty had been pleas'd to send the forementioned Orders to the former Governor, the same had not been complied with, and therefore directing him the present Governor immediately upon his arrivall in Barbados to admit the said Skene to his Places and to the Enjoyment of his Fees as aforesaid.

Upon the whole, we are humbly of Opinion, that the Governor has no Right to any of the Fees which are Settled on the Secretary by an Act of Assembly pass'd the 21st of October 1670. And that the Governor's demanding the same or any part thereof is an Encroachment upon Your Majesty's Patent.

That there appears to Us no good reasons for Suspending the Petitioner for that had he been Guilty of taking undue

Fees (as alledged in the foresaid Report of the Councill and Assembly) he might have been proceeded against there, by virtue of the abovesaid Act, to the Forfeiture of his Office, That in Case the said Governor shall think fit to employ a private Secretary he himself ought to make him an Allowance for it, and We humbly offer that Your Majesty's Royal Pleasure and express Commands be Signified to the Governor, that he immediately restore the said Skene to the Severall Places granted him by Your Majesty's foresaid Letters Patents and to the Enjoyment of all the Rights Profits Advantages and Fees thereunto belonging on pain of Your Majesty's Highest Displeasure.

We are further humbly of Opinion in case Your Majesty shall approve hereof, that the said Skene is justly Entitled to all the Fees and Profits that have Accrued since his Suspension to the time of his Restoration.

And we further humbly Offer if any Patent Officer shall at any time for the future be suspended, the Persons appointed to Execute the Place, do give Sufficient Security to the Party Suspended to be answerable to him for the Profits accruing during such Suspension, in Case he be restored.

And the third Article Chargeing him contrary to her Majestys Instructions, by Which he was prohibited from taking any other reward from the Islands than 400*l*. per Annum for the Hire of a House, had notwithstanding prevailed on the Several Assemblys to make him the following Allowances; Vizt. From Antegoa, 1000*l*. per Annum and a present of 500*l*. and soon after in Lieu thereof; the Imposts on Liquors, which had always been Applyed as the clearest Revenue towards the Expences of the Government 100,000 Weight of Sugar from St. Christophers and 300*l*. per Annum from Montserrat with a present of Sugar, and Indicoe, both which Articles were sufficiently made out.

As to the 4th and 5th The Charge Contained in them, being general for want of Conduct against the French at their Invasion, and for Corruption in Administring Justice as Chancellor, Their Lordships did not Enter into the Examination of them.

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The 6th Article Chargeing him, with having Entered in the Council Book of Antegoa a Minute, that his Behavior as Governor was honourable Prudent and fortunate; it Appeared to their Lordships the same was done by the Governors means, without privity of the Council.

The 7th Article by which he is Accused to have sent to Great Britaine, for his own Use, the plate Given by her Majesty for the Service of the Governors Chappell in the Leeward Islands, was made out by Captaine Constable, Who brought it over by the Colonels Directions, as old fashioned plate his Wife had no Occasion for, and has been since Secured by the proper Officers, and restored to the Island.

That the Petitioners Correspondents there, in order to prevent further Damage, entered into a Bond of one thousand pounds penalty, to produce a Certificate of the Said Ships being duly Qualified to trade to your Majestys Plantations, Which is impossible for them to do; For that the Said Ship was Foreign built as aforesaid and has not been made free in this Kingdome though that was unknown to the Said Correspondents, at the time the Said Bond was Given; Wherefore the Petitioner prays that Directions may be Given to the Judge of the Admiralty in that Island, to Stop all further proceedings for the Condemnation of the said Ship and Cargo, and that the aforemention'd Bond may be given up. All which We have Considered, and for any thing that appears to Us, the Allegations therein Contained seem to be true; Upon which, We are humbly of Opinion, Supposing the Case is fairly Stated, the Ship being Foreign built and not made ffree in Case She went to trade there was with her Lading liable to be forfeited, by the Act of the 7th and 8th of King William; But if She was forced into Antegoa, for the preservation of the Ship and Men, as set forth in the petition without any Intention of unloading Goods there as Appears by affidavits, the Ship or Goods would not be forfeited thereby; And the Owners having Claimed the Goods, may Appeale to your Majesty in Councill, if the Goods shall be Condemned in Antegoa. But We must here humbly take leave to Observe to Your Royal Highness, that the whole Country between the River Sagadehoc and Nova Scotia has already, by his late Majesty King Williams Royall Charter of the 7th October 1691 to the Inhabitants of the Province of the Massachusets Bay been Granted to them with power to make and pass Grants of particular Tracts of Land within that province, but with a Reservation nevertheless that no Grants

of any Lands between the River Sagadehoc and the Gulph of St. Lawrence (in which the Lands petitioned for are included) Should be of any Force until His Majesty His Heirs or Successors Shall have Signifyed His or Their Approbation of the same : But as the Purchasers from the Indians were in possesion Thirty Years before the Grant of the abovementioned Charter to the Massachusetts Bay, They Conceive the said Charter will not be any Impediment to His Majestys Confirmation of their Titles; and Mr. Dummer late Agent of that Colony has Assured us that He had formerly Directions from them to Encourage as much as possible the Settlement of the Eastern parts, and, not to Oppose a proposition then made of the like nature ; And that he has reason to believe they would be very well pleased with such a Settlement from the Advantage they would receive by it.

Ansr. We are of opinion, that where the Murther is comitted in the piracy It was his Majestys Intentions, to pardon the Murther so Comitted; And that therefore it may be reasonable in the Instructions to His Majestys Governors to direct them to insert in the pardons by them to be passed of the piracys and Robberys comitted on the High Seas, a pardon of all Murthers Comitted in the same.

3dly. Whether the persons who have comitted any Robberys or piracys, or any other by that Title, can hold the Moneys and Effects they may be so possessed of, and not be liable to be prosecuted for them.

Ansr. Wee are of Opinion that as to the proper Goods of the pyrates, they being pardoned, the same will not be forfeited, but they may retain them to their own Use; but as to the Goods of other persons which they have taken unlawfully from them, the property thereof by such taking is not altered, but the Owners notwithstanding any pardon, may retake them, or they may recover the same, by an Action to be brought against the Robbers for the same.

4thly. Whether if any Persons having Notice of this proclamation should between such Notice and the 5th day of January next, Committ any pyracies or Robberys, are entitled to the benefitt of it.

Ansr. We are of opinion that there is no Exception of any Notice in the proclamation, and His Majesty has been pleased to Give His Royall Promise, which He will never break to pardon Pyrates Surrendring themselves, all pyracys comitted or to be Committed before the said 5th day of January, and for preventing the Mischiefs hinted at in this Query, His Majestys Officers are to be diligent in apprehending all pyrates; for His Majesty has not been pleased to promise pardon to any pyrates but such as Surrender voluntarily according to the Terms of the proclamation. That the Act lays a higher duty upon the Trade and Shipping of all other his Majestys Subjects than those of Jamaica.

That the Inhabitants of the two parishes of St. Iago de la Vega and Kingston are to pay twelve pence per pound for the rent of every House, although the rest of the Island is not charged with any Tax on that Account.

That by the said Act Commissioners are appointed to receive and to Distribute the Money arising thereby, with an Allowance of  $7\frac{1}{2}$  per Cent. in Diminution of His Majestys Royall

prerogative, and in prejudice of the Receiver Generall, His Majestys patent Officer. These Commissioners are to give Bond of Eight Thousand pounds for the due Execution of the Act, and notwithstanding they shall have performed all that is required by the Act, and by consequence the Bond become void, it is not to be cancelled but in the presence of the president of the Councill, and of the Speaker of the Assembly, and if any person shall presume to do, or advise the contrary, they Shall forfeit double the penalty of the Bond, without allowing any pardon, or Non vult ulterius prosequi.

Besides, in Several other clauses of the Act, His Majestys prerogative of pardon, or granting a Non Vult ulterius prosequi is taken away.

All Fines Forfeitures and Escheats are Applyed and appropriated to the Support of the Government of the Island and the Contingent charges thereof :--That it appears to Us That the Estate late Wilhelmina Kupius's escheated to the Crown, in the year 1711, was Valued by a Jury at one thousand four hundred and fifty Six pounds; That the Lord Archibald Hamilton, then Governor of the Island (though he was empowered by the first of the beforementioned Laws to make immediately a Grant of the said Escheated Estate, yet being Restrained by his Instructions from her late Majesty from granting any Escheats, till upon his having Signifyed to the Lord High Treasurer, or to the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury for the time being, the Value, Nature, and Occasion of such Escheats, he should receive her Majestys pleasure thereupon) He forbore making any Grant of the said Escheated Estate, but agreable to his Instructions, represented it to the then Lord High Treasurer, and at the same time recommended Anthony Swymmer Esqr.

one of the present petitioners as a person properly deserving the said Grant, for reasons which we find mentioned in a Letter from this Board, to the then Lord High Treasurer.-That however this matter continued undetermined, 'till his Majestvs Accession to the Crown, when upon a Complaint that the aforesaid Instruction given by her late Majesty, concerning Escheats, was contrary to the Laws of that Island; His Majesty was pleased, upon a Representation from this Board, and the opinion of the Attorney Generall to Direct that the Governor of Jamaica should be left to Act in the granting of Escheats, pursuant to the Laws of that Island; And the Lord Archibald Hamilton received Instructions accordingly, dated the 6th May 1715. Upon receiving Which Instructions Wee find that Lord Archibald Hamilton, did Grant, on the 23d of July 1715, the Escheated Estate of Anna Williamina Bernarda Kupius to the petitioners by Letters patents under the Great Seale of that Island, agreeably to the forementioned Act for prevention of Law Suits, and that these Letters Patents, were duly Entered, Recorded and Enrolled in the Secretarys Office of Enrollments, Established in that Island.

Wee Observe indeed, that His Majestys Warrant for Granting the said Escheats to Edward Nichols Esqr. is dated the 30th of Aprill preceding the date of the Grant made by the Lord Archibald Hamilton, but that Mr. Secretary Stanhopes Letter to the Lord Archibald, Signifying to him, His Majestys pleasure concerning that Warrant, and accompanying the Warrant itself, was dated on the 28th of November Subsequent to the Grant made in Favour of the Petitioners and that The said Letter from Mr. Secretary Stanhope with the Warrant were , not delivered to the Lord Archibald Hamilton, till the 6th of February following being in 1715/6: Which was seven Months after the Grant had been made to the petitioners Which Wee find his Lordship mentions in a Letter to Mr. Secretary Stanhope of the 10th of the same February, as the reason why it was not in his power to Execute his Majestys Commands in favour of Edwd, Nichols Esgr.

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Wee find nothing further done in this matter till the 17th of July 1716, of which Date there was a Warrant from his Royall Highness the prince of Wales then Guardian of Great Britaine to Peter Heywood Esqr. Commander in Chief of Jamaica directing him to Vacate the patent granted by Lord Archibald Hamilton, and to pass another in Favour of Edward Nicholls Esqr. pursuant to His Majestys abovementioned Warrant in that behalfe.--Upon Consideration of the whole it appears to us, that the Grant made by the Lord Hamilton to the Petitioners was agreable to his Instructions, and upon a valuable Consideration according to the Laws of that Island; That his Lordship had no Notice of His Majestys Warrant in favour of Edward Nicholls, till Seven Months after the Letters patents were duly and legally passed and Executed in Favour of the Petitioners.-That though it should appear that the Lord Archibald Hamilton had received any Knowledge of His Majestys Intentions in favour of the said Nichols, before he passed the Grant in favour of the petitioners, Yet the Grant would still, as Wee conceive, Stand good in their Favour, as well by reason of the aforementioned Act for prevention of Law Suits, as of another Law, entituled, An Act for ascertaining the Quit Rent and manner of Receipt thereof, whereby it is Enacted, That a patent Sealed under the Great Seale and recorded in the Office of Inrollments of that Island, Shall evidence the patentees just Right and Title, and be a good Barr to the Right and Title of His Majesty His Heirs and Successors: Wee are therefore humbly of Opinion that the Grant in favour of the petitioners is, and ought to Stand good, and that an attempt to Vacate it, unless the Petitioners should have done anything to forfeit their just Right and Title, might very much Disquiet the minds of His Majestys Subjects in that Island, by giving them apprehensions for the Severall Lands they enjoy, by Virtue of like Grants from former Governors. Agreable to this, likewise was the Opinion of Sir Edward Northey and Sir Simon Harcourt in 1706, at that time Attorney and Sollicitor Generall upon two Acts then passed in Carolina, Who reported, that the said Laws not being consonant to reason and repugnant to the Laws of England, were not Warranted by the Charter and therefore did not bind or Oblige the Inhabitants of that Colony, and that her then Majesty might lawfully declare those Laws, as to the matters therein conteyned, to be null and void, Which was accordingly done by Order of Councill the 10th of June 1706. Considering therefore that this Law is in force till it shall be repealed, Wee most humbly Offer that your Majesty's Pleasure be Signifyed to the Lords Proprietors of Carolina, that they immediately send over to that province their Disallowance of the Same, with directions to their Governor there, never to Give His Assent to any Law of the [p. 141.]like Nature, for the future.

No Goods of the Growth or Manufacture of Europe can be imported into any of the plantations but from Great Britain, excepting Salt for the Fisherys, Wines of the Madera and Western Islands, Servants Horses and Provisions from Ireland, and also except Irish Linnen from Ireland by the Act. the  $3^{\circ}$  and  $4^{\circ}$  Annæ ; Whereas this Act of the Massachusets Bay, not only Allows the importation of All Sorts of Wines and Commoditys directly from the place of their Growth, but charges the said Commoditys with a double duty, if Imported from this Kingdom, from whence only they can legally be imported, except in the cases abovementioned, besides that there are no Words to Restrain the Importation of such Goods into that Plantation to Such Ships only as by Law may trade thither:-This Act likewise lays a duty of one per Cent. on all English Merchandizes when at the same time it lays not half that duty on any other Goods, and Merchandize, and as a farther discouragement to the British Trade and Navigation, lays a Duty of Tonnage on all Shipping except that of the Massachusetts Bay, and of some few of its neighbouring Colonies: It is further observable that the Ship, with her Tackle Apparell and Furniture is lyable to Answer such Penaltys and Forfeitures as the Master shall incurr by not observing the directions of this Act, Which would be very unreasonable, and a great hardship on British and all other Owners of Shipping, Who are legally intituled to trade thither:-This Act was but very lately transmitted to Us, and Will have had its full Effect before Your Majestys Pleasure thereon can be known in that province, for it expires in May next; However considering that it is of so very Extraordinary a Nature, Wee would humbly propose, that Your Majesty may Declare Your Disapprobation

Peers' estate for all the stores in the receipts and an Act was passed to subject his estate to the execution. When Poulson also took out a Fieri Facias, Forward's attorney brought a writ of error, but in spite of this Forward's effects in the hands of Thomas Cockey, one of his factors, were condemned to satisfy the judgment and costs. On arguing the writ of error, 7 May 1723, the first judgment was affirmed and Forward condemned in 1803 pounds of tobacco as further costs. Notwithstanding the appeal to the Council and 900l. sterling given thereon, the Maryland Court obliged Cockey to draw a bill of exchange on Forward for 6001. sterling for the effects condemned in his hands. 

### COLONIAL ACTS CONFIRMED OR DISALLOWED BY THE PRIVY COUNCIL, 1680—1720.

[The usual custom of the Privy Council, in dealing with Acts passed by colonial legislatures, was until May 1696 to refer them to the Committee for foreign trade and plantations, and after that date to the Board of Trade, or in some cases to the Law Officers of the Crown, and to act in accordance with their report. The entry in the Register consists usually of a formal notice of their confirmation or disallowance, with sometimes the report on which this was based. Very rarely is anything given of the Act other than its title.  $\mathbf{As}$ accessible printed collections exist of most of these Acts, in many cases with a marginal note of the date of their confirmation or disallowance, we have simply referred to such Acts by their number in the collection. The letters P.R. after an entry mean that the law or laws are given in full in the Plantation Register.]

Which Act was Confirmed by your Majesty in Council the 26 of June 1706. And this Board not having been informed, that anything had been done in pursuance of this last menttioned Act, the like Instructions were given to your Majesty's present Governor, but It having since appeared to Us, that a

Lease of a House, called Pilgrim House, with 20 acres of Land in your Majesty's said Island, was made to the Then Treasurer for 21 years, at the annual Rent of One Hundred and Twenty pounds for the Residence of your Majesty's Governors for the Time being, and Signed the 7th of February 1705, And That another Act was past the fourth of September 1706 for Confirming the said Case Entituled,

An Act to Confirm a Lease made by the Attorneys of Thomas Pilgrim Merchant to the Treasurer of this Island and his Successors, and to secure the payment of the Rent Therebye Reserved.

We take Leave to Represent to your Majesty, That We have been informed by several Considerable planters and Merchants Concerned in that Island, That the Assembly having found, that the said House was very Convenient for the Residence of the Governor It being situated near the Chief Town in that Island, in a Good Air, supplyed with plenty of good Water, and in view of the Chief Forts, and from whence the Governor might see all Ships and Vessels that come in and go out of the principal Road There, and particularly that the Masters of all such Ships and Vessels could with less trouble and Danger of their Health, in regard to the heat of the Country, wayt on the Governor, to give him an Account of their Lading &c. as they are Obliged to do at their first Arrival in the said Island; And We are further Informed that the said Assembly had been at about Ten Thousand pounds Expence, in Adding new Buildings, Stables and Out Houses &c. to the said House, to make the same Commodious, Usefull and Agreeable.

In regard therefore that the Assembly have taken a Lease for the said Term of years, and have been at so great an Expence, in Enlarging and making the said House Commodious, whereby your Majesty's said Instruction in that particular has been fully Complyed with, We humbly Offer, That your Majesty be pleased to signify your Disallowance and Disapprobation of the said Act, And That Mr. Crowe be directed not to pass any such Act for the future. [*pp.* 1-2.]

Disapprobation of the said Act and pursuant to Her Majesty's Royall Pleasure thereupon, the said Act Passed in Her Majesty's Colony of Connecticutt in New England, Entituled Hereticks, is hereby repealed and Declared Null and Voyd and of None Effect.

The second is, that the Act supposes that the Lord Baltimore's Receipt of a Year's Rent, after the end of the Term aforesaid, will extinguish or discharge the Arrears due to the said Farmers; which is an error; for his Lordship's Receipt of a subsequent Rent might debar his Loss of a former Rent due to himself, but cannot prejudice the Right and just Demands of others &c.

Besides, there is a Clause in the said Act, that no Orphan shall be sued in an Action of Debt, for Arrears of Rent till five years after such Orphan attains his Age, which is to introduce an unjust law.

The foregoing Objections being in our Opinion well grounded, we humbly offer, That Your Majesty be pleased to Disallow and Repeal the said Act.
